Leave Request A request for additional serious illness leave was made by Boni Schultz due to parents' accidents and illnesses. The Board took no action.

Girls' Soccer Coach Position

Kelley Hood presented a comparability study with other schools pursuant to a request for an additional soccer coach position to oversee the high school girls' program. No other schools will be sponsoring girls' soccer in 1995. Superintendent could not recommend an additional coach because of comparability and budget considerations. It was moved by Heefner, seconded by Pedersen, to sponsor the girls' soccer team for 1995 and to hire one coach. Motion carried 3-1 (Heefner-no).

Board member Ray Hemphill arrived.

PPEL Projects The Board discussed PPEL projects and financing choices. Superintendent will pursue both options of financing of public sale and negotiated rate.

Open Enrollment Requests

Superintendent recommended open enrollment requests for Jody Emmert from Dallas Center-Grimes to ADM and for Tania Ohde from Dexfield to ADM for 1994-95. Also recommended was a request for Nicole Ackelson from Dexfield to ADM for 1995-96. It was moved by Hill, seconded by Pedersen, to approve open enrollment requests as presented. Motion carried unanimously.

Board Policy Review

Superintendent recommended approval of the first reading of Board policies 501.15 "Open Enrollment Transfers-Procedures As A Sending District"; 502.8 "Weapons"; 502.13 "Student-to-Student Harassment"; 503.1 "Student Conduct"; 601.1 "School Calendar"; 712.2 "Student Conduct on School Transportation; 705.5 "Payment for Goods and Services"; and 906.4 "Smoke-Free Environment". Superintendent recommended elimination of Board policy 403.5 "Designated Smoking Areas", since smoking areas may no longer be designated. It was moved by Heefner, seconded by Hemphill, to approve the first reading of Board policies as presented and to eliminate Board policy 403.5. Motion carried unanimously.

Basic Skills Results

Bill Kimber presented a report on the middle school basic skills test results. Discussion followed.

Resignations and New Contracts

Superintendent recommended resignations from Bill Kimber, middle school principal and activities director; DeVee McLaughlin, middle school secretary; Pat O'Donnell, assistant baseball; and Allison

Carrico, middle school softball. It was moved by Hemphill, seconded by Heefner, to approve resignations as presented. Motion carried unanimously.

Superintendent and Kelley Hood explained a realignment plan for track coaches for spring, 1995. Board consensus favored enacting the plan of one head coach and the specialization of other coaches for a trial period of the current school year.

Staffing Needs for 1995-96

Superintendent presented data concerning staffing needs for 1995-96. Federal funding for Chapter I reading programs has been reduced. Enrollment at the high school may dictate the need for additional staff in the areas of science and math. Enrollment figures for third grade may allow the elimination of two teaching positions. Superintendent will bring more information to subsequent meetings as it becomes available.

Administrative Reports

The Board found that the facilities tour was worthwhile and worth repeating.

The Board discussed the future of the school-owned house in Minburn. Board consensus favored continuing to rent the house for now with periodic re-evaluation.

A special meeting may be held February 23 to approve the layout and specifications of the athletic complex and to approve the contract form.

The Board discussed the change of bus route in Adel Estates.

OPEN ENROLLMENT TRANSFERS - PROCEDURES AS A SENDING DISTRICT

The school district will participate in open enrollment as a sending district. As a sending district, the board will allow resident students who meet the requirements to open enroll to another public school district.

Parents requesting open enrollment out of the school district for their student shall notify the school district no later than October 30 in the year preceding the first year desired for open enrollment. The notice shall be made on forms provided by the Department of Education. The forms are available at the central administration office.

Parents of children who will begin kindergarten in the school district are exempt from the open enrollment October 30 deadline. Parents of children who will begin kindergarten shall file in the same manner set forth above by June 30 prior to the beginning of the child's kindergarten year. Parents who have good cause as defined by law for failing to meet the October 30 deadline may make an open enrollment request in the same manner set forth above.

Open enrollment requests out of the school district that, if denied, would result in students from the same nuclear family being enrolled in different school districts, will be given highest priority. Other open enrollment requests out of the school district shall be considered in the order received by the school district with the first open enrollment request given a higher priority than the second open enrollment request and so forth.



The board shall take action on the open enrollment request by November 30 in the year preceding the first year desired for open enrollment. The parents may withdraw the open enrollment request prior to the start of the school year.

The superintendent shall notify the parents by mail within three days of the board's action to approve or deny the open enrollment request. Approved open enrollment requests shall be transmitted by the superintendent to the receiving district chosen by the parents within five days after the board's action on the open enrollment request.



The board may approve a student's request to allow the receiving district to enter the school district for the purposes of transportation.

The board will not approve a student's request to allow the receiving district to enter the school district for the purposes of transportation.

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OPEN ENROLLMENT TRANSFERS - PROCEDURES AS A SENDING DISTRICT

Open Enrollment Out of the School District to an Alternative Receiving District

Parents of students attending the school district under open enrollment may make an open enrollment request to a different public school district, an alternative receiving district, within the time period of the original open enrollment request. This open enrollment request shall be filed in the same manner as other open enrollment requests no later than October 30 in the year preceding the first year desired for open enrollment in the alternative receiving district.

It shall be within the complete discretion of the board to approve or deny the open enrollment request to an alternative receiving district. In exercising that discretion, the board may consider several factors including, but not limited to, the potential impact of the transfer on the student, the effectiveness of the education program, the financial situation of the school district and other factors deemed relevant by the superintendent and the board. The board shall take action on the open enrollment request to the alternative receiving district at the next regular board meeting. Prior to the board's action, parents may withdraw the open enrollment request.

The superintendent shall notify the parents by mail within five days of the board's action to approve or deny the open enrollment request to an alternative receiving district. Approved open enrollment requests shall be transmitted by the superintendent to the alternative receiving district chosen by the parents within five days after the board's action on the open enrollment request.

Approved open enrollment requests to an alternative receiving district shall be effective the following semester or at the beginning of the next school year. It shall be within the discretion of the board to make the open enrollment request to an alternative receiving district effective immediately based upon the circumstances of the open enrollment request and with mutual agreement of the alternative receiving district's board.

Renewal of Open Enrollment Requests

Open enrollment requests may be renewed prior to the end of the time period of the original open enrollment request. The renewal of the open enrollment request shall be filed prior to the end of the school year in the year preceding the first year of renewing the open enrollment. Code No. 501.15

OPEN ENROLLMENT TRANSFERS - PROCEDURES AS A SENDING DISTRICT

An open enrollment request out of the school district from parents of a special education student shall be reviewed on a case-by-case basis. The determining factor for approval of such an open enrollment request will be whether the special education program available in the receiving school district is appropriate for the student's needs. The area education agency director of special education serving the receiving district shall determine whether the program is appropriate. The special education student shall remain in the school district until the final determination is made.

It shall be the responsibility of the superintendent to maintain open enrollment request applications and notice forms. It shall also be the responsibility of the superintendent to develop appropriate office procedures and administrative regulations necessary for open enrollment requests.

WEAPONS

The board believes weapons and other dangerous objects in school district facilities cause material and substantial disruption to the school environment or present a threat to the health and safety of students, employees and visitors on the school district premises or property within the jurisdiction of the school district.

School district facilities are not an appropriate place for weapons or dangerous objects. Weapons and other dangerous objects shall be taken from students and others who bring them onto the school district property or onto property within the jurisdiction of the school district or from students who are within the control of the school district.

Parents of students found to possess a weapon or dangerous objects on school property shall be notified of the incident. Confiscation of firearms shall be reported to the law enforcement officials, and the student will be subject to disciplinary action including suspension or expulsion. For the purposes of this policy, "possession" includes but is not limited to storage in a student's locker, desk, book bag, purse, coat, jacket or other clothing, car, bike bag, or other container or area of confinement used by the student whether personal or school-owned.

Students may not have hunting rifles, shotguns, starter pistols, or any other firearms in their vehicles if the vehicle is on school property.

Students bringing a firearm to school shall be expelled for not less than 12 months. The superintendent shall have the authority to recommend this expulsion requirement be modified for a student on a case-by-case basis. For purposes of this portion of this policy, the term "firearm" includes any weapon which is designed to expel a projectile by the action of an explosive, the frame or receiver of any such weapon, a muffler or silencer for such a weapon, or any explosive, incendiary or poison gas.

Students may not use normally non-destructive objects such as pencils, rulers, compasses, or books in a threatening or assaultive manner. The use of any object in a dangerous way will be treated as if the item used were a dangerous weapon.

Students shall not possess toy weapons or "look-alike" weapons at school except with the knowledge and permission of a teacher, coach or administrator, and then only for school or educational purposes. Violation of this policy shall result in confiscation of the "weapon" and detention or suspension, depending upon the student's disciplinary history.

Any student who threatens another person on school property or at a school event with a dangerous weapon or an object that resembles a dangerous weapon, including but not limited to a toy pistol or rifle, squirt gun, cap gun, rubber knife, or plastic grenade, or who displays any object in such a manner as reasonably to place another person in

fear for his or her safety shall be subject to discipline by the principal or superintendent including possible suspension and recommendation for expulsion.

Students who have knowledge or a belief of the existence of a weapon on school grounds or at a school activity shall promptly report to a school official. Failure to report will be grounds for suspension or expulsion from school.

Weapons under the control of law enforcement officials shall be exempt from this policy. The principal may allow authorized persons to display weapons or other dangerous objects for educational purposes. Such a display shall also be exempt from this policy. It shall be the responsibility of the superintendent, in conjunction with the principal, to develop administrative regulations regarding this policy.

STUDENT-TO-STUDENT HARASSMENT

Harassment of students by other students will not be tolerated in the school district. This policy is in effect while students are on school grounds, school district property, or on property within the jurisdiction of the school district; while on school-owned and/or school-operated buses, vehicles or chartered buses; while attending or engaged in school activities; and while away from school grounds if the misconduct directly affects the good order, efficient management and welfare of the school district.

Harassment prohibited by the district includes, but is not limited to, harassment on the basis of race, sex, creed, color, national origin, religion, marital status or disability. Students whose behavior is found to be in violation of this policy will be subject to the investigation procedure which may result in discipline, up to and including, suspension and expulsion.

Sexual harassment means unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors and other verbal or physical conduct of a sexual nature when:

- submission to such conduct is made either explicitly or implicitly a term or condition or a student's education or of a student's participation in school programs or activities;
- submission to or rejection of such conduct by a student is used as the basis for decisions affecting the student; or
- such conduct has the purpose or effect of unreasonably interfering with a student's performance or creating an intimidating or hostile learning environment.

Sexual harassment as set out above, may include, but is not limited to the following:

- · verbal or written harassment or abuse;
- · pressure for sexual activity;
- · repeated remarks to a person with sexual or demeaning implications
- · unwelcome touching;
- suggesting or demanding sexual involvement, accompanied by implied or explicit threats concerning one's grades, achievements, etc.

Harassment on the basis of race, creed, color, religion, national origin, marital status or disability means conduct of a verbal or physical nature that is designed to embarrass, distress, agitate, disturb or trouble students when:

- submission to such conduct is made either explicitly or implicitly a term or condition of a student's education or of a student's participation in school programs or activities;
- submission to or rejection of such conduct by a student is used as the basis for decisions affecting the student; or
- such conduct has the purpose or effect of unreasonably interfering with a student's performance or creating an intimidating or hostile learning environment.

Harassment as set forth above may include, but is not limited to the following:

- · verbal, physical or written harassment or abuse;
- · repeated remarks of a demeaning nature;
- · implied or explicit threats concerning one's grades, achievements, etc.;
- · demeaning jokes, stories, or activities directed at the student.

The district will promptly and reasonably investigate allegations of harassment. The building principal will be responsible for handling all complaints by students alleging harassment.

Retaliation against a student because the student has filed a harassment complaint or assisted or participated in a harassment investigation or proceeding is also prohibited. A student who is found to have retaliated against another in violation of this policy, will be subject to discipline up to an including suspension and expulsion.

It shall also be the responsibility of the superintendent, in conjunction with the investigator and principals, to develop administrative rules regarding this policy.

STUDENT CONDUCT

The board believes inappropriate student conduct causes material and substantial disruption to the school environment, interferes with the rights of others, or presents a threat to the health and safety of students, employees, and visitors on school premises.

Students shall conduct themselves in a manner fitting to their age level and maturity and with respect and consideration for the rights of others while on school district property or on property within the jurisdiction of the school district; while on school owned and/or operated school or chartered buses; while attending or engaged in school activities; and while away from school grounds if misconduct will directly affect the good order, efficient management and welfare of the school district.

Students who fail to abide by this policy and the administrative regulations supporting it may be disciplined for conduct which disrupts or interferes with the education program; conduct which disrupts the orderly and efficient operation of the school district or school activity; conduct which disrupts the rights of other students to obtain their education or participation; or conduct which interrupts the maintenance of a disciplined atmosphere. Disciplinary measures include, but are not limited to, removal from the classroom, detention, suspension, probation, and expulsion.



A student who commits an assault against an employee on school district property or on property within the jurisdiction of the school district; while on school-owned or school-operated chartered buses; while attending or engaged in school district activities shall be suspended by the principal. Notice of the suspension shall be sent to the board president. The board shall review the suspension to determine whether to impose further sanctions against the student which may include expulsion. Assault for purposes of this section of this policy is defined as:

- an act which is intended to cause pain or injury to, or which is intended to result in physical contact which will be insulting or offensive to another, coupled with the apparent ability to execute the act; or
- any act which is intended to place another in fear of immediate physical contact which will be painful, injurious, insulting or offensive, coupled with the apparent ability to execute the act; or
- intentionally points any firearm toward another or displays in a threatening manner any dangerous weapon toward another.

STUDENT CONDUCT

The act is not an assault when the person doing any of the above and the other person are voluntary participants in a sport, social or other activity, not in itself criminal, when the act is a reasonably foreseeable incident of such sport or activity, and does not create an unreasonable risk of serious injury or breach of the peace.

Removal from the classroom means a student is sent to the building principal's office. It shall be within the discretion of the person in charge of the classroom to remove the student.

Detention means the student's presence is required during nonschool hours for disciplinary purposes. The student can be required to appear prior to the beginning of the school day or after school has been dismissed for the day. Whether a student will serve detention, and the length of the detention, shall be within the discretion of the licensed employee disciplining the student or the building principal.

Suspension means either an in-school suspension, an out-of-school suspension, a restriction from activities or loss of eligibility. An in-school suspension means the student will attend school but will be temporarily isolated from one or more classes while under supervision. An in-school suspension will not exceed ten consecutive school days. An out-of-school suspension means the student is removed from the school environment, which includes school classes and activities. An out-of-school suspension will not exceed ten days. A restriction from school activities means a student will attend school and classes and practice but will not participate in school activities.

Probation means a student is given a conditional suspension of a penalty for a definite period of time in addition to being reprimanded. The conditional suspension shall mean the student must meet the conditions and terms for the suspension of the penalty. Failure of the student to meet these conditions and terms shall result in immediate reinstatement of the penalty.

Expulsion means an action by the board to remove a student from the school environment, which includes, but is not limited to, classes and activities, for a period of time set by the board but no longer than one school year.

It shall be the responsibility of the superintendent, in conjunction with the principal, to develop administrative regulations regarding this policy.

Following the suspension of a special education student, an informal evaluation of the student's placement shall take place. The Individual Education Program (IEP) shall be evaluated to determine whether it needs to be changed or modified in response to the behavior that led to the suspension.

STUDENT CONDUCT

If a special education student's suspensions, either in or out of school, equal ten days on a cumulative basis, a staffing team shall meet to determine whether the IEP is appropriate.

SCHOOL CALENDAR

The school calendar shall accommodate the education program of the school district. The school calendar shall be for a minimum of two-hundred days and include, but not be limited to, the days for student instruction, staff development, in-service days and teacher conferences.

The academic school year for students shall be for a minimum of one-hundred and eighty days in the school calendar. The academic school year for students may not begin prior to September but may begin in the week in which September 1 falls. Should September 1 fall on a Sunday, school may begin on the Monday immediately preceding September 1. Employees may be required to report to work at the school district prior to this date.

Special education students may attend school on a school calendar different from that of the regular education program consistent with their Individualized Education Program.

The board, in its discretion, may excuse graduating seniors from up to five days of instruction after the school district requirements for graduation have been met. The board may also excuse graduating seniors from making up days missed due to inclement weather if the student has met the school district's graduation requirements.

It shall be the responsibility of the superintendent to develop the school calendar for recommendation, approval, and adoption by the board annually.

The board may amend the official school calendar when the board considers the change to be in the best interests of the school district's education program.

STUDENT CONDUCT ON SCHOOL TRANSPORTATION

Students utilizing school transportation shall conduct themselves in an orderly manner fitting to their age level and maturity with mutual respect and consideration for the rights of the school vehicle driver and the other passengers. Students who fail to behave in an orderly manner will be subject to disciplinary measures.

The driver shall have the authority to maintain order on the school vehicle. It shall be the responsibility of the driver to report misconduct to the building administrator.



The board supports the use of video cameras on school buses used for transportation to and from school as well as for field trips, curricular or extracurricular events. The video cameras will be used to monitor student behavior and may be used as evidence in a student disciplinary proceeding. The videotapes are student records subject to school district confidentiality, board policy and administrative regulations.

After ___ warnings for bad conduct, the building principal shall have the authority to suspend transportation privileges of the student or other appropriate discipline. Severe misconduct may result in a suspension without warning.

It shall be the responsibility of the superintendent, in conjunction with the building principal, to develop administrative regulations regarding student conduct and discipline when utilizing school district transportation.

The requirements stated in the Master Contract between employees in that certified collective bargaining unit and the board regarding the group insurance benefits of such employees shall be followed.

PAYMENT FOR GOODS AND SERVICES

The board authorizes the issue of warrants for payment of claims against the school district for goods and services. The board will allow the warrants after the goods and services have been received and accepted in compliance with board policy and the claims audited by the board.

Claims for payment of freight, drayage, express, postage, printing, water, lights, telephone, rents, and payment of salaries pursuant to the terms of a written contract may be paid by the board secretary prior to formal audit and approval by the board. XIn addition, the secretary, upon approval of the board president, may issue warrants for verified bills filed with the secretary when the board is not in session prior to payment and prior to audit and approval by the board. X-or [In addition the secretary, upon approval of the board president, may issue warrants for approved registrations, claims offering a discount for early payment, approved travel expenses, approved goods and services delivered C.O.D. and other verified bills filed with the secretary when the board is not in session prior to payment of these claims and prior to audit and approval by the board.] The board secretary shall examine the claims and verified bills.

The secretary shall determine to the secretary's satisfaction that the claims presented to the board are in order and are legitimate expenses of the school district. It shall be the responsibility of the secretary to bring claims to the board.



The board president and board secretary may sign warrants by use of a signature plate or rubber stamp. If the board president is unavailable to sign warrants, the vice president may sign warrants on behalf of the president.

It shall be the responsibility of the superintendent to develop the administrative regulations regarding this policy.

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SMOKE-FREE ENVIRONMENT

School district premises, including school vehicles, shall be off limits for smoking. This requirement extends to employees and visitors. This policy applies at all times, including school-sponsored and nonschool-sponsored events. Persons failing to abide by this request shall be required to extinguish their smoking material or leave the school district premises immediately. It shall be the responsibility of the administration to enforce this policy.
