
## Summer Reading Assignment and Book Suggestions

## Incoming Fifth Grade Reading Response Guidelines Summer Assignment 2022



**Directions:** Select two books to use for this assignment, preferably new never-read-before books. Select books that you will love, and want to share with your classmates. Remember, it is perfectly acceptable to abandon a book that isn't your cup of tea (idiom – we will spend time interpreting figurative language next year)! Your goal is to get other kids interested so they will want to read your book too!

## **Optional** suggestions for responding to your reading.:

- 1) Write down the complete title, author's name and a brief summary on a sheet of paper or a large index card. Remember, a summary should include important details about the setting, the main character, the main problem, and solution or resolution.
- 2) Write a letter to the author critiquing the book.
- 3) Write a letter to a character in the book.
- 4) Select your favorite scene from the book and rewrite in graphic novel form.
- 5) Create a book advertisement poster. Include character names, setting description, and a teaser about the plot. (Don't give away the ending). This can be done by hand or digitally.
- 6) Write a new ending to the book.
- 7) Think of a new name for the book and design a book cover using your idea.
- 8) Choose your own activity. If you want to run it by me, I'll be checking my email periodically.

Before the beginning of the school year when you know your language arts teacher, send your picture to either Mr. Akin or Ms. Goldsmith. The picture is our favorite part of your summer assignment.
