Which one to choose?



The Fender Stratogaster


OVERVIEW


Debuting in 1954, the Fender Stratocaster has rivaled the Gibson Les Paul for decades. Designed by Leo Fender, the Stratocaster has been used by many leading quitarists and can be heard on many historic recordings. This quitar is very versatile in its tones; it can be used for any genre. The Fender Strat is light weight and very comfortable to play. You can get just about any sound you desire from it. Over the decades, famous quitarits such as Jimi Hendrix, Eric Clapton from Cream and Derek and the Dominoes, Stevie Ray Vaughan, and Jeff Beck play or had played the Fender Stratocaster.

The "Inside Scoop"

The Stratocaster

When looking at the "specs" of a Fender Stratocaster, you can see that it has single coil pickups. These are very sensitive pickups and tend to be very noisy. This is viewed as negative, but actually is very positive to achieve a perfect tone. There is a 5-channel pickup selector, two tone knobs, and one volume knob. The 5-channel pickup selector is great because you can achieve a variety of tones, which is desired among most guitarists. The Stratocaster by Fender is definitely a good choice for any guitarist, whether they are a beginner or a professional. Getting a great Fender Stratocaster guitar costs only around \$900! (www.Fender.com, www.Samash.com)



The Les Paul

When looking at the "specs" of a Gibson Les Paul, you can see that it carries humbucker pickups. This creates a cleaner sound, warm and free of noise. It has a toggle switch that is a 3-channel pickup selector, so you have less variety. Along with the switch it has two tone knobs, and two volume knobs. This guitar isn't meant for beginner guitarists, and is aimed towards the professionals. To get a great Gibson Les Paul, you must shell out over \$2000! This guitar is definitely not for a casual player.
