Sound Devices

Poets use sound devices for the following purposes:

- to create musical sounds
- to emphasize certain words
- to heighten moods
- to unify passages
- to help create meaning

Alliteration is a repetition of consonant sounds at the beginnings of words. Assonance is a repetition of vowel sounds in syllables that do not rhyme.

Consonance is a repetition of consonant sounds within or at the ends of words. Find two examples of each sound device in "The Panther" and/or "The Guitar." Then check the list above, and identify reasons the poet may have used those sound devices. One example of alliteration is provided.
