Learning Continues with Summer Enrichment



Amityville students in grades kindergarten through eight benefit from summer enrichment programs hosted at Park Avenue Memorial Elementary School (PAMES) during the month of July. Under the Summer English Language Arts and Math Academy, students were immersed in the System 44 phonics and Read 180 literacy improvement software programs, as well as the hands-on Everyday Math and Scholastic's FASTT Math software, which reinforce key skills that draw correlations to the real world and make learning more fun.

The district also hosted an ESL Summer Academy at PAMES in which some students learned about American culture through trips to Old Bethpage Village Restoration and studied local geography by creating maps, while others learned to dance to the twist and enjoyed other American pop culture activities. Art and crafts were also carried out on a regular basis.

Additionally, the 21st Century program continued this summer, with afternoon activities rotating within a wide variety of areas, including computers, robotics, fitness, poetry, dancing, and music history. Many other clubs and classes conducted through the 21st Century program and enrichment classes engaged and entertained youngsters during the hot summer, while keeping them sharp for the start of the new school year.

Michele Darby Named Miles Principal



Michele Darby has been named the new principal at Edmund W. Miles Middle School (EWMMS). Ms. Darby has served as the school's assistant principal for the last four years.

"Having been here for a while and walking the halls of the school, I feel a special connection to all of the students and staff," said Ms. Darby. "I know the name of just about every child and have come to know many of the parents and faculty in both a professional and personal manner. I am truly excited and proud to accept this responsibility and look

forward to working together with the entire school community to build on past successes to further develop an environment supportive of achievement that educates the whole child."

Prior to arriving in Amityville, Ms. Darby served as Assistant Principal at the Montauk Intermediate School in Borough Park, Brooklyn. She also served as a dean and teacher in the New York City school system, teaching predominantly English Language Arts, science, and social studies. When an administrator at one of her former schools informed Ms. Darby that her leadership qualities would best be utilized as a school building administrator, she realized that she could impact a larger number of students in a positive manner.

"You go from working with 125 students to several hundred in a given school year," Ms. Darby said. "This, to me, was significant. I feel like every child at the middle school is my student and I take a special interest in every one of them."

Ms. Darby also attributes her brother as an inspiration to her love for educating and nurturing young people, having raised him early in life following the loss of their parents.

"I want to be there for the students of Edmund W. Miles Middle School the way I have been for him. As long as I am their principal, no matter what happens in school or outside of these walls, they will never be alone...I will always have their back."

Steven Lindenfeld, who served as Assistant Principal at Park Avenue Memorial Elementary School this past year, will serve as Assistant Principal to Ms. Darby at EWMMS.

Northwest Wins National Recognition for Fighting Childhood Obesity

Northwest Elementary School is the recipient of the Alliance for a Healthier Generation's prestigious Bronze National Recognition Award for its meal service and physical activity programs that exceed stringent standards. Northwest is the only school on Long Island to receive a medal from the Alliance this year.

Founded by the American Heart Association and the William J. Clinton Foundation, the Alliance for a Healthier Generation's Healthy Schools Program provides expert advice and free resources to more than 12,000 schools nationwide to help them reverse the national trend in childhood obesity.

According to Northwest Interim Principal Dr. Shirley Martin, the moment students arrive for school, they participate in fitness exercises that are above and beyond their regular physical education instruction and recess time. Teachers also incorporate "Brain Building" activities into their lesson plans, which encourage movement and exercise in correlation to what is being taught inside of the classroom while stimulating mental growth. More fresh fruit and healthy snacks are being served,

while fried foods are being phased out and healthy options are continually reinforced to the children.

"It's well known throughout the education community that students who have healthy bodies and healthy minds are better learners," said Dr. Martin, who traveled to the National Healthy Schools Forum in Little Rock, Arkansas to accept the award on the school's behalf. "Our goal is to win the silver medal next year, and perhaps even gold!"

Northwest's healthy culture has also resonated with staff, thanks in part to professional development, regular yoga sessions offered, and an overall attitude of healthier eating habits. Parents have also been included in the effort, as the school hosted a Family, Food and Fun Night at the end of the year, designed to promote healthy eating habits, fitness and overall wellness.

Dr. Martin thanked the entire school community, but most notably identified School Nurse Kathy Nardi, Amityville Director of Food Services Lisa Bowman, District Director of Health,



Physical Education and Nurses Tony Cerullo, and physical education teachers Brian White and Tiffany Pesale as key contributors to the success. Northwest joins 274 schools in the U.S. who received the honor

Under the direction of teacher Ron Weber, approximately 11 seventh and eighth graders at Edmund W. Miles Middle School learned about television production and created their own video announcements this past year. They broadcasted these announcements on YouTube on Friday mornings during first period for their entire school to watch.

The students volunteered their free time during lunch, study hall, and after school to learn the art and technology behind television production.

The broadcasts consisted of eight to 20 weekly segments, ranging from five to 10 minutes in length, that addressed not only announcements for upcoming weeks but also reoccurring segments such as the weather, special school events, "Vocabulary Corner," "Things to Think About," and "This Month in History," among others. The goal was to reinforce and communicate topics that support English

Language Arts standards and curricular topics on social studies, science and character education, while promoting positive student behavior. Thanks to the use of a green screen, computer graphics, and some very committed correspondents, the broadcasts have a professional look and feel to them.

"What the students have done is really exceptional. This has been a really powerful and effective tool to teach important skills and address topics identified by the New York State Learning Standards as well as the Common Core ELA standards, and they absolutely love it," said Mr. Weber, who is seeking grant funding to provide additional equipment for the program for the upcoming and future years. "Kids were walking up to my classroom asking to be involved. Anyone who wanted to be involved was welcomed."

Students were even treated to a trip to News 12 Long Island studios in Woodbury, where they received a firsthand look at how a professional news network operates.





Alexandra has taken on leadership roles at AMHS as President of the National Honor Society and Jazz Band. She has excelled in Honors and Advanced Placement (AP) courses and has been called "brilliant" by her AP English teacher and Varsity Soccer Coach Christopher Roth. Her awards and recognitions span the fields of academics, music, and athletics. 
21st Century Wraps Up Another Great Year


