Smart Scholars Get the Jump on College

Edmund W. Miles Middle School (EWMMS) students are the beneficiaries of a NYS grantfunded program, backed by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, entitled Smart Scholars Grant.

Thanks to this Smart Scholar grant, 28 eighth and ninth graders with an interest in pursuing a STEM-related career (Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics) in college are attending college-level classes at Farmingdale State University on Saturdays. These classes offer them an opportunity to accumulate as many as 20 transferable college credits between now and the time they are ready to graduate high school, while receiving credit toward their high school diploma. While the program is available to other schools in the area, Amityville has the largest representation of the Farmingdale cohort participating in the program.

"These students have shown great proficiency in their studies of the sciences and have already

demonstrated a strong desire to succeed in the program after just three classes," said science teacher Deborah Charles, who introduced the program to EWMMS.

According to Ms. Charles, the program begins with basic college preparation courses and general

electives, but evolves into advanced STEM-related studies as students progress in the program. The courses are also reviewed by the school district to ensure that they are aligned with NYS standards.

Eighth grader John Jack, who plans on majoring in physics in college, said what he has learned so far in the Amityville Schools has influenced him to someday study new forms of creating energy, and that the Smart Scholars program will get him there faster. His classmate Bertha Ati, who aspires to be a nurse or doctor



one day, says the program has already helped her to study more efficiently.

"The Smart Scholars grant is providing students with an opportunity to prepare for college earlier than ever before, instilling theoretical and practical college readiness skills necessary to motivate them on to college and beyond," said EWMMS Principal Michele Darby. "And it's also giving them advanced experiences in STEM education, which inspires industrious and innovative thinking for success in our global society."

Students Seeking Careers in Medicine

Eleven Amityville Memorial High School students completed the Health Careers Opportunity Program (HCOP) at Stony Brook University (SBU) conducted over the summer. The six-week, federally-funded academy enabled students to explore career interests in various medically related fields and the academic preparation necessary to pursue such careers.

Among the occupations AMHS students chose from were: anesthesia technologist, athletic trainer, clinical laboratory scientist, EMT and paramedics, medical dosimetrist (cancer radiation treatment), nuclear medical technologist, occupational therapist, physical therapist, physician's assistant, polysomnographic technologist (sleep disorders), radiologic technologist, and respiratory therapist. Students studied under the guidance of health professionals for six hours a day and were paid a stipend of \$40 per day for their participation, with transportation provided. According to AMHS program facilitator Anthony Powell, students wrote applications, interviewed with school staff and program coordinators, and secured teacher recommendations in order to qualify for the program. This month, students will be visiting SBU to tour the entire school and complete applications for admission. The AMHS students who participated and completed the summer program are:

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A Message from your Superintendent



Dear Amityville Residents:

With the opening of school well behind us and the winter fast approaching, our students and staff are immersed in their studies, and

I am pleased to see in action so many of the exciting, cutting-edge projects and programs in which students are not only participating, but excelling. Whether they are creating informative and relative presentations with the use of leading-edge technology, or exhibiting wonderful talents through the arts for those in our community and beyond to enjoy, our students are making a splash and reinforcing my belief that the children of Amityville are not only on track, but well exceeding expectations. Just read this edition of *The Tide* and see for yourself.

In order to keep our kids on track and propel them to greater achievements–primarily in academics–our instructional staff must stay on top of the sweeping changes in education that are taking place here in New York State and throughout the country. We recently completed our third Superintendent's Conference Day of the school year, during which teachers received additional training and shared their knowledge and expertise of the new Common Core Standards in Mathematics and English Language Arts, which will be fully implemented for the 2012-13 school year.

These Common Core Standards have been designed to establish a shared vision between teachers and administrators and guarantee consistency across states. The overall goal is to ensure that academic

standards are robust and relevant to the real world, reflecting the knowledge and skills that our young people need for success in college and career readiness in order to compete in a global economy. In the last few years, we have heard from State Education officials that many of our standardized assessments were not effectively preparing students for college. As a result, passing or "cut" scores were raised after students took these exams, causing achievement levels to dip even though our kids were actually making progress.

For ELA, K-12 standards will increase in complexity but will better articulate what students need to know along the trajectory, emphasizing literacy building as a shared responsibility for all content areas and focusing on informational texts, research skills, comprehension and articulation of different points of view. In Mathematics, there will be fewer topics and a stronger linkage of concepts in alignment with the way students in other high-achieving countries learn math, particularly at the lower grade levels. There will also be a greater focus on mastery of complex math concepts such as algebra and geometry via more hands-on learning.

Under the direction of Assistant Superintendent of Schools, Dr. Kathleen Gulbin, and our respective department directors, we are well on our way to aligning our curricula so that by the fall of next year, our program will be in full compliance with the Common Core mandate and students will be in prime position to succeed well into college and beyond. As evidenced by some of the articles in *The Tide*, our schools continue to deliver programs and

activities to give our kids a leg up on their college education, and in some cases actual credit at no cost to parents or our district.

Another significant change that our teachers are participating in is the development of an Annual Professional Performance Review (APPR) plan that takes into account student performance on exams, as well as local standards established by our Board of Education in consultation with the administrative team and myself. Parents and teacher bargaining units will have the opportunity to provide input; however, we have been very adamant to include our teachers in the process so that they have a voice, and so that a fair system of accountability is established to ensure the teachers working with our children are at the top of their game.

I invite you to attend our public Board of Education meetings to learn more about the ongoing changes taking place in public education. If you are a parent, you are always welcome to speak with your child's principal, as well. I invite you to attend one or more games to witness the hard work of our fine student-athletes. As we enter into the holiday season, there will also be many winter concerts taking place in our schools for you to enjoy the musical talents of the children of Amityville.

ESL Students Author an e-Book 'Survival' Guide

Edmund W. Miles Middle School (EWMMS) ESL students collaborated on an e-Book that has received high praise from teachers, administrators and even an Apple Computer System K-12 Engineer. Using a concept based on the novel *Swiss Family Robinson* about a family whose characters are stranded in a new land and adapt to survive, students worked together to write the e-Book, which serves as a guide to Amityville for students adjusting to the language and culture. Chapters include student testimonials on how to acclimate to school and social life, how to find a

job, how to ease loneliness, how to avoid a fight, and even how to stay in the country legally. There are also important community links

and resources that are helpful to readers.

The book received high praise from Apple

Computer K-12 System Engineer Victor La
Bozetta for its innovation and use of the 10
Apple iPads that the district was able to purchase through a federal grant. Teachers Lynda Mussen and Rebekah Dillahunt led the project with



support from consultant Dr. Annette Shideler, librarian Lynn Cesiro and ESL Director Elizabeth Reveiz. The book has since been registered with iTunes and is available for download to other school districts for free.

Miles students are also hard at work at developing a cookbook that will be published as an e-Book and will be used as a fundraiser.



Stewards of the Environment

Nine Amityville Memorial High School (AMHS) students were proud participants in this year's Great South Bay Cleanup, which has resulted in the collection of more than 70,000 lbs. of garbage over the last few years.

Students donned rubber boots and trudged through the mud, working side by side with other dedicated community members who partnered with representatives of the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation and the U.S. Coast Guard. In the five years since this event began, the endangered osprey bird species has moved back into the Great South Bay area.

Others sang short songs or raps that carried these messages. Members of the school's Warrior Awareness Club, also known as the "WAC PAC," designed "peace rocks" and handed them out to their classmates as symbols of their friendship.

International Peace Day was established by the United Nations in 1981 to coincide with the opening of the UN General Assembly. It was designed to provide individuals and organizations with an opportunity to create practical acts of peace in unison on a shared date.





DIGITALDecision Makers

Some Edmund W. Miles Middle School teachers have come together to launch an online resource that promotes good character, denounces bullying, and helps parents, colleagues and children alike.

Under the direction of Principal Michele Darby, teachers Bernadette Kraljic, Jennifer Pepe, Dr. Laura Soluri, and Ron Weber have launched the Digital Decision Makers webpage, which is filled with downloadable content that is valuable in teaching and learning good character traits. From a YouTube video public service announcement, to mosaic posters, to vocabulary tips, to a variety of pdf files, the site provides a wide range of materials (some of which were developed by students) to empower others to make good decisions in life.

The information on the Digital Decision Makers site is based on the six pillars of character (Trustworthiness, Respect, Responsibility, Fairness, Caring, and Citizenship). The site even boasts a PowerPoint tutorial narrated by Mr. Weber to assist the students in creating interesting and visually stimulating presentations that incorporate video and graphics to help them effectively reach others with the message that "Character Counts."

"We wanted to show people the materials that we are developing," said Mr. Weber. "It's a resource that any teacher in the district can use to teach kids about character education." Part of the impetus for the website was to place good decision-making tips at the fingertips of students, and to create a local culture on the internet to combat cyberbullying and prevent other bad online choices. It also aligns with the Dignity for All Students Act, enacted in 2010 to protect New York State's public school students from harassment and bullying.

"We want our students to know that it's good to do the right thing," added Dr. Soluri.

Coming off a sensational season of football halftime shows, the Amityville Memorial High School Marching Band continues to flourish. Since Director Brian Wishin took over the helm a few years ago, the group has been committed to a full slate of halftime shows at home football games and participation has grown.

What began as a group of approximately 50 students who assembled exclusively to participate in the annual Newsday Marching Band Festival has since become regular participants in the Amityville Veteran's Day Parade and Memorial Day Parade, and continues to shine at the Newsday show, with a squad of more than 90 students that include the Dance Guard and Percussion Ensemble.


Celebrating Hispanic Heritage

An ESL Program for Adults

Thanks to the 21st Century grant program, young children are not the only ones receiving instruction in English as a second language. Amityville parents are offered Adult ESL instruction at Edmund W. Miles Middle School (EWMMS) twice a week, free of charge. Now in its third year, program enrollment continues to grow, with students ranging in age from the mid-20s to late-50s enrolled.

"The people who attend are very committed to learning," said teacher Lissa Varas, who works with young children in the district during the day at Northeast Elementary School and teaches the Adult ESL course at night. "Everyone is eager to learn." Since Ms. Varas is fluent in Spanish, and the greater majority of second language learners in the Amityville School District are Spanish, more and more parents are learning to speak English. Lessons are tailored to address the needs of students based on their education and proficiency levels.

The Adult ESL program runs through the entire year and is conducted from 6-9 p.m. at EWMMS. Enrollment is open, based on available seating. For more information, call 565-6044.



All Eyes on the Future

Approximately 85 colleges and universities set up shop at Amityville Memorial High School in October for an evening college fair. Students and parents spoke with



admissions consultants for two- and four-year institutions from throughout the country, both public and private, some church-affiliated and some specializing in the needs of ethnic minority students. There were also plenty of materials from the schools for students to take home and review.

Distance Learning Enhancing the Curriculum

Thanks to a Learning Technology grant, the district has been taking advantage of some high-tech videoconferencing equipment to provide students with a series of different virtual field trips that invigorate the curriculum and make it more interesting for them.

"With the rising costs of education and financial resources limited, these virtual field trips are a great way for students to get the educational value of a field trip without the travel costs associated with them," said Director of Science Mike Fusaro.

Students have already experienced the power of this technology, most notably at Park Avenue Memorial Elementary School last year when they videoconferenced with scientists from NASA about space travel. The experience incorporated two projects in which students researched the potential for sustainable life on Mars and the Moon. Upcoming virtual trips for the year include the New York Hall of Science, the More Marine Laboratory, the Mount Washington Observatory, and the even the National Baseball Hall of Fame.

Teachers at many of the schools have already been trained to use the videoconferencing equipment, with the remaining schools to be completed later this year. In addition to the mobile videoconferencing carts and associated equipment, the Learning Technology grant has also delivered iPod Touch handheld devices and flip cameras to enhance instruction in the district.



As part of the school's commemoration of the tenth anniversary of the September 11, 2001 attacks on America, faculty and staff at Northwest Elementary School in Amityville raised a new American flag donated by U.S. Army Major Gregory Nardi. The flag once flew over the U.S. Army Task Force 1-66 Armor Headquarters located at the U.S. Operation Coordination Center in the Kandahar province of Afghanistan.

Major Nardi, who is the son of Northwest nurse Kathy Nardi, provided the flag as a thank you to the school for its participation in "Operation A Little Bit of Home," an effort by students and staff to collect food items, school supplies, toiletries, games and other useful items and send them to the troops stationed in


It was a fitting tribute that delivered an important lesson to young children who were not yet born on September 11, 2001.

system at the time that the first plane crashed into the World Trade Center, and teachers held lessons regarding 9/11 in their classrooms.


