THE NEW BHS 200 BUILDING OPENED

to excited students and staff on January 5 and to an awestruck community on January 10, 2009. This remarkable new facility brings functional and sustainable elements together to positively impact student learning.

From rain gardens and natural daylighting to open areas, this facility supports environmental stewardship as well as the district's instructional goals. Principal Brent Peterson commented, "As we explored design options for the new 200 Building, we looked carefully at how a facility impacts learning. We took every opportunity to provide natural lighting and to create a sense of openness."

The 200 Building is one of the projects completed from the voter-approved 2006 capital facilities bond. It was among several projects in Phase I of the district's Facilities Master Plan.

Budget Corner

ADVISORY COMMITTEE TO DEVELOP BUDGET RECOMMENATIONS

Schools in Washington State are not fully funded by state and federal allocations. Budget reductions become necessary when local revenues (primarily tax levies) cannot make up the difference. This year (2008-09) BISD reduced expenditures by \$1.5 million to maintain a balanced budget.

With the Governor's current budget proposals, the district expects more dramatic funding decreases in 2009-10. Therefore, the District Budget Advisory Committee, composed of staff and citizen representatives, began its work on the 2009-10 budget last October. Using continually updated district financial and enrollment reports, district policies, and the latest state and federal allocation information, their objective is to develop a budget recommendation for the upcoming year that reflects the district's goal of providing an outstanding public school education.

BOND MEASURE TO FUND ONGOING ESSENTIAL RENOVATIONS

The comprehensive Facilities Master Plan reflects extensive committee research and public input and provides an implementation plan for the district's facility needs through 2015. With Phase I of this plan coming to completion, the Board is planning to place a bond measure on the May 19 ballot to fund Phase II. This would not increase the tax rate.

The proposal includes: ongoing essential renovations to worn-out roofing, electrical and heating systems district-wide; improving energy efficiency and sustainability to reduce operating costs; addressing ongoing life, health and safety issues at all schools; and replacing Wilkes Elementary School, which is 50 years old and beyond its functional life.

want to preserve our island environment. They work to raise awareness of the costs and benefits of daily behaviors, for example, the negative impact of throwing away half-empty water bottles or the advantages of biking to school. Students also influence policy at city hall by speaking out for the pristine nature of Blakely Harbor or an under-the-street filtration system.

To create a sustainable campus, three years ago ESC set an ambitious goal: to reduce trash on campus 50% by 2010. To achieve this goal, ESC volunteers have written six grants to raise money for a high-tech composter. They have also asked that paper trays be replaced with reusable plastic trays. The new 200 building has helped, too. It was designed with sustainability in mind, and now the kids think they may reach their goal a year early. The success of this ambitious effort demonstrates that anyone, no matter how old or young, can "be the change."
