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#### **Tests and Grades**

**Grading:** A=90-100 B=80-89 C=70-79 D=65-69 F=below 65 I=incomplete Grading follows the policies of Biloxi Public Schools. A mid-term progress report and a report card following the end of each term are issued.

**Retesting:** Students who fail or do poorly on a **TEST** grade will be given multiple reteach opportunities. At the end of the term, students will have the opportunity to RETEST on his or her lowest test grade.

**Homework/Assignments/Projects:** The teacher reserves the right to assign homework as needed. Projects and homework should be completed by the assigned due date.

Late Work: Work will be accepted until the end of the term. Just communicate with your teacher.

**Objectives:** This is a general overview of what the teacher will teach and what the student is expected to master over the course of the school year.

## Literature

**Course Requirements:** Students are required to complete all homework assignments, projects, and assigned class novel. The student must master all objectives with 65% mastery to pass the term.

**iReady:** Students will complete lessons and standard mastery during school hours. Standards mastery assignments may count as activity grades.

**Accelerated Reader**: Students will be given an AR goal based on his or her STAR test. Students should work to meet all AR goals set by the end of the term. The AR goal average will count as an activity grade.
