National Merit Finalist

Boscobel Area Schools is proud to announce that Jonah Troxel, son of Jason and Stacey Troxel, has been named as a Semifinalist in the 2024 National Merit Scholarship Program. As a Semifinalist in this competition, Jonah has taken the opportunity to continue in the competition for National Merit Scholarships that will be offered next spring. The purpose of the National Merit Scholarship Program is to honor the nation's scholastic champions and encourage the pursuit of academic excellence.

Jonah is now entered into the National Merit Finalist competition. To become a Finalist, the Semifinalist and a high school official must submit a detailed scholarship application. The student must have an outstanding academic record through high school, be endorsed and recommended by the school, write an essay, and earn an ACT score that confirms the student's earlier performance on the qualifying. Jonah scored in the 99th percentile for the PSAT. He also scored in the 99th percentile for the ACT.

Jonah has not only excelled academically, he has been very active in our school. Jonah is a part of Band, Choir, Boscobel Honor Society, Cross Country, and our Math Team. He has competed in Solos and Ensembles on all levels, District Honors Band and Choir, Madrigal, and has earned the Award of Excellence at the SWAL Math Competition.

WHAT IS AN SRO?

SRO stands for School Resource Officer. Our district's resource officer is Mr. Brad Raasch of the Boscobel Police Department. SROs support and facilitate the educational process by providing a safe and secure environment by building meaningful relationships with students, staff, families, and the community.

Officer Raasch has been with the Boscobel Police Department for four and a half years. He is a 2012 graduate of Westby High School and a spring 2016 graduate of the Western Technical College Police Academy of La Crosse. Officer Raasch also serves as a WIAA baseball and wrestling official. He enjoys the outdoors walking with his wife and two dogs. His hobbies include hunting, hiking, fishing, and working out.



THE ROLE OF AN SRO

SROs proactively interact with the school community to ensure the enforcement of city and state laws; preservation of public order; protection of life; and prevention, detection, or investigation of crime. The primary role of this liaison program is to work effectively with students, families, school personnel, and community agencies to support safe teaching and learning in schools. One of the primary roles of the SROs is to foster a positive school climate through relationship-building and preventative education. Officers engage in various activities in consultation with school administration, staff, and the community to build a school culture of open communication and trust between and among students and adults. The SRO works with teachers and administrators to identify students who may be facing challenges and need additional resources or attention to be successful in and out of the school setting. The SRO will conduct crime prevention activities including foot patrols, investigating crimes, and patrolling the parking lots. The SRO assists with emergency response plans and security for the physical safety of people, the school property and facilities. Often times you will see our SRO at school and community events and they are present at all school dances.

FUNDING

Fund 80 is used to account for activities such as adult education, community recreation programs such as evening swimming pool operation and softball leagues, elderly food service programs, non-special education preschool, daycare services, and other programs that are not elementary and secondary educational programs but have the primary function of serving the community. Districts may adopt a separate tax levy for this fund. Boscobel Area School District adopted a separate tax levy for the City's summer recreation program and a School Resource Officer in the amount of \$15,000.

The seventh grade students took a walk to study the metric system. As they walked, they converted their distances from meters into dekameters, hectometers, and kilometers.



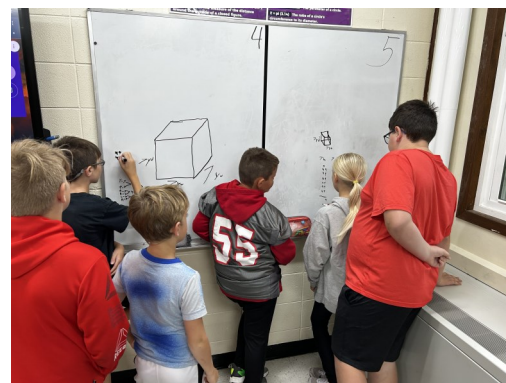
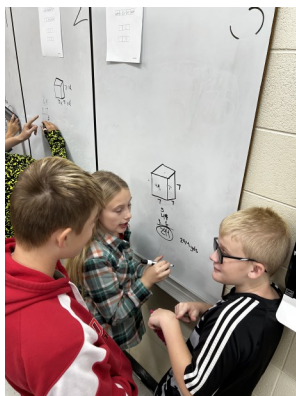
Mentoring Day Trip

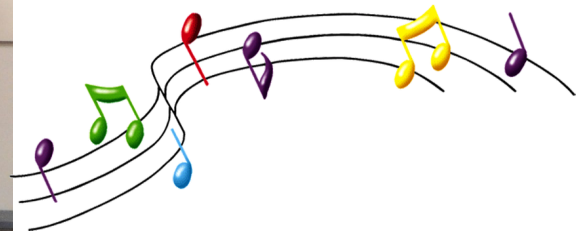


Fall Concert

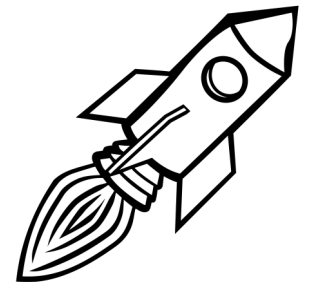

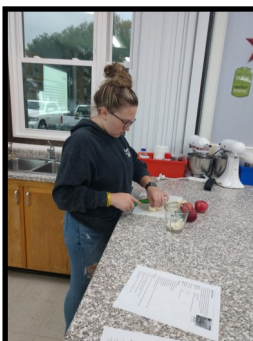

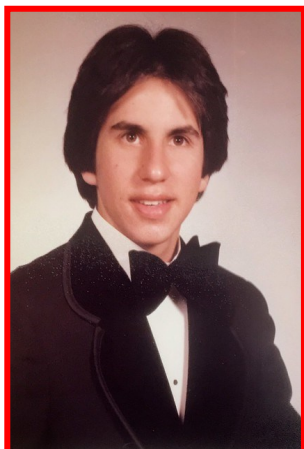

Halloween Snapshots



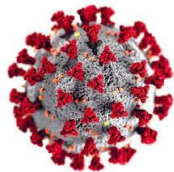
Halloween Party

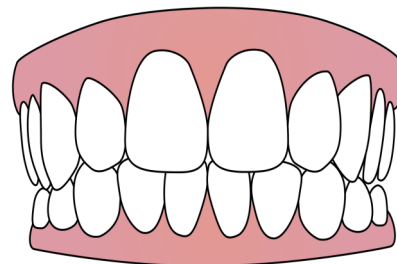

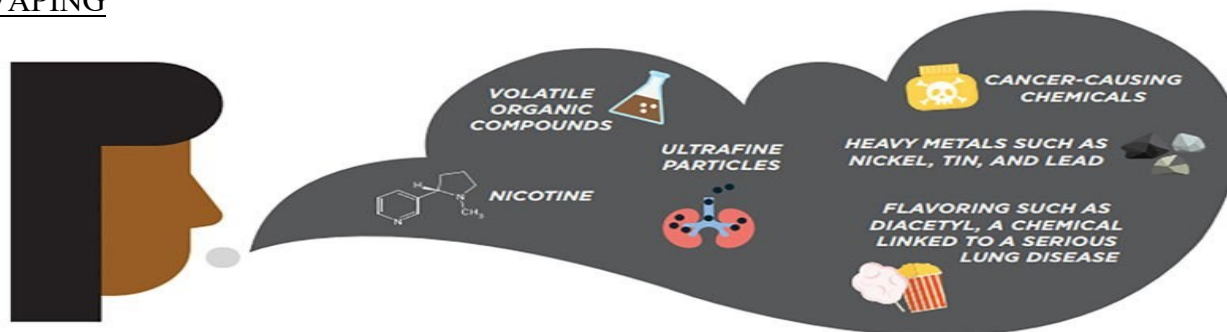
While the fall season will bring increases in respiratory viral and other illnesses to the school setting, there are several everyday actions that families and schools can take to help prevent the spread of germs.

- Encouraging students and staff to stay home when sick (including staying at home for 24 hours after fever is gone)
- Reinforcing and teaching children to cover [coughs and sneezes](#)
- Reinforcing and giving opportunities for [proper handwashing](#)

DENTAL HEALTH: Teeth-For-Life offers a preventive dental program for students in the district. A dental provider comes to the school to provide the services. The program includes: dental cleaning assessment to determine if sealants can be done, sealants if appropriate, a fluoride varnish treatment, and oral health education with a new toothbrush. A follow-up letter will be sent home to describe what was completed and what is recommended for future needs. All procedures will follow recommendations from the American Dental Association and Center for Disease Control and Prevention's recommendations for school-based dental sealant programs. Services do NOT include a dental exam or dental x-rays, therefore a visit to a dentist at least once a year is recommended. If you would like a permission form, please contact the school nurse.



VAPING



What's the Bottom Line on the Risks of E-cigarettes for Kids, Teens, and Young Adults?

- The use of e-cigarettes is unsafe for kids, teens, and young adults.
 - Most e-cigarettes contain nicotine. Nicotine is highly addictive and can harm adolescent brain development, which continues into the early to mid-20s.
 - E-cigarettes can contain other harmful substances besides nicotine.
- Young people who use e-cigarettes may be more likely to smoke cigarettes in the future.

Notes from the Nurse cont...

Why Is Nicotine Unsafe for Kids, Teens, and Young Adults?

- Most e-cigarettes contain nicotine—the addictive drug in regular cigarettes, cigars, and other tobacco products.
- A recent CDC study found that 99% of the e-cigarettes sold in assessed venues in the United States contained nicotine.
- Some e-cigarette labels do not disclose that they contain nicotine, and some e-cigarettes marketed as containing 0% nicotine have been found to contain nicotine.
- Nicotine can harm the developing adolescent brain. The brain keeps developing until about age 25.
 - ◊ Using nicotine in adolescence can harm the parts of the brain that control attention, learning, mood, and impulse control.
 - ◊ Each time a new memory is created or a new skill is learned, stronger connections – or synapses – are built between brain cells. Young people’s brains build synapses faster than adult brains. Nicotine changes the way these synapses are formed.
- Using nicotine in adolescence may also increase risk for future addiction to other drugs.

What Is in E-cigarette Aerosol?

- E-cigarette aerosol is NOT harmless “water vapor.”
- The e-cigarette aerosol that users breathe from the device and exhale can contain harmful and potentially harmful substances, including:
 - * Nicotine
 - * Ultrafine particles that can be inhaled deep into the lungs
 - * Flavorings such as diacetyl, a chemical linked to a serious lung disease
 - * Volatile organic compounds
 - * Cancer-causing chemicals
 - * Heavy metals such as nickel, tin, and lead¹
- The aerosol that users inhale and exhale from e-cigarettes can expose both themselves and bystanders to harmful substances.
- It is difficult for consumers to know what e-cigarette products contain. For example, some e-cigarettes marketed as containing zero percent nicotine have been found to contain nicotine.

MEDICATIONS AT SCHOOL: All medications (other than medications *with prior approval*, such as rescue medications or things such as lip balm) must be secured (typically in the nursing office) at school, and ALL medications require consents. This includes lip balm, sunscreen, bug spray, cough drops, etc. Consents must be completed for both over-the-counter (non-prescription) medications and for prescription medications. Prescription consents require the practitioner’s signature in addition to the parent/guardian’s signature. All medications must come to school in the original packaging and dosing must be per label/package directions. Dosing other than package instructions will require a practitioner signature. The school does not provide any over-the-counter medications for students. Medication consent forms are available from the nursing office or on our district website.
