We have a greenhouse that assures healthy options in our cafeteria, and our students continue to excel in academics, the arts, and athletics.

Through the support of our Board of Education and terrific administrative staff, we continue to keep the focus on our students, despite the difficult economic times. Through the unwavering support of individual Board members, mostly at their own expense, we cleaned up after Irene, repaired the tennis courts, provided prizes for the health and wellness fair and snacks for our testing teens, supported our greenhouse and school foundation, and continued to provide support and outreach for all of our programs. With their help, Bridgehampton School moves ever upward! And through the budgetary support of a wonderful community,

the building is restored to its original stateliness with the replacement of the windows. For this, and so much more, we are grateful and thankful.

There's an old joke in which a man asks a taxi cab driver, "How do you get to Carnegie Hall?" The cab driver's answer: "Practice."

Practice makes perfect, or at least, perfect practice makes perfect. Practicing the wrong way of doing something is liable to make you very good at doing it wrong. Malcolm Gladwell wrote the book *Outliers: the Story of Success*. In the book he showed what the Beatles, Bill Gates and Mozart had in common: 10,000 hours of practice. before they became famous by playing eight-hour sets in Hamburg, West Germany. Bill Gates acquired his 10,000 hours before he was 19 by practicing programming. Mozart began performing by age 3. My name is Yu-An Gan, and my English name is Renee. I'm 17 years old. I'm from Taiwan, Republic of China. Taiwan is a small, beautiful island with a population of 23 million people. I am a Taiwanese aborigine and speak Chinese, Taiwanese, Indigenous Taiwanese and English. I'm a Rotary exchange student for 2011-2012. I joined this organization because I wanted my life to be different. I was looking for a special experience where I could

learn a new language and culture and make new friends.

In Taiwan, I live with my father, mother, brother and sister in Nantou City. My dad is a police officer, and my mom is a housewife. This year, my little brother is at home with my parents and in 8th grade, and my older sister is studying in the Philippines. In Taiwan I would be in my last year of high school. I like school, and my favorite class is history.

My school in Taiwan is different from Bridgehampton. We wear uniforms and spend more time in school. Our day starts at 7:30 and ends at 4:45. We don't bring lunch because there is a kitchen in the school where we have lunch prepared. All we need to bring are our bowls and chopsticks. After lunch, students are required to take a half-hour nap. This gives us energy to study for the afternoon classes. Every day we wear uniforms. There are summer and winter uniforms, as well as a gym uniform. Students in grades 10, 11 and 12 remain together for all their classes. The teachers for each class change but not the students.

I am looking forward to a great year at Bridgehampton. I hope I will have a nice experience and will try my best.

Bridgehampton Takes a Positive Approach: PBIS

This fall, Bridgehampton launched Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS), a nationwide program that promotes positive behavior, empowers students and rewards those who set the right example. Instead of punishing students for bad behavior, PBIS encourages good behavior by motivating students to be courteous and respectful in school, at home and in the community. Teachers, administrators and staff members reinforce these behaviors by giving

students tickets or "scholar dollars," which can be redeemed for prizes, special privileges or rewards.

During the summer months, teachers Ken Giosi, Jessica Rogers, Jeffrey Neubauer, Laura Keenan and Jeff Hand worked on the PBIS program and developed the slogan, "Bridgehampton ROCKS," which underlines the school's core values: respect, organization, cooperation, kindness and safety. The program was rolled out for elementary grades in early October with the theme of safety, and continued into November with kindness. Students receive tickets for following good behavior guidelines on the bus, during morning announcements and during the school day.

Every two weeks on Hive Rocks Reward (HR2) Day, student and class winners are presented with certificates, special privileges, individual classroom prizes and, for the winning classroom, a "MEGA" recess. Escorted by Mr. Pryor and Dr. Favre, the winning class enjoys an extended recess of Music, Entertainment, Games and Activities. BULA!


When Fijian Ambassador Winston Thompson and his wife, Queenie, visited Bridgehampton School last June, they were greeted with flowers, fire dancers, the marimba band, and a chorus singing the Fijian national anthem. This joyous and proud Bridgehampton moment was the brainchild of senior Ben McLaughlin, who brought his dream of a solar-power technology classroom that might be shipped in a container to students in less fortunate parts of the world to fruition. The container, colorfully painted and signed by Bridgehampton students, faculty, administration and staff, is named "Bula-1" after the Fijian word for "hello"—and, Ben hopes, it will be the first of many such initiatives to spread across the globe, uniting different cultures and concerns for the well-being of the planet we all share with state-of-the-art technology. Plans are under way for Bula-1, with its 10 computers, chairs and desk space, to be shipped to Fiji in the coming year. Congratulations, Ben, and stay tuned, everyone, for a Bula update soon.

Seniors Win Prestigious Grant



Zave Brodie, Ben McLaughlin and Jack Janson received a \$5000 grant from the Loew's Corporation to install a 10K solar-powered system on the roof of the administration building to power a rainwater retention irrigation system for the school farm. Goals of the project are to reduce the school's reliance on finite energy resources, reduce the use of groundwater and showcase how solar energy works. Building Works at Bridgehampton School

Nineteen projects to upgrade and maintain school facilities were launched this year under the direction of Buildings and Facilities Director Robert Hauser, Head Custodian Tom Stevenson and Project Manager Ben Chaleff of the school architectural firm Chaleff & Rogers. Most projects were completed over the summer, including the replacement of all windows in the main school building with new high energy efficient ones; the reconfiguration of three suites to increase office space for guidance, athletics and the school nurse; the installation of new roofs and trim on three

outbuildings; the replacement of windows, flooring and panelling on the Pre-K building; and the pouring of new concrete walkways around the school perimeter.

Longer term projects include the enlargement and upgrade of the school cafeteria, which will move into the space previously inhabited by the

kindergarten class, and the installation of solar panels on the administration building. The repairs will increase school safety and ultimately save taxpayer dollars by decreasing costs associated with energy use.
