

New and Innovative Programming for the 2012-2013 School Year

hree exciting new courses have debuted at Bridgehampton for both middle and high school students, beginning with a long-desired elective, Digital Photography. This halfyear course offered by teacher Judiann Carmack-Fayyaz provides students with a hands-on introduction to the elements and practice of digital photography and photographic composition. Students review the history of photography, experiment with exposure, lighting and subject placement, and ultimately demonstrate skills required to compose and produce quality photographs. With practical assignments on composition, positioning, lighting, and special effects, and expert advice from visiting local professionals such as Frank Roccanova, Ellen Watson and Michael Heller from The Sag Harbor Express, students learn how to professionally plan, shoot, and process digital images.





Advanced Placement Environmental Science provides students with the principles, concepts, and methodologies required to understand the interrelationships of the natural world, to identify and analyze environmental problems both natural and human made, and to examine alternative solutions for resolving or preventing them. Following curriculum established by the College Board, the course prepares students for the AP Environmental exam. As both labs and field trips are essential to study, AP ES is taught in two-period blocks each day. This fall students toured salt marshes in East Hampton and

The South Fork Natural History Museum and Nature Center and will return in spring to note seasonal differences in the habitats. A welcome addition to Bridgehampton's array of introductory college-level courses, AP ES is, as teacher Natalie Nichols says, "a good fit for the school. We have the greenhouse here, and SoFo right up the street. The course builds naturally on what we've already begun on campus and can access right in town."

Sixth graders are up to something new this year, meeting upstairs every other day for an interdisciplinary program called **Engineering by Design**, offered by teacher Carrie McDermott. The International Technology and Engineering Educators Association (ITEEA), the professional organization for technology, innovation, design, and engineering educators, provides excellent curricula and support for technology and engineering education. Technology education is problem-based learning utilizing math, science and technology principles. We're very excited at the prospects of ITEEA programing at Bridgehampton, with its laudable goal of promoting "technological literacy for all by supporting the teaching of technology and engineering."

International Week of Peace, January 14th - 18th

Organized by teacher Carrie McDermott, this enlightening and event-filled week, with its theme of "What Does Peace Mean to Me?" culminates with an International Luncheon on January 18th, with a sampling of homemade foods from around the world. High school activities include an essay contest, poetry readings, and the creation of a banner featuring the word "peace" in many languages by Biana Stepanian's French students. Elementary students prepare international dishes in culinary arts, and create drawings, PowerPoint presentations and posters. Not to mention a special international lunch menu in the school cafeteria for the week!

DIGNITY FOR ALL STUDENTS

he Dignity for all Students Act (DASA) is a new, unfunded mandate, requiring schools to assure anti-bullying diversity training for all students. While this type of instruction has been a great part of the fabric of the Bridgehampton School Community through the efforts of our health teacher, Steve Meyers, we have worked together to assure

more opportunities for character education infused throughout the school community. Our elementary teacher, Jessica Rodgers, has been appointed our DASA coordinator and attends area trainings to keep us on track.

Our third- and fourth-grade girls were provided the opportunity to work with Catherine Arcure from Manhattan Manners with funding provided through the Bridgehampton Education Foundation. Renamed "the ladies who lunch," the students received weekly lessons in the social graces over a lovely snack delivered on fine china. Areas of focus included but were not limited to manners, appropriate behavior and kindness.

Secondary students have participated in monthly workshops on anti-bullying and character education designed and implemented by our own teachers. Students have had the opportunity to work through bullying and harassment issues, and address topics such as tolerance, respect for others, and dealing with difficult situations that may arise. Students are responsive, and strategies are used to assure that all feel heard and opinions are valued.

PBIS Update

Bridgehampton's Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports program, rolled out for K-6 students last fall, is now in its second successful year, teaching and rewarding its core value ROCKS themes of Respect, Organization, Cooperation, Kindness and Safety. This year, themes are taught site-specifically, successively underscoring appropriate behaviors in locations such as the café, the hallways, the playground or the bus.

New this year is an extension of the program to middle and high school, focusing on core values of Respect, Responsibility, and Ready to Learn. "Swarming" on key behaviors such as keeping lockers closed, being on time to class and using appropriate language, fac-

ulty and staff reward students with tickets for doing the right thing. These tickets are entered into monthly prize drawings—such as lunch generously provided by Candy Kitchen, Mickey B's or The Pizza Place or a \$15 iTunes gift card—or into a big end-of-semester raffle. This semester's lucky winner receives an iPod!

At Film Fest, Chance to Meet Nobel Laureate

In October, high school students viewed a screening of *A Beautiful Mind*, 2001 Academy Award winner for Best Picture, at the UA Theater in East Hampton. Featured in a Hamptons International Film Festival program in partner-

ship with an exhibition of 20 photographs of Nobel Laureates by Peter Badge, the film, starring Russell Crowe, follows celebrated mathematician John Nash from his prodigy days at Princeton University through his early break-

throughs and charts his lifelong struggle with paranoid schizophrenia. Nash, present for the screening, commented on the film and his life alongside his wife of 50 years, and met with students and faculty.

THIRD ANNUAL RACE AGAINST TIME



n Sunday, October 14, Bridgehampton seniors and staff joined teacher Steve Meyer and his family in Central Park for a show of support for Steve's nephew Owen McGee, who was diagnosed this summer, 3 weeks before his 3rd birthday, with Duchenne Muscular Dystrophy (DMD). Part of New York Road Runner's Greta's Gallop event, Race Against Time includes a 100m troll stroll for kids 2-12, a 1.7 mile run and a half marathon DMD is the most common fatal genetic disorder affecting boys around the world.

Boys with DMD do not produce dystrophin, a protein required for muscle function; as a result, every muscle in the body begins to deteriorate. At present, most children with DMD are in a wheelchair by 12 vears old and will die in their late teens or early twenties. Proceeds from the annual event benefit Charley's Fund (www.charleysfund.org), which specializes in finding a cure for DMD. They make sure money is directed to the right researchers and the right laboratories and have made huge gains in this fight against time.

Students Collect Oral Histories at the Senior Center

In collaboration with the Hampton Library and the Bridge-hampton Historical Society, 8 high school students traveled with teacher Tom House to the Senior Center on Thursday, November 29 to collect oral histories of the Hurricane of '38. On hand to coordinate the day were adult outreach librarian Marcia Mitrowski, local history librarian

and archivist Julie Greene, and Senior Center assistant site manager Lorri Schneider. Student interviewers and recorders were Aries Cooks, Josh Lamison, Jhon Matute, Ella Gatfield, Dylan Breault, Juan Yanez, Michael Smith, and Erick Saldivar. A culminating project will be presented in 2013 at Hampton Library on the 75th anniversary of the storm.

LENDING A HAND IN EAST ROCKAWAY

n Thanksgiving Eve, 31 Bridgehampton students, staff and faculty members devoted the first day of the long weekend to a relief effort in a hurricane-devastated hamlet of East Rockaway known as Bay Park, 80 miles west of school. The trip, organized by David Holmes, aided four venues-three private homes, including that of Linda and George D'Agostino, and the Bay Park Civic Center. Teams of volunteers removed moldy drywall from flood-ravaged first-floor walls, emptied rooms and a garage of ruined furniture and appliances, and sodden books, files and photographs, hauled 8 x 4 panels of new Sheetrock into a gutted basement, and raked the ground beneath exposed floor-boards free of debris.

Bees were able to do the most good at the Civic Center, which hadn't been opened since the storm. The town's residents had taken great pride in the center; it was the heart and soul of the community. One team spent hours disassembling its demolished stairs and entrance ramp into pieces that could be dragged

to the street, while another worked inside, emptying the office and rooms of appliances, file cabinets, and other destroyed furnishings. The D'Agostinos and the president of the Bay Park Civic Association, Rich Brennan, surveyed the extent of the work accomplished in four hours and were, in their own words, "amazed" and "boundlessly grateful." Linda stressed just how important the work at the center had been. "The few of us here have been concentrating on our own homes. But the Center was the community's home." Bridgehampton had gotten its cleanup started for them, and it would be an encouragement to the other residents to come back.
