# Suffolk County Class D Champions!

s the newly declared 2012 Suffolk County Class D Champions, the Killer Bees will be adding a new banner to the highly decorated walls of the gymnasium this summer, the first Suffolk County championship banner for the Bees since 2000. After a 7-7 season, the underdog team pulled together to win playoff games against very strong contenders, overpowering both the defending Class D Champions, the Ross Cosmos, at Pierson School, 72-62, and the Greenport Porters at Suffolk Community College, 73-50.

In March, the Bees travelled to the Southeast Regional Class D Championships in New Paltz to face Livingston Manor. The deep bench of Livingston Manor and the relative inexperience of the seven-strong Bridgehampton team led to a Livingston Manor victory, 69-53, and ended the run for the state title.

On April 24th, 2012 at the County Center in Riverhead, the team was honored by Assemblyman Jay Schneider-

man, who presented them with a New York State Proclamation. "The coaching and the strategic perception of the players, together with the camaraderie and skill of each team member are to be commended," Legislator Schneiderman said.

Coach Carl Johnson, whose main goal for the year was to make the playoffs, was very pleased with the victorious season and the Class D title. With such a young team--two of the starters, Tylik Furman and Joshua Lamison, were eighth graders--Johnson's new

Brenden Hemby, a four-year team member, will be remembered for his enthusiastic leadership qualities as team captain for the past two years; and Zave Brodie, who came to every practice ready to contribute in every way, will be remembered for his dedication and great attitude. pring has arrived in all its splendor and promise of renewal, and with it comes much excitement and celebration at the Bridgehampton School. We are ready for our budget hearing, election and

vote as this goes to print, and we appreciate the input of our community, the agreement to a zero percent salary increase by our staff (administration, teachers and civil service personnel), and the attention to detail by our Board of Education as we, once again, bring

a fiscally sound budget to the community.

Accountability abounds as we complete this round of state tests, akin to driving by braille. We were provided little in the way of what to expect for our K-8 students, and, judging by the many mistakes, misprints, and dilemmas that arose as the tests rolled out, we are not confident that they will provide us with the information the state believes they will in terms of student achievement. > will do the same for all other content areas to assure that we know exactly what our students need to meet or exceed state standards.

> Our Middle States Accreditation Visit was moved to May 15-17th, when we will host the evaluation team. We look forward to celebrat-

ing our many accomplishments as well as our action plans for success. The stakeholder group—administrators, teachers, parents and students who assisted with the completion of the self-review process—is to be commended for its work in seeing this through to fruition. The team has developed a plan that will assist us in moving from "good to great," and they are to be commended for their efforts. The plan can be reviewed on our website.

# Bridgehampton School Accepts Pay Freezes

This spring, in a show of solidarity with an administration struggling to draft a budget that would stay within the new, state-mandated 2 percent tax-levy cap, and keep programs and staffing levels intact for 2012-13, teachers and staff agreed to pay freezes.

Bridgehampton Teachers Association and the Civil Services Employee Association will extend their current contracts for one year, and freeze cost-of-living increases. Teachers also have agreed to freeze their step increases. Savings from freezing teacher salaries alone will save the district approximately \$100,000. Total savings to the district will be even more

substantial when the foregone salary increases of staff and administration, who also agreed to a one-year freeze, are calculated.

"I am just so proud of the Bridgehampton community, which locked arms and came together civilly on both sides of the table," Superintendent Dr. Favre said. "I am proud that the BTA and the CSEA have agreed to support us and get us through this first year." District business administrator Robert Hauser added, "It's important from a solidarity point of view, that we are united going into this. And from an instructional point of view, it puts the students first."

# Bridgehampton's Edible School Garden and Greenhouse Project Wins Honorable Mention in 2012 Magna Awards

Bridgehampton School received an honorable mention for the district's Edible School Garden and Greenhouse Project in the American School Board Journal's (ASBJ) 18th annual Magna Awards program. The Magna Awards recognize districts across the country for outstanding programs that advance student learning and encourage community involvement in schools.

The Edible School Garden Project teaches students in elementary through high school about what real food is, where it comes



from, and how to grow it. Students grow vegetables and fresh produce for the school cafeteria and for area restaurants. The greenhouse, along with a sustainable garden, provides hands-on student learning opportunities in botany, horticulture, nutrition and culinary arts and has led to the development of a curriculum focused on related careers. The greenhouse and garden have produced healthier meal options in the cafeteria and have led to an increased awareness of healthy eating practices.

ASBJ initiated the Magna Awards in 1995 to recognize school boards for taking bold and innovative steps to improve their educational programs. The 2012 winners, who were formally recognized on April 21st at the Best Practices for School Leaders Luncheon, were selected from over 300 submissions from 44 states.



# BUILDING BETTER BRAINS AT BRIDGEHAMPTON

A recent *New York Times* article by Gretchen Reynolds, *How Exercise Can Lead to a Better Brain*, recounts how in the past few months neuroscientists have discovered that exercise "builds a brain that resists physical shrinkage and enhances cognitive flexibility." Since building better brains is our job at Bridgehampton, the athletic department, headed by Mary Anne Jules and Steve Meyers, initiated a

three-week "Step into Spring Challenge," in which faculty and students paired up to compete for the most steps. Equipped with HealthCorps pedometers, participants in the Challenge were encouraged to walk a minimum of 10,000 steps each day, the recommended amount. All that exercise produced many endorphins and invigorated brains. Great smart fun was had by all!

### Winners of "Step Into Spring Challenge" were:

**1st place:** Laura Uribe and Robin Gianis with a total of 632,717 steps or 316.35 miles. **2nd place:** Juan Jimenez and Jodi Zulkofske with a total of 622,574 steps or 311.29 miles. **3rd place:** Matthew Hostetter and Tom Stevenson with a total of 462,510 steps or 231.25 miles.

### Building Works: Sunny Days Ahead as Bridgehampton Goes Solar

10K photovoltaic (PV) energy system was installed on the south-facing roof of the administration building last month, culminating a project by students Ben McLaughlin, Jack Janson and Zave Brodie and energy consultant Brian Tymann of SunStream USA. Two years ago, the students were asked to design a solar-powered irrigation system to water the vegetable beds and field behind the school for their Advanced Environmental Design Projects class. With great instructional assistance from Tymann, Ben, Jack and Zave determined that tying a solar power or PV system to the LIPA grid would be much more economical than directly powering an appliance, as LIPA offers substantial rebates to systems that can feed unused electricity generated by the panels back into the "grid" system for others to use.

With a very generous donation of labor from SunStream,

a \$5,000 Toolbox grant from Loew's Corporation, LIPA rebates and a school district contribution of \$4,500, the installation of the 10K system became possible this past winter. As a result, the district will save approximately \$2,500 a year in electrical costs for the next twenty to thirty years and will more than recover its initial investment in under two. Not only will there be financial savings, but the inverter and meters have been located at ground level outside the administration building, so they can serve as future educational tools for our students.

At present, the irrigation system, funded by a grant from BOCES and a donation of labor from Steve McGarry Sprinklers, is up and running, irrigating the produce grown for the school cafeteria. And the meters are spinning forward, creating energy whenever the sun shines brightly.

much of her inspiration for writing the paper from Bridgehampton students; "their theatricality, their need for handson activities, and their visceral response to drama"

motivated her to keep delving into performancebased learning and to find those exercises that would keep them engaged with Shakespeare--literally standing on their feet. Congratulations, Lenore!
