From the Desk of the Superintendent/Principal

DR. LOIS R. FAVRE

Spring seems to be taking its own sweet time arriving this year – and as I write, it is still only sneaking up on us! Spring has certainly been in the air at Bridgehampton School, during practices and performances for *Snoopy the Musical*, filling our halls with the talented voices of our students. Such a joy!

Spring is a time for renewal and we can certainly use it after the year of outrage about public education – such a sad state of affairs for a country that has built a reputation on assuring that all students receive a free and appropriate public education. At Bridgehampton, we have taken on the challenge of raising standards for our children (never a bad thing) – and we are doing it using data to inform our decision making, combined with the exper-



tise of our teachers who know where our students are and where we need them to go. Soon parents will receive the results of state tests, geared to the new standards that students are working to achieve. It will take some time to reach a level of excellence with the new standards, and while we know we will arrive, until such time that we do, we must assure that we use the test scores to grow – and only to grow – from the results; that is our ultimate goal. If this movement has done nothing else, it has focused our efforts on teaching and learning – exactly where our efforts should be.

It's hard to believe we are in the fourth quarter of my first year as your Superintendent/Principal. The time has gone by very quickly. I can say that it has been a terrific year overall. It has been a delight to

serve the community in this capacity and have the opportunity to spend more time with the students, and develop stronger relationships with the teachers and our families. As the Spring newsletter arrives, it tells us that the end of another school year is upon us. We hope that you will join us for our Spring concerts, award ceremonies, and for our graduation as we send our next group of students out to college, career, service or workplace – ultimately ready for having been a part of our supportive school community.

May the spirit of Spring renewal stay with you throughout the year! Thank you for all that you do to support the Bridgehampton School Community.

Budget 2014-2015

With input from the Community Budget Forum, the Bridgehampton Board of Education voted unanimously to pierce the state-imposed tax levy limit this year. With the levy limit set at the Consumer Price Index (CPI) of 1.46%, to remain within the levy limits would mean that the district could only rise an additional \$321, 489 over last year's budget.

Annually the district collects money for the Bridgehampton Child Care and Recreation Center through the school budget. The amount for this year is \$160,000, which must be included in the budget. Adding to that further increases not in our control (such as increases in health benefits, teachers' retirement, BOCES transportation and special education services in out-of-dis-

trict placements), we were well over the levy limit without any additional considerations. Thirdly, as with any household budget, there are annual shifts in operating costs (such as fuel increases due to the difficult winter), increases in shared sports services, social security, technology needs, and normal increases in materials and supplies. These further impact the budget process. The total impact of all of these increases added more than one million dollars to the budget.

The Board of Education is always attentive to the needs of our students, followed closely by the needs of the Bridgehampton Community. Keeping within the levy limitations means cuts of more than one million dollars. This means

cut to programs and staffing, making it difficult for us to run programs with highly qualified teachers, as required by the State Education Department. Feedback provided to the Board from the Community Forum indicated that the relative increase to taxpayers (less than \$50 a year for a \$500,000 home) would be negligible, while keeping within the limit would be devastating to all that the Board has worked so hard to maintain.

The budget vote is set for May 20th from 2PM-8PM in the Bridgehampton School gymnasium. To pass the budget increase requires more than 60% of voters to vote yes. Our students deserve a viable program, and the Board is committed to assuring just that.

On March 12th, the team gave a 2-hour video conference presentation with Q-and-A to the NYS PBIS Technical Assistance Center. Approximately twenty behavioral specialists from across the state were on the call. The presentation’s goal was to show how PBIS is being implemented at Bridgehampton School through the use of technology, and, according to Laura Ficarra, conference facilitator, by call’s end the team had more than met it: “There are socks lying all over the floor here,” Ms. Ficarra said, “because you just blew them all off!” Bridgehampton PBIS team’s next presentation is on May 22nd and 23rd at the Northeast PBIS Network Leadership Forum at the University of Connecticut, where they have the honor of being one of two school teams representing the state.

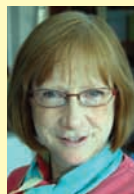

Finding Five – Embracing Remembrances of Those Who Have Passed will be published later this year by Seagull Books, the non-fiction division of Leo Publishing. The book began as an assignment in Language Teacher Nancy Bagshaw's Writing Methods class at Long Island University and is a tribute to her niece, Katy, who passed away after battling a rare form of liver cancer. Over the past several years, Ms. Bagshaw noticed that books which address bereavement – es-

"While I could find books about saying goodbye and books about where people go when they pass on," she explained, "I could find none that focus on the connection which is not diminished by death. My personal hope is that readers will be inspired to take note of what the people around them love, thus forming stronger connections in the present." AN INSPIRING TRIP TO THE GUGGENHEIM

Art teacher Robin Gianis and Technology teacher Judiann Carmack Fayyaz took 24 Art, Environmental Design and Digital Photography students in grades 8 through 12 to The Guggenheim Museum on Friday, March 28th to view current exhibits and participate in a museum-led workshop. One of the main exhibits, to which the workshop was linked, was *Italian Futurism, 1909–1944: Reconstructing the Universe*, the first comprehensive overview of Italian Futurism to be presented in the United States. The multidisciplinary exhibition encompassed painting, sculpture, architecture, design, ceramics, fashion, film, photography, advertising, free-form poetry, publications, music, theater and performance. Photography students also explored another exhibit on view, *Carrie Mae Weems: Three Decades of Photography and Video*. Back at school, students responded

ed to the exhibits in writing, made acrylic paintings in the Italian Futurist style and, in Ceramics class, molded futurist-inspired teapots.

"I was very intrigued by Carrie Mae Weems and her exhibition," wrote eighth grader Autumn Street.

"Her struggle to have her works put in a museum was inspiring. Determination is what finally got her dream to become true. Carrie's art consisted of different forms of culture. Her Kitchen Table Series captured my attention. I start-

ed developing my own storyline about what I thought was going on in each of the photos. The actual story behind the series is that the woman falls in love with a man who wants a relationship with her, but he also wants to keep his single ways. One day, he leaves her for "the other woman." To the dismay of the lady portrayed in the photographs, she eventually has a child. At first it was very awkward for her and her daughter, since she never even wanted to be a mother. But the central character soon warms up to her daughter as she realizes that she is a mini version of her. Time goes by and the woman realizes that she doesn't need a man to be happy; all she needs is her friends, family and, most important of all, herself."

Focus on Bridgehampton Ceramicist Laura Uribe

Tenth grader Laura Uribe first started working with clay in fifth grade, traveling to the Bridgehampton home studio of ceramicist Mary Jaffe on weekends for nearly two years. Ms. Jaffe introduced Laura to spinning—"taught me on the wheel," as Laura puts it. "She showed me how to make bowls, and I wound up really liking it, so I stuck with it." Sticking with it has included two summer workshop scholarships with artist Nancy Robbins at what was formerly known as The Clay Art Guild, and the many ceramic projects she's done at school with art teacher Robin Gianis.



Clay has become Laura's favorite medium, and in Ceramics this year she's created a beautiful collection of objects, including a futurist-inspired teapot, a candleholder, a gorgeous winged clock and a pyramid-inspired sculpture.

Right now she's working on a skull, an idea proposed by classmate Jennah Hochstedler. In fact, all students have taken turns proposing projects this year. "Then we define the parameters," Ms. Gianis explained, "and each person takes that on as a problem to solve." "My proposal was the candlesticks," Laura said.

This summer holds a special challenge for Laura: she has been accepted for a summer internship in Water Mill at the prestigious Clay Arts Studio of the Hamptons. "She'll be in terrific company with the artists there," Ms. Gianis, who proposed Laura's name to the Studio, said. "Laura has the talent and experience, and

this will be a great chance for her to hone her skills." In addition to creating her own works, including a final project to be completed by summer's end, Laura will help out in the studio during the classes taught there and get a first-hand glance at what a career as an artist might look like.

Does Laura see ceramics playing a part in her future? She's not sure yet, but if she doesn't pursue it as a career, she sees herself keeping it on as a hobby. Ms. Gianis, who also loves to work in clay, chuckled knowingly: "Once you get into clay, it's hard to give it up." Good luck this summer, Laura!
