

We'll Miss You, Ms. Jules!

A Fond Farewell to Bridgehampton's Much-Loved Athletic Director

S ay it ain't so. At the peak of a stellar, 33-year career in education and administration, 32 of them spent here at Bridgehampton, our very own Ms. Mary Anne Jules is retiring this August. Her long tenure has been a gift to the school and community, and the legacy she leaves of a top-notch shared sports program is one that future classes will continue to reap the benefits of.

Mary Anne is a native of Baldwin and a graduate of Baldwin High School. She went on to Cortland State, earning a BA in Physical Education, and briefly taught PE at an elementary school in Syracuse before landing a job at Bridgehampton and returning to Long Island in 1982, where she's stayed ever since. Early in her teaching career, she completed a Masters in Elementary Education at Southampton College, and followed up with an Administrative Degree from Dowling.

When Mary Anne first came to Bridgehampton, there were three sports, Boys and Girls Basketball and Golf. Slowly but surely, she changed that, first by coaching and hosting basketball and softball, and then, in 1989, by starting a shared sports program with East Hampton and Pierson. Bees were suddenly able to play soccer, track, gymnastics, football, tennis, field hockey, wrestling; indeed,



one of her chief gratifications was watching that program grow over the years until every sport became available to Bridgehampton students.

In 1991, Mary Anne became Athletic Director, a position she thrived at for over 2 decades. Just one marker of her success: The final year of her tenure saw the largest number of middle and high school students in Bridgehampton history playing at least one sport—86 percent, far exceeding the 50-percent bar to which most schools aspire. No small part of that achievement was due to her dual role as administrator and teacher. Throughout her career, it was important for her to continue to have the opportunity to teach K-12 physical education, a passion generations of students profited from.

Awards for athletes are another of Mary Anne's legacies. She created the John Niles Award, honoring sportsmanship, leadership and dedication to athletics; the Scholar Athlete Award, recognizing athletic and academic achievement; the "Attitude Is Everything" Award, honoring a student who consistently demonstrates a positive attitude while participating on an athletic team; and the Coaches Award, commending hard work and team commitment. She also implemented the Section XI Gold Key Awards, the highest honor in Section XI an athlete can receive for sports participation, earned by those who letter in eight junior varsity or varsity seasons in grades 10 through 12. The awards are given out, along with academic awards, at the Day of Achievement ceremony in May. Mary Anne herself received one of the highest honors for Athletic Directors in Suffolk, serving as Section XI president for three years while representing the smallest school in the county. She also served as vice president of Conference IV, as treasurer of Suffolk County Athletic Directors Association and as a member on various committees of Section XI.

A primary goal throughout her career was to instill in students the knowledge that they can have an improved life through physical education and athletics, to "teach personal living skills" through PE: discipline, commitment, cohesiveness, communication, co-

fter a nail-biting budget season, the summer has been most productive. We have continued working on the projects from the five-year plan, including the adding of a storage

building on campus, which we anticipate will free up some much needed space within the main building. We have also installed a new playground that meets updated codes for safety that will be sure to delight our students. Despite the amount of work go-

ing on within the building, we were able to offer our well-received summer programs. These included Summer Musical Theatre, in which students performed Tikki Tikki Tembo, directed by Lindsey Sanchez; the Young Farmer's Program with JudiAnn Carmack Fayyaz, where students learned about food from farm to table; and finally finishing up the summer, our Jump Start program with Nancy Moloney focused on getting students reading, writing and working on math just in time for school to start again.

Books and supplies have been ordered, classrooms painted, schedules ironed out, and teacher and aide assignments updated. Summer curriculum projects have been completed by teachers to update course offerings. We begin the year proud of our acknowledgement as a top high school by US News and World Report and extremely grateful to the Bridgehampton Community that our programs

can continue again this year.

Goals for the school year include a move to a more project-based curriculum for our middle school students, aligning with common core standards and focus-

> ing on the development of skills for college and career readiness. At the elementary level we will continue our focus on data-based decision-making, including discipline data through the merging of our Response to Intervention and our Positive Behavioral In-

terventions and Supports team, making for seamless discussion on improving student achievement as well as a renewed focus on Writers Workshop to develop skills. High school goals include surveying our students for career interests and a continued focus on adding rigor and relevance to the curriculum. Internships in the community, as well as opportunities for real world application of skills remain a focus.

As the world becomes increasingly technology-dependent, we have been working toward developing responsibility with technology in our students. On a trial basis, we permitted students the use of cell phones during class time, particularly for calendar use and internet research. After a careful review of incidents from last year, a majority of referrals had to do with cell phone misuse. For next year, no students in grades K-8 may have cell phones on their person at any time during the school

For students in grades 9-10, they may take them to lunch and for our juniors and seniors it will be an upperclassmen privilege, provided they follow the guidelines we outline for them at the beginning of the year. We anticipate the roll out of a one-to-one computer initiative that will have technology in the hands of our secondary students for much of their school day. Inherent in the success of the program will be student responsibility and appropriate use of the technology.

We look forward to welcoming our teachers back to school on September 3rd and 4th for our Superintendent's Conference Days and welcoming our students back on September 8th. A Back to School Night schedule will be sent out in September. With the many changes going on in education we plan to have separate Back to School Nights for grades K-2, 3-5, 6-8 and 9-12, so we will have time to update all on our areas of focus, the common core standards, and their impact at each level. While we realize that some may need to attend more than one session, we hope to plan it in such a way as to make it as convenient as possible for our parents.

Bridgehampton High School Gets the Bronze!

n June Bridgehampton High School received a bronze medal in the US News and World Report ranking of best high schools for 2014. With the help of teachers leff Neubauer and Linda Murphy in our mathematics department and parent Jeff Mansfield, now on our Board of Education, we were able to determine that this ranking puts us in the top 10-24 percent of

the best high schools in New York State. We were the only high school on the South Fork to receive this distinc-

tion. Of the 1148 New York schools ranked, only 154 schools ranked higher than bronze. According to the report, Bridgehampton leads



(93.3%), and it is right up there with the rest of area schools in overall proficiency in English and Mathematics. We are very proud of our teachers,

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staff, students and families and of the work that is done, as a team, to assure the success of our students. The bronze medal from US News and World Report validates that hard work and assures us we are certainly headed in the right direction! Spotlight on 2006 Alumna Karess Taylor-Hughes

olumbia graduate student in Sports Management Karess Taylor-Hughes appeared at the Bridgehampton Child Care and Recreation Center on June 13th for a screening of the award-winning documentary The New Black, a version of which appeared recently on PBS. A successful and internationally recognized activist for the rights of lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender people, Karess is featured throughout the film, which highlights her advocacy work in such important and influential organizations as Equality Maryland and the Human Rights Campaign. The film, as described on its website, www.newblackfilm. com, "tells the story of how the African-American community is grappling with the gay rights issue in light of the recent gay mar-

riage movement and the fight over civil rights." It documents activists such as Karess, as well as family and clergy on both sides of the campaign to legalize gay marriage. "*The New Black* takes viewers into the pews and onto the streets and provides a seat at the kitchen table as it tells the story of the historic fight to win marriage equality in Maryland and charts the evolution of this divisive issue within the black community."

Karess was thrilled to conduct her first solo film screening in her hometown, and especially at her "old stomping ground, The Center," where as a child she'd spent her summers and just about every day after school. In a recent interview, she remarked how ironic it was that someone who had not intended to go to college-she had her eves set on the military in high school—should be on the verge of getting a Masters from an Ivy League school. She credits teacher aide and community liaison Ava Mack, former teacher Joanne Palisi and Coach Carl Johnson for encouraging her to combine her interest in sports with education. With Johnson's help, she

secured a partial athletic scholarship managing the women's basketball team at the University of Maryland, from which she earned a BS in Kinesiology and a minor in Leadership in 2010. Along the way, Karess' world has widened figuratively and literally to an extent she'd never anticipated: at just 25, she estimates that sports, education, *The New Black* and her own traveling has taken her to 27 US cities and 8 countries.

And the future looks bright, indeed. Karess finishes her Columbia degree this December and is exploring PhD programs that will combine her passions for advocacy and sports, and, as she puts it, lead to a career in "the advocacy side of sports."
