



There are roughly ten parent/student meetings throughout the year.	Academic
Brighton-Israeli Exchange	Alpa Khandhar Marla Taplinger	Open to all students to promote cultural awareness, understanding, and friendships between the U.S. and Israel. BHS has participated since 2011 in the opportunity to host students from Rochester's sister city of Modi'in to meet, spend time together, and make lasting friendships. This program is jointly sponsored by BCSD, and the Jewish Federation of Rochester intended to be a cultural and not a religious exchange.	Academic
Brighton-Oviedo Exchange	Suzanne Crowley Rachel Rivera	A school-to-to school exchange with Colegio Meres in Oviedo, Spain that takes place every two years. Spanish students visit in October/November, and BHS students travel in February of the same school year. Hosting is open to any BHS students. Travel is open to students in good academic standing who have hosted or are enrolled in a Spanish class. Our visit to Spain includes 3-4 days in Madrid and Barcelona, then a stay in Oviedo. In Oviedo, students stay with their host family for a week, attend school, visit sights in Asturias, such as the Caves of Covadonga, the city of Gijon, the city of Oviedo and other activities.	Academic
Brighton-Rennes Exchange	Jessica Beh	The Rennes Exchange is a school-to-school exchange with Lycée Sévigné that takes place every two years. French students visit for 10 days in October/November, and BHS students travel in March/April of the same school year. Hosting is open to all BHS students. Travel is open to students in good academic standing who have hosted or are enrolled in a French or science class. Our visit to France includes 2-3 days in Paris with a trip to Versailles on our way to Rennes. In Rennes, students stay with their host family for a week, attend school, visit Normandy beaches, WWII museum, Mont Saint-Michel, and the city of Rennes. There are approximately five parent/student meetings throughout the year.	Academic
Brighton on Board Club	Lance Mitchell	Open to all students of all skill levels; Brighton on Board meets on Fridays after school in the lower library to play an assortment of the current and vintage popular board/card games, such as Coup, Settlers of Catan, Duel, Ticket to Ride, Dungeons & Dragons, and Machi Koro. We also play classics, such as Magic/Yu-Gi-Oh card games, Sorry, Monopoly, Battleship, Risk, UNO, Wizards, Yahtzee, and Chess.	Social

All students are welcome, enrollment in chemistry is not required. We can explore the chemistry of food, make elephant toothpaste, slime, and bouncy balls. Our experiments will be guided by student interest and choice. For the Teen Science Café, students invite local scientists to engage in lively conversations and explore a topic deeply. Recent cafés include conversations with local scientists about the coronavirus, circadian rhythms in animals, methane deposits in the ocean, and nuclear fusion at the UR Laser Lab of Energetics. The competition is held by the U.S. and Canada on a regional, state, and bi-national level combining in-class and hands-on environmental education in a competition setting which involves a problem-solving presentation, as well as 5 written field tests (aquatic ecology; forestry; soils and land use; wildlife; and a fifth annual changing subtopic which focuses on relevant environmental issues). 500,000 students from the U.S. and Canada currently participate. 
