The 2008-09 Proposed Budget

May 1, 2008

Dear Brighton School District Resident,

The development of the 2008-09 school budget has been a challenge. As the information included in this newsletter indicates, we have tried to be fiscally responsible in the face of uncertainty, particularly with regard to expected revenues. That uncertainty has resulted in a conservative expenditure proposal that amounts to a "roll-over" budget only, preserving existing programs and services at current year levels.

The proposal we offer the community for public vote on Tuesday May 20, 2008, includes a 3.2% increase in expenditures over the current year. We believe this figure is reasonable in terms of the increase in costs our district faces in maintaining current programs. We anticipate that the proposed budget would increase our tax levy by 3.9%. The final levy and accompanying rates are not set until August each year and may vary from this estimate based on the final status of sales tax litigation and assessment figures.

We are unable to predict the actual tax rate at this time, since the Town of Brighton reassessment will not be complete until well after our budget vote. However, we are confident that the tax rate on assessed value will be lower than recent years, since assessments will be based on full market values.

We encourage you to read this document carefully and to direct any questions about the proposed budget to our superintendent or to any member of the Board. We also encourage you to vote on the proposed budget and for candidates to serve on the Board of Education. Voting will take place at Brighton High School on Tuesday, May 20, 2008 from 7:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m.



Three Part Budget Information

Proposed Budget 2008-09

New York State law requires that all public school districts present proposed budgets in a three-part format, which includes administrative, program, and capital expenditure components. Our goal in presenting proposed expenditures in this new format is to make year to year comparisons easier to understand.



Program Component

\$45,306,067 or 77.1% of budget

The program component represents the largest portion of expenditures. This component maintains all current programs and services and supports the District's mission and vision. This component provides funding for instruction and educational support services for all students. Transportation, health, library, co-curricular activities, and athletics are also included in this component.

Capital Component

\$7,083,593 or 12.0% of budget

The Capital Component includes costs associated with the operation and maintenance of the District facilities, including utilities, building and equipment repairs, and grounds maintenance. Funds are also included for principal and interest payments on capital projects.



Recommended Revenue

Brighton Central School District's revenue estimates include state aid based upon a conservative assessment of the approved New York State adopted budget and a reduced distribution of sales tax revenue based upon the pending appeal of the Appellate Division's decision regarding the County's F.A.I.R. Plan.

Employee Benefits

- Self-insuring either cooperatively or individually for Workers' Compensation, dental insurance and Blue Cross Blue/Shield health insurances

Reserve Funds

- The Brighton School District invested \$12 million in capital improvements over the past ten years through a Capital Reserve Fund without incurring additional debt.
- The Brighton School District invested \$4.8 million in technology over the past ten years through a Technology Reserve Fund without incurring additional debt.

The tax rate can not be estimated at this time due to the ongoing town-wide property reassessment, which is not expected to be completed until the end of May 2008.

Basic STAR Exemption Impact

This chart shows the estimated Basic STAR Exemption Savings based on a hypothetical home within the school district with a full value of one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000), using current assessed value with a 3.9% increase in tax levy. The basic school tax relief (STAR) exemption is authorized by section 425 of the Real Property Tax Law.

The annual budget vote for the fiscal year 2008-09 by the qualified voters of the Brighton Central School District, Monroe County, New York, will be held at Brighton High School in said district on Tuesday, May 20, 2008 between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 9:00 p.m. prevailing time in the Brighton High School, at which time the polls will be opened to vote by voting ballot or machine.

National and State Recognition

- Brighton High School was ranked #57 in *U.S. News & World Reports* first annual ranking of America's Best High Schools, www.usnews. com/highschools. Brighton High School is the only school in Monroe County to make the list of gold, silver, or bronze high schools.
- The United States Department of Education has partnered with the Brighton Central School District to promote its School 2.0 initiative based upon the collaborative process used by Brighton in defining its 2020 Vision.
- Brighton High School was selected to receive the 2007-08 Siemens Awards for Advanced Placement. Commitment to student success, dedication to the AP Program, and leadership in Advanced Placement participation and performance resulted in Brighton High School's selection from among the pool of exceptionally strong high school applicants throughout New York State.

Academic Performance

- Brighton High School had 8 finalists, 8 semifinalists, and 23 commended students in the 2008 National Merit Scholarship Competition.
- One hundred seventy-nine students at Brighton High School have earned the designation of AP Scholar by the College Board in recognition of their exceptional achievement on the college-level Advanced Placement Program Exams
- Brighton High School offers 17 Advanced Placement (AP) courses, and Syracuse University Project Advance courses in economics, statistics and calculus. In 2007, 86% of the AP exams written by Brighton students were rated 3 or higher, the level recognized for high achievement.

Visual and Performing Arts


- Editors of the Brighton High School publications, *Crossroads*, *Galaxy*, and *Trapezoid* annually receive gold and silver awards for their work in art, cover design, layout, and photography from the Empire State Scholastic Press Association.
- Over 1600 Brighton students participate in the grade 4 12 instrumental program, which includes multiple grade levels of band, orchestra, jazz ensembles, chamber groups, and instrumental lessons.
- Approximately 580 Brighton students participate in a variety of grade 4 12 choral ensembles and voice lessons.

Interscholastic Sports

- There are over 1600 student roster slots on our 86 interscholastic athletic teams, which include Modified, Freshmen, JV, and Varsity sports.
- This past year, several Brighton teams received New York State Scholar Athlete Team recognition awards including Girls' Basketball, Girls' Lacrosse, Boys' and Girls' Skiing, Girls' Soccer, Girls' Swimming, Boys' Tennis, and Boys' and Girls' Volleyball.

Monroe County Schools Budget Comparisons




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Board of Education Candidates for Three Seats

Four Proposals on May 20, 2008 Ballot

BUDGET

The budget proposition would authorize the appropriation of \$58,765,801 to meet estimated school district expenditures for the 2008-09 school year. *Approval of the budget would result in an estimated 3.9% increase in the tax levy.*

BOARD OF EDUCATION ELECTION

Voters will elect three members to the Board of Education. There are four candidates, whose names will appear on the ballot in the following order: Mark Lee, Julene Gilbert, Marvin Sachs and Linda Morrison. Voters may also write in names.

PROPOSITION #1

Capital Reserve Fund (General) Withdrawal

This proposition would authorize the withdrawal of \$1,476,000 for capital projects to include: window replacement at Council Rock Primary School, renovation of the Dark Room and equipment upgrade for the Morning Show at Twelve Corners Middle School, and wood frame window replacement at French Road Elementary School. *Approval of this proposition would not increase the budget or tax rate.*

PROPOSITION #2

Capital Reserve Fund (Technology) Withdrawal

This proposition would authorize the transfer of \$500,000 from the Capital Reserve Fund (Technology) to the District's General Operating Fund and to expend this sum from the District's General Operating Fund for computer-related equipment and software in accordance with the purposes set forth in the authorizing resolution establishing this fund. *Approval of this proposition would not increase the budget or tax rate.*

Voter Qualifications

- You must be a resident of the school district for at least 30 days immediately preceding the vote.
- You must be at least 18 years of age.
- You must be a citizen of the United States.
- You need one proof of residency such as a driver's license or non-driver's ID.
- You don't need to be registered!
