Hill hawk lands at school entrance

A new resident has made a permanent landing outside the entrance of the Hill School. A giant wooden hawk now sits perched near the doorway to welcome students, staff and visitors into the building. The hawk was hand-painted by a group of student artists as part of a Project ADEPT workshop.


The workshop, titled "Drawing is All About Problem Solving," was led by freelance artist Colin Coots during the last week of October. Coots is a renowned equine artist and has taught workshops throughout the northeastern United States. During his residency he taught students that flexibility and adaptability are necessary for creative problem solving. He helped students strengthen their individual drawing skills and connect the principles of successful drawing to achievement in other areas of life. Students' drawings were displayed on the walls for the entire school community to enjoy, as well as several portraits of the students drawn by Coots.

In addition to drawing and problem solving, the students diligently worked on painting the hawk. Directed by Coots, the students worked together to create a face and body for the bird. They used special techniques to create textured wings and feathers. Once the hawk was fully painted and constructed, the group held an official hawk-raising ceremony. The students placed the hawk outside on Oct. 28. Feel free to stop by the entrance of the Hill School to visit the hawk!

Additionally, there are concerts, the Festival of Lights and now what has become a tradition, bell ringing. We also have several school and district happenings which are featured throughout this publication.



EL Education National Conference

on Friday, Oct. 28, a group of secondary math demonstration classroom teachers from Brockport Central School District presented a master class at the Expeditionary Learning Education National Conference in Detroit,

Michigan. Teachers were encouraged to attend this professional development session titled, "Engagement + Rigor + Accountability = Student-Centered Math Instruction," presented by Keri Krull, Chris Carr, Lisa Montanaro and Tresel Vick. The Brockport team shared how they have transformed their practice to make math skills and concepts come alive. Krull and Carr led participants through a lesson that highlighted various district initiatives, such as learning targets, self-assessment and checks for understanding. They demonstrated speaking and listening protocols with rich academic discourse and higher level questioning, as well as strategic groupings with math instruction scaffolded to the same learning target. They also integrated literacy skills throughout to emphasize oral and written communication. Based on the experience and participant feedback, the presentation confirmed the value of the district's vision to be a leading, innovative and high-performing school district.

Regna says swimming has been part of his life since he was six-years-old.

"I've loved the water from a very young age," said Regna. "It's a great way to escape the world and just be me."

Swimming has been more than just a passion of Regna's, though, it's been a fundamental building block in his life.

"Being on the swim team and being with all my friends in general has made me who I am today," said Regna. "I'll continue being that person that I've transformed into. I'll carry that on with me throughout my life."

Swim Coach Scott Fake has known Regna for several years. He says Regna's dedication and willingness to go the extra mile has helped him grow as a swimmer, leading him all the way to the varsity swim team as a ninth-grader and the state championship last year.

"His hard work, dedication and personality will take him a long ways," said Fake.

Fake also said Regna's leadership skills are evident, as often times he will lead and other students will follow. Further, Fake stressed the significance of how coachable Regna is, a skill that he said will benefit Regna in his career path.

Regna already has a solid plan in place for post-graduation. He aims to earn an undergraduate degree in exercise science, followed by a doctorate in physical therapy and a specialty certification in sports medicine. Ultimately, his career goal is to work as a physical therapist for a professional sports team.

"Swimming has influenced me to go into the sports field because I love sports and that's where I want to be in life," said Regna.

Regna is currently involved in the New Visions program, where he is interning on the physical therapy floor at Unity Hospital. He observes patients receiving treatment to relearn how to walk and use their fine motor skills. He said his favorite part is seeing the progression of patients throughout the treatment.

New Visions also entails enrollment in college level courses. Regna said he is grateful for the opportunity to experience college courses, as well as for the people who have pushed him to advance to this level.

"I've had great teachers throughout all my years of school who have always pushed me academically and pushed me to do my very best," said Regna. "They recommended taking harder courses. They saw the potential in me academically and knew I had the capability to withhold the rigor of the course load."

In addition to his teachers and coaches, Regna credits his parents with being exceptional role models.

All checks must be made payable to: Brockport Continuing Education. Our office must receive all forms one week prior to first class session date. Please remember that prompt registration may reduce the likelihood of classes being cancelled due to low enrollment. You must be 18 years of age or older to be eligible to register, with the exception of those courses designed specifically for younger students.

Refunds: Refunds are provided only if a student withdraws from the class 24 hours prior to the scheduled start date. No refunds will be provided after the first class. If you join a class after the scheduled start date, the tuition will be the same amount. If a class needs to be cancelled due to maintenance or weather emergencies, no partial refund will be issued. *Refunds will be processed for courses that have been fully cancelled from our schedule for reasons such as low enrollment.* Fees for registration do not include the cost of books, materials or supplies, unless noted.

Class cancellation & confirmation: Individual cancelled classes will be rescheduled whenever possible. No refunds will be issued for classes that are not able to be rescheduled. No continuing education classes are held when Brockport schools are closed due to weather cancellations or emergency conditions. Please check the Brockport Central School website, your local TV or radio stations for cancellations. Classes will begin the week of Monday, Jan. 9, unless otherwise noted. *If you do not receive notification of cancellation, your class will be held. No confirmations are sent.*

Driving Courses

Safe Driving Techniques (five-hour course)

Effective Oct. 1, 1987, the Bureau of Motor Vehicles of the State of New York requires five hours of classroom instruction as a prerequisite for obtaining a driver's license. Applicants affected by this regulation are those applying for a first time driver's license; those applying for a driver's license because of lapse of one-year renewal grace period; and those applying for a new driver's license as a result of revocation of previous license. The five-hour training period must be completed prior to the applicant applying for a road test. Persons having completed a regular driving education course do not need this program.

The following regulations are applicable to all prospective registrants:

- Registration must be completed at the high school in person by noon on the Tuesday immediately preceding the class. There is a seven-person minimum to hold this class, so registering on time will reduce the risk of cancellation.
- Students will be admitted on a first come first serve basis.
- Applicants must be 16 years of age or older.
- Applicants must bring their valid learner's permit to register.
- Applicants must pay the \$35 registration fee upon registering and completely fill out the registration form.

Classroom instruction will be held on Wednesday evenings from 3:30 to 8:30 p.m. Dates are specified below. These classes will be held in **Brockport High School, Room 190. Students may bring a snack or lunch with them to the class.**

An official completion certificate, which is valid for one year from the day of issuance, will be awarded upon completion of the five-hour program. This certificate must be presented when applying for a road test. It does not qualify participants for reduced insurance rates.

Enrolled students will receive instruction in the classroom, behind the wheel, and on the road as required by New York State Department of Motor Vehicles. Those successfully completing the class will receive an MV285 certificate that gives the holder the privilege to receive a Class D operator's license when reaching age 17, allowing them to drive after 9 p.m. According to the NYS DMV, those who do not complete a driver's education program must wait until age 18 to drive after 9 p.m. Students must be 16 years old and hold a valid NYS Driver Permit or License to be eligible for the course. The Pre-Licensing Five-Hour Course material is included in Driver Education. The loan of a text is included in the class fee

Most insurance companies will offer a discount on compulsory car insurance upon request.

Classroom instruction - ALL students must attend ALL classroom instruction in Brockport High School Room 192 as scheduled from 3:15 – 4:45 p.m.

Detach and mail in form with a copy of permit/license.

Please note: Student must be present for the first theory class to be allowed entry into the course. Please arrive 15 minutes prior to the start of the first class. (Late arrivals will not be admitted and, if registered, will forfeit course enrollment). No early dismissals from theory class allowed.

Students must have the following for theory class:

- Permit/license
- New York State Driver Manual
- Notebook/folder
- Writing materials

Students must be prepared with the following for each car class:

- Permit/license
- Sunglasses are encouraged
- Appropriate footwear (i.e. no backless sandals)

Driving groups: will start and end at the high school student parking lot. Driving classes may be rescheduled at the instructor's discretion due to inclement weather. Should a make-up driving class be requested by a student due to extenuating circumstances, the instructor will reschedule at his discretion. Driving groups may be rescheduled to place four drivers in each time block. Every effort will be made to accommodate rescheduling conflicts. However, the instructor reserves the right to create a schedule that is most effective in terms of number of students scheduled for each driving group. Scheduling of or transportation to the road test are not included. Parents or other qualified adults should plan to devote time for enrolled students to practice the skills learned in this class. Only experience and good judgment makes a safe driver. A current NYS Learner's Permit must be brought to all classes.

Registration directions: Please send your payment, completed registration form and a copy of the student's learner's permit to the address listed below. The cost is \$446 for residents, \$466 for non-residents. The registration deadline for Session III is March 24, 2017. Please select your drive groups, listing your choices in order of preference. First priority will be given to resident seniors, then resident juniors, then underclassmen and non-residents. Every effort will be made to accommodate your request. You will be notified by e-mail or telephone and a list will be posted in the high school if you have been accepted and enrolled. If a registrant did not get into the session, they will be notified in writing and placed on a priority list for the next session.


