Dear Neighbors, Friends and Community Members,

A s one of our core beliefs states, "student, family and community engagement is critical for our success." We always welcome community feedback to guide our efforts towards continuous improvement. You may recall the districtwide climate survey we administered last spring. The purpose of the survey was to gather feedback regarding the learning environment, quality of instruction and leadership within the district. We received more than 2,600 survey responses from various stakeholders, providing us with valuable information relative to areas of strengths and room for growth within the district. Those findings have since been incorporated into our strategic plan. Now that it's approximately one year later, we would like to provide you with an update on some of the specific actions we have taken to integrate your input into our strategic plans within each school.


Parent understanding of standards and testing was a key area identified in the survey as needing more explanation and clarity. Our schools have taken multiple steps to address this issue, such as increased communication efforts. Ginther provided resources to parents during parent night, parent-teacher conferences and via the weekly principal's message. Barclay implemented a "Barclay Bulletin," designed to provide relevant information on a weekly basis. Barclay also hosted a second-grade parent information night focusing on math and language arts standards. Additionally, Oliver Middle School disseminated academic information on standards during Curriculum Night and conducted a parent exit survey following a two-day parent/ teacher conference event.

Another area noted for growth, specifically by instructional staff, was providing

struggling students with the support they need to succeed. To increase support for these students, our schools have worked diligently to enhance their Response to Intervention (RTI) programs. OMS established an RTI Task Force to redesign the RTI process using staff input and feedback. OMS teams are also piloting a Multi-Tiered System of Supports, a systemic, continuous improvement framework in which data-based problemsolving and decision making is practiced across all levels of the educational system for supporting students. The goal is to formally implement the framework in the fall of 2017. Teachers at Barclay are completing RTI documentation to describe concerns they see with students both academically and behaviorally, then student support teams are meeting to discuss concerns and brainstorm plans to achieve student and staff success. If the plans are not successful, the teams reconvene with additional personnel.

The survey results also indicated a discrepancy between the way in which Hill School students view their work habits and the way in which Hill staff view students' work habits. To increase understanding and create consistency, Hill staff have incorporated a grit and perseverance mindset into their PBIS program. "Grit moments" are featured on the morning announcements and the school hosted an assembly specifically dedicated to examples of grit both in and outside of school. I recently visited two classrooms with Mr. Broughton to award prizes to a fourth- and fifth-grade student for writing about grit. School administrators say they have already noticed a difference in Hill students' outlook on challenges and they will continue to integrate these themes into instruction. (continued on p. 2)

Lastly, survey results reported that high school students did not believe the school had high expectations for them to be leaders. In an effort to empower students, the school has worked to create new opportunities for students to showcase their leadership abilities. For instance, high school students were invited to accompany high school staff to speak to eighthgrade students about high school courses and experiences. BHS students showcased work they were proud of, talked about skills they learned in different subjects and answered questions from incoming freshmen. They also participated on a panel to discuss how we are both unique and alike.

The preceding paragraphs share only a few of the many ways we have put your feedback into action. Your input has helped inspire innovative, meaningful school change and we appreciate your contributions. Please continue to share your questions and concerns so together we can actualize our vision of being a leading, innovative, high-performing school district that graduates each student prepared for college or a career.

In closing, as you will see on the subsequent pages of this newsletter, exciting things are happening within our district daily. We continuously strive to provide an open, inclusive environment for our students and staff. We have many cultures and traditions within the 72 square miles that Brockport Central covers. And as we see our racial, ethnic, religious and socioeconomic demographic changing, I want to reiterate that each student, family, staff member and community member *matters*. We cherish the varied cultures in our community and we will continuously uphold our strategic priority that states that we (individually and collectively) have an obligation to promote a healthy, safe and secure environment.

For instance, "Breaking Down Barriers" meetings are held at the high school every Friday during second semester to tackle issues that affect the school climate. Additionally, a group of BHS students joined more than 400 students from 20 different districts to engage in activities and discussions about race at the "Roc 2 Change" summit. The summit brings students together to address diversity in schools and issues with racism. I am excited to announce that we will be hosting the next summit here in Brockport this November.

Regardless of how regional, national or international situations play out, in BCSD we will nurture, protect and celebrate all of the unique diversity in our community.

BEST in Brockport Education Foundation news



Three Brockport teams comprised of students

from the PLTW Computer Integrated Manufacturing class, the Robotics & CNC Machining class and the Robotics Club were among 64 teams that competed in the Northern NY State VEX Robotics Competition in Syracuse on Feb. 18.

Sophomores Cody Place and Nathaniel Rogers were led by team captain 11th-grader Joshua Miller, junior Nick Kline served as captain for juniors Calum Dunbar and Ethan Stott and senior Will Levchuk captained the third team, featuring seniors Connor Noble and Patrick Wilbur. Additionally, BHS technology teacher John Randolph and Ginther microcomputer maintenance technician Mike Letta mentored the students and supported them every step of the way.

Students used an intricate mix of programming, beta testing and on-site modifications to construct functioning robots to participate in this year's Vex game, Starstruck. This object of Starstruck was to attain a higher score than the opposing team by moving foam stars and cubes into different zones.

Although the three teams were eliminated in the semifinals, all students involved walked away with an abundance of knowledge, particularly the team captains. Joshua Miller said he will take the engineering, fabrication and organizational skills he learned with him to college, where he plans to study computer hardware engineering. Nick Kline said learning the knowledge of systems and how they interact with each other will benefit him in his anticipated major as well, aeronautical science, and Will Levchuk said his knowledge and application of physics has grown significantly.

Randolph and Letta said all three team captains demonstrated exceptional leadership skills throughout the process and although it was exhausting at times, they were impressed with the dedication and commitment of all team members along the way.

m HS}$ senior Madelyn Nitzenberger is the true definition of hard work and dedication. Her dream of a military career has always driven her to excel in everything she does. Her determination has paid off as she enlisted for the U.S. Navy this past October and is scheduled to ship out Aug. 15.

BHS social studies teacher Scott Hopsicker has taught Nitzenberger in multiple classes. He says Nitzenberger is kind, caring, considerate, responsible and talented.

"What makes Maddie stand out is the intensity of her work ethic," said Hopsicker. "Kids have work ethic but Maddie knows how to take it to another level. She's always striving for perfection."

Leading up to where she is today, Nitzenberger has tried a little bit of everything Brockport has to offer, from orchestra to technology to athletics. Of all the school activities she has been involved in, Nitzenberger says softball was her favorite. She began playing on a recreational league in fifth grade, then joined the school team in seventh grade. Nitzenberger used softball as far more than an extracurricular activity though; she viewed it through the lens of a career training opportunity.

The Naval Sea Cadet Corps is a program designed to teach young people ages 13 through graduation the rigors of a military training program and career opportunities with our nation's armed services.

"When I first joined, I was a very introverted person, but through the program I learned better communication skills and how to motivate and inspire others," said Nitzenberger.

Nitzenberger is now the leading petty office of her division, meaning she is in charge of more than 40 cadets. She loves watching her cadets grow and succeed.

"Being a leader is my favorite part," said Nitzenberger. "It's great to see them come out of their shell and grow not only as a cadet in the program, but also as a leader in their natural lives."

Nitzenberger's leadership skills have expanded into the classroom as well.

"To me a leader is one that is going to serve and lead by example and Maddie fits both of those perfectly," said Hopsicker.

Nitzenberger comes from a long line of military families and says joining the military is something she's always wanted to do. She is in the intelligence field of the Navy, which means she will have two years of schooling and then begin traveling.




100 days to graduation

Protocols are guidelines used by educators to structure professional conversations or learning experiences to ensure time is used efficiently, purposefully and productively. Ginther teachers use a wide variety of protocols in their classrooms to enhance student learning. A few protocols are described below.

Back-to-Back/Face-to-Face Protocol

The Back-to-Back/ Face-to-Face Protocol serves as a method to share information and gain multiple perspectives on a topic. Students in

Carousel Brainstorm Protocol



The Carousel Brainstorm Protocol allows students to share ideas while building a common vision

and vocabulary. Kylie Armstrong used this process to assess her kindergarten students' knowledge about their research topics.

Gallery Walk Protocol

A listening and speaking protocol called Gallery Walk/ Hosted Gallery Walk offers students an opportunity to share information



with others in a gallery setting. This protocol involves small-group collaboration, while making individuals responsible for learning and, when hosted, teaching. Pictured here is Jennifer Cooper's first-grade class participating in a gallery walk to view one another's opinion writing pieces.

Enrolled students will receive instruction in the classroom, behind the wheel and on the road as required by New York State Department of Motor Vehicles. Those successfully completing the class will receive an MV285 certificate that gives the holder the privilege to receive a Class D operator's license when reaching age 17, allowing them to drive after 9 p.m. Students must be 16 years old by June 26, 2017 and hold a valid NYS driver permit or license to be eligible for the course. The Pre-Licensing 5-hour Course material is included in Driver Education.

Most insurance companies will offer a discount on compulsory car insurance upon request.

<u>Classroom instruction</u> – Students must attend all 16 sessions of classroom instruction in the high school LGI. The loan of a text is included in the class fee.

Only experience and good judgment make a safe driver. A current NYS learner's permit must be brought to all classes.

The Brockport Central School District Board of Education unanimously adopted the proposed 2017-18 budget during its April 4 meeting.

Each year's budget process requires meticulous data analysis and extensive collaboration between the Board of Education, administrators, teachers and staff and this year is no different. We are pleased to present the proposed 2017-18 Brockport Central School District budget of \$78,847,223. The proposed budget aligns with our 2016-19 Strategic Plan for Continuous Academic Improvement and supports innovation and college and career readiness.

The following are on the ballot for May 16:

Proposition 1: 2017-18 Proposed budgetThe \$78.847.223 proposed budget projects

The \$78,847,223 proposed budget projects a 1.31 percent tax rate increase (the actual tax rate is set in August). The budget was balanced utilizing \$2,874,811 of fund balance and reserves and a tax levy increase of 1.95 percent. The tax levy is less than Brockport's tax levy limit (cap) of 2.59 percent. The proposed budget features an emphasis on the promotion of a healthy, safe and secure environment for students and staff.

Proposition 2: Bus purchase proposition

This proposition includes purchasing 14 buses and trading in 14. The state raid ratio is approximately 87 percent, making the net local share per bus \$11,444. The estimated average cost for the bus proposition is \$2.97 per year on a house valued at \$100,000.

Proposition 3: Capital project (Rescheduled from March 15 due to weather-related school closing.) The proposed \$19,873,000 capital project utilizes New York State Building Aid and the Capital Reserve Fund to allow completion with no additional impact to local taxes. The project focuses primarily on safety and security, including the addition and/or

modification of secure vestibules and main entryway renovations in each school. The proposed project will also reduce energy usage and enhance educational and community use of district facilities through improvements to buildings, parking lots and athletic spaces.

Board of Education trustee election

One Board of Education trustee will be elected to serve a five-year term beginning July 1, 2017. The elected trustee will fill the seat vacated by long-time board member Gary Zimmer, who is not seeking re-election when his term expires on June 30, 2017. See page V for candidate information.



Three Part Budget Summary of Expenditures


New York State law requires that school districts present the proposed budget in three parts: Administrative, Educational Program and Capital.

Administrative component – The administrative component increased 1.46 percent. Some of the increase includes the following: employee benefits across all portions of the administrative program; Board of Education: \$5,000 for increased advocacy in 2017-18; central administration: \$6,000 increase for employment advertising and \$15,000 increase for BOCES software support.

Educational program component – The educational component increased 2.74 percent. Some of the increase includes the following: employee benefits across all portions of the educational program; teaching-regular and special schools: nearly \$300,000 increase in BOCES and contractual salary increases; instructional media: \$260,000 in computer purchases to support the district initiative of 1:1 computing.

Capital component — The capital component decreased 12.62 percent. The significant change is found in the transfer to capital and debt service fund: in 2016-17 there was a one-time \$1 million wiring project along with \$1.1 million for the Monroe 2–Orleans BOCES capital project that was approved by voters in 2014. The wiring capital project is now complete and the third and final installment of the BOCES capital project is only \$225,790.



The major sources of projected revenue for the 2017-18 school year are shown in the graph. State aid accounts for 52.48 percent of revenues. The local share, which represents local property taxes and STAR, accounts for 39.05 percent of revenues. District income, which represents all other sources of revenue, accounts for 8.47 percent of revenues.

School bus proposition


The district will have a proposition to purchase replacement school buses on the ballot May 16 in an amount not to exceed \$1,242,000. The proposition includes purchasing 14 buses and trading in 14. If approved, the district will purchase seven large and seven small buses. With the purchase of buses annually, the district will continue to have the fleet of nearly 100 buses on a 8-10 year replacement schedule.

Brockport receives approximately 87.1 percent state transportation aid on school bus purchases, which means the district will receive \$1,081,782 in aid with the remaining \$160,218 local share being financed over five years (\$32,044 each year). The impact of \$32,044 on the levy is less than \$0.03 per thousand of assessed value or \$2.97/year on a \$100,000 home.


Statement of assumptions made in projecting a contingency budget, pursuant to section 2023 of the Education Law, for the 2017-18 school year, should the proposed budget be defeated.

If the school district budget is defeated twice, state law requires a Board of Education to adopt a contingency budget. A contingency budget includes only those expenditures allowed under New York State regulations. Expenditures such as certain new and replacement equipment, salary increases for certain employees and student supplies would be eliminated. There would also be mandated charges for use of school facilities by outside organizations.

What is Brockport's allowable tax levy limit?

Brockport's allowable tax levy limit is 2.59 percent for a simple majority vote. The proposed tax levy increase is 1.95 percent.

What is an "allowable tax levy limit?"

For school districts, the "tax levy limit" is the highest allowable tax levy (before exemptions) that a school district can propose as part of its annual budget for which only the approval of a simple majority of voters (more than 50 percent) is required. Any proposed tax levy amount above this limit will require budget approval by a supermajority (60 percent or more) of voters.

Essentially, the "tax levy limit" sets a threshold requiring districts to obtain a higher level of community support for a proposed tax levy above a certain amount.

However, the new legislation does not place a limit on any taxes a school district would levy to pay for expenditures related to specific "exempt" items, including some court orders, some pension costs and local capital expenditures. These items are then added to the "tax levy limit" to arrive at the "allowable" tax levy limit.

Capital Improvement Project Rescheduled from March 15 due to weather-related school closing.

Project summary

School districts must complete a building condition survey every five years in accordance with New York State regulations in which every district building is assessed by architects and engineers for its current and future functionality. This plan is submitted to the New York State Education Department. A Five-Year Capital Facilities Plan is then prepared identifying what systems should be replaced or reconstructed.

The majority of work proposed in this capital project was included in the 2015 District Building Condition Survey/Capital Facilities Five-Year Plan and/or the 2016 New York State Energy Research and Development Authority (NYSERDA) FlexTech Study.

This project will utilize State Building Aid and the Capital Reserve Fund to allow the project to be completed with no additional taxes.



Funding

The revenue necessary to fund this proposal is shown in the chart to the right. The majority of funding will be provided by New York State in the form of building aid (estimated 86.3 percent). The district will utilize \$3,300,000 from the Capital Reserve Fund, so there will be no additional impact to local taxes for this project.




Expense type

Expense types are broken down into three categories: building construction, site construction and incidentals.

Building construction refers to work done directly to school buildings.

Site construction includes work outside of the building, such as parking lots, athletic fields and playgrounds.

Incidentals include professional services and other expenses not considered direct construction such as architect and engineering, construction management, legal, financial, testing and inspection, asbestos monitoring, printing, insurance and financing costs, capitalized interest and Dormitory Authority of the State of New York (DASNY) fees.



Frequently asked questions

What is the total cost of the project?

The total cost will not exceed \$19,873,000, including all construction, site work and incidentals.

What is the annual cost to district taxpayers?

Utilization of New York State Building Aid (estimated 86.3 percent) and the Capital Reserve Fund (\$3,300,000) will allow the project to be completed with no additional taxes.

Why do a project now?

Performing work now will protect your investment and prevent further deterioration of buildings and parking areas. The timing is also fiscally responsible due to high state

building aid ratios, available capital reserve funding and low interest rates.

When will the work take place?

If approved by voters, construction is anticipated to begin in 2018 and be completed in phases during 2018 and 2019.

When was the last capital project vote that included work for school buildings?

The last vote was in September 2012 and the work was completed in phases from 2013-16.


