Summer Book Mobile gets a makeover

Students in Craig Coon's Engineering Design and Development class were tasked with an exciting new project this winter – redesigning a school bus to accommodate bookshelves for the district librarians' Summer Book Mobile.

The Summer Book Mobile is a library on wheels that travels to designated locations and allows students to check books in and out. The program made its debut last summer, with the goal of preventing the "summer slide" that tends to occur if students fail to read over the summer.

With the objective of expanding the program, BCSD librarians collaborated with the Office of Instruction and the Transportation Department to devise a plan for the new Summer Book Mobile. Last year the librarians temporarily revamped the district's food service van, which was not a permanent or ideal solution. Transitioning to a school bus will allow access to the wheelchair lift, a mechanism that will significantly simplify the process of loading and unloading the bookshelves. With an idea in place,



the group needed a team to execute the process. That's where the students came into play.

Craig Coon challenged the students in his Engineering Design and Development class to redesign the bus to accommodate the bookshelves. The class made a trip to the transportation facility to see the bus and brainstorm a plan. Their goal is to mount the bookshelves on the existing seat tracks. Armed with measuring tapes and cell phones, the students analyzed their options and took pictures and measurements. Several thought-provoking discussions ensued: "Are solar panels an option?", "Can we use magnets?" and "What about

the wiring?" were a few of the many questions considered.

The engineering students will continue the project throughout the next several months. Once they have solidified their plan, they will gather materials and kick off the construction phase. Their process is occurring in conjunction with the librarians' planning phase to schedule more Summer Book Mobile times and locations. Stay tuned for updates on this exciting collaboration!

Dear Neighbors, Friends and Community Members,





Brockport CSD receives universal pre-kindergarten grant for 2018-19

The Brockport Central School District will again offer a grant-funded universal pre-kindergarten (UPK) program. The program, with a strong focus on early learning, will start in September and follow the school calendar. Children will attend school five days a week for two and a half hours a day during morning or afternoon sessions. Since the grant requires a collaborative effort between BCSD and area childhood education agencies, some children will attend private schools, in addition to the majority of students who attend Brockport's Ginther School. All sites will use the curriculum developed by the UPK Advisory Board and will be taught by a certified teacher.

To be eligible for the UPK program, children must be four years old by Dec. 1, 2018 and be a Brockport Central School District resident. Families are responsible for making their own transportation arrangements, as transportation is not part of the New York State Education Department grant.

If your child is not yet registered to receive UPK-related mailings and should be, please call the Registrar's Office at 637-1857. Applications will be mailed in early March to all eligible families. UPK applications must be returned by the close of business on March 30.

Frequently asked questions about the program may be found on the Ginther School's website under "Academics." You may also call 637-1816 for additional information.

BHS PBIS team excels

Positive Behavioral Intervention and Supports (PBIS) is a framework of school-wide systems of support that include proactive strategies for defining, teaching and supporting appropriate student academic and social behaviors to create positive school environments.

According to www.pbis.org, "Thousands of high schools in the U.S. are engaged in implementing

PBIS... but the time needed to achieve suitable implementation at that level is consistently longer than the time reported by elementary or middle schools."

PBIS Regional Behavior Specialist Hailey Lehman shared, "Some high schools shy away from PBIS because of this challenge, but not Brockport High School. Brockport High School has embraced the tenets of PBIS and has creatively and relevantly engaged students and staff!"

To the high school's credit, other area school districts have heard about Brockport's unique and evolving PBIS work and want to learn more. Most recently, high school representatives were asked to attend Fairport High School's initial PBIS training to share their experiences and practices. Jeremy Moore, BHS assistant principal and high school PBIS Coach, presented strategies to the Red Raiders this January to help them strengthen their student support structures.



Hill Kindness Challenge

R andom acts of kindness flooded the Hill School this winter during the school's first ever Kindness Challenge. The school PBIS team challenged classes to complete kindness bingo boards throughout the month of December.

"The December Hill School Kindness Challenge was empowering and fun for both students and staff. The activities encouraged students to think and talk about why acts of kindness are important, how they affect other people, and how they have the potential to change the world in small and big ways," said Jill Corner, Hill teacher and PBIS coach.

Classrooms contributed their time and talent in a variety of ways, such as sending notes of appreciation to the janitors, helping lunchroom staff in the cafeteria, reading to younger children and writing letters and cards to recovering soldiers.

"It was inspiring to see the students joyfully participating in kindness acts," said Corner. "The Hill School learned kindness is contagious and that kindness does matter!"

Nearly all classrooms filled their kindness bingo boards. Way to go, Hill School!

Reminders

Ouick links

The district quick links are accessible by scrolling down on the homepage and clicking the icons residing in the black bar located across the middle of the page. The district quick links are Athletics, Employment, Digital Resources, Staff Directory and Calendar. The quick links for each school are accessible at the same spot on each school homepage. All five schools have the same quick links: Library, Digital Resources, Attendance, Lunch Menus and Teacher Pages.

Digital resources

One of the guick links (mentioned above) that exists on all five school websites plus the district site is Digital Resources. This page contains links to all the digital programs used within the district, such as Schoology, Infinite Campus, i-Ready, Naviance, etc. It is divided into three categories for easy navigation: students, staff and families.

Teacher pages

Teacher pages are still in the creation phase. Teacher pages from our previous website did not migrate to the new website; therefore, teachers who opt to have a page on the new site are required to attend training to ensure functionality and ADA compliance (accessibility to users of all technologies and abilities). Once the teacher pages are live, they will be accessible via the quick links on all five school websites.

Virtual Backpack

To access our Virtual Backpack, visit bcs1.org/vb. The Virtual Backpack is a collection of flyers pertaining to events and activities within the community. Since we transitioned to the new website platform, those interested in receiving Virtual Backpack notifications will need to re-subscribe. To subscribe to the Virtual Backpack, go to bcs1.org/vb and scroll down to the box at the bottom of the page. Click "Subscribe" in the top right corner of the box, then fill in your information and select the frequency in which you would like to receive notifications. If you would prefer not to subscribe, you may visit the website at any time to view current flyers in the Virtual Backpack.

A message from the 2018 NYS Teacher of the Year

Dear Brockport Friends,

It has been the honor of my life to be a teacher at the Hill School. I love my job, I love our school and I love our community. This is why my wife and I decided to move here 12 years ago. We wanted our children to grow up in our town and attend Brockport Central Schools. Many of the people I have the privilege to teach alongside of are legends in our house. I will always be proud to be part of Brockport.

As for being the 2018 New York Teacher of the Year... I am loving it. I have met so many wonderful people. I made a decision last summer after finding out that I would get this opportunity to think about how I would spend the year. After a lot of reflection, the themes of service and charity stuck out as central parts of my pedagogy. So, I have incorporated school visits into all of the trips I have been on delivering books to students purchased with the award money I was given. These visits are the most inspiring part of the honor. There is a lot to be proud of in the world of education. What I continue to find is that there are so many fine schools and educators that care. It has been a joy to be welcomed into the diversity of schools I have seen. I have tried to honor nearly every request, and it has kept me busy, but happy.

So, what are the responsibilities? The plans for upcoming months are amazing. Never in my wildest dreams did I ever expect to hold such a fun and packed schedule. I have been invited back to my Alma mater, St. Bonaventure University (Class of '93), for two days to present and spend time with their students. (I went to a Bona's game last

month, saw my mentor, Mr. Karg with his wife, Mrs. Karg, who taught second grade in Brockport for years, and was recognized by many Bonaventure alums... really cool.) Likewise, I will be at Clarion University (where I earned my master's degree, '95) in February for two days of lectures and workshops. In January, I presented with four current and former students on local history at the historic Morgan Manning House with an original script we wrote. At the end of January, our cohort will be in California with the other state teachers of the year at the Google headquarters to learn and share ideas. These are not "play days." We have about 12 hours of teacher training scheduled for each day. In April, we are guests of the president at the White House, and while in Washington, our cohort will be trained heavily. Later that month, I will be at the NYSUT (New York State United Teachers) State Conference and publishing for NYSUT in their monthly magazine. On May 5, I am getting to fulfill a bucket list dream of giving a TEDx Talk on the topic of "Space." Also scattered in there are multiple visits to schools in the cities of Rochester, Albany, Buffalo and Syracuse. At each visit I teach a lesson, incorporate a book and give each student a copy of that book. I will also visit my elementary school (Brooks Hill) in Fairport, and give about 20 presentations at St. John Fisher, Nazareth and The College at Brockport. To avoid being out of the classroom, I am doing a lot of traveling to present over February and spring breaks. Our classroom remains the most important part of the year. I love science and I am getting my "dream experience". I have been invited to space camp in Huntsville, Alabama in July to receive astronaut training. There are a lot of

other responsibilities, including committees I never expected to be on, invitations that I never dreamed would be offered, and the best part, new friends that I have made. In June, I am even the first male speaker in the history of a women's group who supports women going into the field of education. And, nestled between all of this,

However, this feeling is not generated by the award, but by the personal interactions that I am experiencing. Those interactions start with the students and teachers I work with, and the great community my family lives in. On the September 12th evening I returned to Brockport from accepting the award, my classroom door was decorated with so many beautiful statements and there on my desk were the most wonderful cards from my neighbors' classes, Karen Carges and Karen Bourg. These expressions of kindness are what have made this event in my life so special.



Cambridge University professor speaks about college readiness

Students in Don Chmielowiec's AP Environmental Science class were challenged to think at the college level during a special lesson at the high school on Jan. 2.

Dr. Robert James Asher is a professor at Cambridge University in England. He visited BHS to share his story of progressing from a student at Batavia High School to a senior lecturer and curator of the University Museum of Zoology at one of the most prestigious universities in the world. He also spoke

about Charles Darwin and the Theory of Evolution. Asher's role at Cambridge includes interviewing students for admittance into the university. He shared insight on the application process, then challenged students to answer a question he typically poses to university applicants. The question (which will not be shared due to confidentiality for future applicants) required students to think outside the box. While many struggled, the question certainly inspired creative thinking and sparked discussion amongst students.

Taste testing at BHS

Do you prefer Wegmans brand products or national brand products? Students in Mike Zale's Introduction to Marketing course put the question to the test - the taste test!

The class partnered with Wegmans to conduct taste tests during lunches in the high school on Dec. 7 as part of a market research and data analysis project. They compared five Wegmans brand products with national brands of sports drinks, lemonade, ice cream, kettle chips and apple sauce. They selected items in which there were three different brands that looked identical, such as three brands of fruit punch flavored sports drinks: Gatorade, Powerade and Wegmans MVP.

Students found that the results were varied. Many of the national brands won, but in some cases only by a small margin. Wegmans attained second place over some of the national brands as well.

After the test results were analyzed, a team from Wegmans, comprised of the manager of the Brockport Wegmans and a representative from

the corporate Wegmans brand office, attended student presentations on Jan. 12. The Wegmans team also gave a presentation of their own in which they focused on Wegmans branding. They shared that while Wegmans is interested in competing with the taste of national brands, they will not compromise their values. Their platform is "Food you feel good about," meaning they are dedicated to creating foods that are healthier and free from



artificial ingredients. For instance, in some cases where the national brands were favored over the Wegmans product, it was due to the presence of extra sugar or unhealthy ingredients.

BHS teacher Mike Zale said the Wegmans team's presentation surrounding their branding strategy aligned perfectly with the goal of the project.

Elementary partnerships

Collaboration between elementary students from different grade levels offers mutually beneficial partnerships. Younger students enjoy looking up to their older classmates and are inspired to learn new things, while older students gain a sense of empowerment and are motivated to set positive examples.



Mock Newbery Club

Twenty-five Hill students are partnering with fifth-graders from Terry Taylor Elementary School (Spencerport CSD), T.J. Connor Elementary School (Wheatland-Chili CSD) and Village Elementary School (Hilton CSD) to share their joy of reading through the Mock Newbery Club.

Librarians from the four schools collectively selected six possible Newbery contenders for club members to read, blog about and vote on for the Mock Newbery Award. This year's books include "Clayton Byrd Goes Underground" by Rita Williams-Garcia, "The First Rule of Punk" by Celia C. Perez, "Hello Universe" by Erin Entrada Kelly, "I Love You, Michael Collins" by Lauren Baratz-Logsted, "Undefeated" by Steve Sheinkin and "Wishtree" by Katherine Applegate.

Students read the contending books from October through January and periodically shared their thoughts through Schoology. The official American Library Association Newbery Award will be announced on Feb. 12. Mock Newbery Club members from all four schools will gather for a celebration at the Hill School to find out which book won the official award, as well as their own Mock Newbery winner.

What gets 85 third-grade students on stage at the same time?

Recess at lunch? Practicing a safety drill?

No, it's the long-standing tradition of Barclay Kids Rock. Barclay Kids Rock provides an opportunity for third-grade students to experience a musical performance within the school day. Each semester, Barclay music teacher Katelyn Marasco works with four classrooms of students to hone their singing voices for a community performance. Students meet with her weekly for approximately five practice sessions before they perform a live concert for their families. Each concert features three to four songs that send positive messages through whole group and individual vocal performances. While the students may be nervous in the first few practices, those butterflies disappear by the time they perform for the live audience. Last year marked the first time that Barclay Kids Rock performed at the High School Cabaret Night and they were prepared to do so again this year; however, the event was canceled due to inclement weather.

New this year is the live streaming of Barclay Kids Rock performances on Twitter. You can view videos from the Dec. 5 concert on the school Twitter feed at @BCSDBarclay. The next performance is scheduled for Feb. 13.

Driving Courses

Safe Driving Techniques (five-hour course)

Effective Oct. 1, 1987, the Bureau of Motor Vehicles of the State of New York requires five hours of classroom instruction as a prerequisite for obtaining a driver's license. Applicants affected by this regulation are those applying for a first time driver's license; those applying for a driver's license because of lapse of one-year renewal grace period; and those applying for a new driver's license as a result of revocation of previous license. The five-hour training period must be completed prior to the applicant applying for a road test. Persons having completed a regular driving education course do not need this program.

The following regulations are applicable to all prospective registrants:

- Registration must be completed at the high school in person by noon on the Tuesday immediately preceding the class. There is a seven-person minimum to hold this class, so registering on time will reduce the risk of cancellation.
- Students will be admitted on a first come first serve basis.
- Applicants must be 16 years of age or older.
- Applicants must bring their valid learner's permit to register.
- Applicants must pay the \$40 registration fee upon registering and completely fill out the registration form.

Classroom instruction will be held on Wednesday afternoons from 3:30 - 8:30 p.m. Dates are specified below. These classes will be held in Brockport High School Room 158. Students may bring a snack or lunch with them to the class.

An official completion certificate, which is valid for one year from the day of issuance, will be awarded upon completion of the five-hour program. This certificate must be presented when applying for a road test. It does not qualify participants for reduced insurance rates.

Enrolled students will receive instruction in the classroom, behind the wheel, and on the road as required by New York State Department of Motor Vehicles. Those successfully completing the class will receive an MV285 certificate that gives the holder the privilege to receive a Class D operator's license when reaching age 17, allowing them to drive after 9 p.m. Students must be 16 years old and hold a valid NYS Driver Permit or License to be eligible for the course. The Pre-Licensing 5-Hour Course material is included in Driver Education. The loan of a text is included in the class fee.

Most insurance companies will offer a discount on compulsory car insurance upon request.

Classroom instruction - ALL students must attend ALL classroom instruction in Brockport High School Room 192 as scheduled from 3:15 - 4:45 p.m.

Please note: Student must be present for the first theory class to be allowed entry into the course. Please arrive 15 minutes prior to the start of the first class. (Late arrivals will not be admitted and, if registered, will forfeit course enrollment). No early dismissals from theory class allowed.

Students must have the following for theory class:

- Permit/license
- Notebook/folder
- · Writing materials

Students must be prepared with the following for each car class:

- Permit/license
- Sunglasses are encouraged
- · Appropriate footwear (i.e. no backless sandals)

Driving groups: - will start and end at the High School student parking lot. Driving classes may be rescheduled at the instructor's discretion due to inclement weather. Should a make-up driving class be requested by a student due to extenuating circumstances, the instructor will reschedule at his discretion. Driving groups may be rescheduled to place four drivers in each time block. Every effort will be made to accommodate rescheduling conflicts. However, the instructor reserves the right to create a schedule that is most effective in terms of number of students scheduled for each driving group. Scheduling of or transportation to the road test are not included. Parents or other qualified adults should plan to devote time for enrolled students to practice the skills learned in this class. Only experience and good judgment makes a safe driver. A current NYS Learner's Permit must be brought to all classes.

Registration directions: Please send your payment, completed registration form and a copy of the student's learner's permit to the address listed below. The cost is \$450 for residents, \$470 for non-residents. The registration deadline for Session III will end March 28, 2018. Please select your drive groups, listing your choices in order of preference. First priority will be given to resident seniors, then resident juniors, then underclassmen and non-residents. Every effort will be made to accommodate your request. You will be notified by e-mail or telephone and a list will be posted in the High School if you have been accepted and enrolled. If a registrant did not get into the session, they will be notified in writing and placed on a priority list for the next session.
