Instruction Office Highlights

The Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) provides states and districts with increased autonomy to create their own accountability systems. On Tuesday, Sept. 18, the Office of Instruction completed a public presentation regarding what ESSA entails and the changes between ESSA and the No Child Left Behind Act (NCLB).

Participants examined the following:

- New ways to identify schools for support and interventions
- New goals and broader measures of student success beyond test scores
- Interventions determined locally, not by the US Department of Education
- School-focused planning and district-led support
- More options for teacher and principal training
- New focus on educator equity and effectiveness
- More options for teacher and principal training
- New focus on educator equity and effectiveness

A distinct focus of the presentation was on the broader measures of student success beyond test scores. Board of education trustees and community members were able to understand how multi cohort rates for graduation, English language proficiency, chronic absenteeism and career and college readiness play into a district's accountability status in collaboration with academic achievement. In the future, suspension rates will be added. These different indicators allow a district to be measured in multiple ways versus just on proficiency.

"We are driven by our mission to engage and empower each student to achieve excellence as a learner and citizen," said Dr. Lesli C. Myers, superintendent of schools. "The Every Student Succeeds Act reaffirms our commitment to the success of all groups and subgroups of students. Specifically, it allows us to make adjustments where necessary to determine meaningful next steps for cross-sections of students who are not reaching academic success."

Change has also created opportunity. Based on district need and desire, The College at Brockport and the district have collaborated together to create a Diversity Certification Program focused on being culturally competent and aware of our own implicit biases. This emphasis on educator equity and effectiveness allows us to create a program aligned with our vision and mission and focus on educational experiences for our staff that broaden their knowledge of diversity, equity, multiculturalism, social justice and inclusive excellence.

Lastly, the commissioner of education has also listened to feedback from stakeholders and the regents signed off on a final round of changes to regulations that no longer force schools to spend funds on advertisement or campaigns to boost test participation. Overall, there is still a great deal to understand regarding the full ramifications of the new accountability provisions; however, there is also great opportunity for enhanced professional development and new programs that will enhance the learning of all students. Diversity Certification Program

Brockport Central School District and The College at Brockport have partnered together in an effort to promote diversity and inclusion through the launch of the Diversity Certification Program. The program aims to equip faculty and staff from both institutions with effective teaching strategies to increase cultural intelligence, thus promoting student success.

"This program is a significant breakthrough in adapting to the shifting demographics in our nation," said Superintendent of Schools Dr. Lesli C. Myers. "As changes are evident in public school classrooms, it is crucial that cultural intelligence and a commitment to diversity and inclusion are a priority. Brockport Central School District is proud to be part of this innovative opportunity."

Participants will receive formal cultural and academic training on how to successfully engage and interact with students in 11 targeted cultural/demographic groups and subject areas. In addition, each participant will be required to complete 10 hours of experiential learning in an approved culturally focused community/corporate organization that supports the content developed within training sessions.

The inaugural cohort is comprised of approximately 30 people, half from Brockport Central School District and half from The College at Brockport. They attended a welcome breakfast on Sept. 12 to review the program mission, outline, expectations and assessments. The program will occur over the duration of one academic year.

Emergency procedure review

The safety and security of students and staff remains a priority at Brockport Central School District. Each year we review our emergency policies and procedures to ensure students, staff and families know how to respond in the event of an emergency.

Automated messaging

The district uses SchoolMessenger, an automated messaging system, to quickly communicate with families via phone and email. In the event of an emergency, such as a lockout or lockdown, calls will be made to all parent/guardian's home, work and cell phone numbers, along with emergency contacts 1-4 listed on the Student Profile Form updated every September (or when there is a change in contact information). The text of the messages will also be sent via email. Additionally, those who have downloaded the Brockport CSD mobile application will be notified via a push notification. If you do

not have the mobile app and would like to download it, search for "Brockport Central" in your device's app store.

The district will periodically use the automated messaging system to share other important information such as open house reminders or last minute event changes. Information classified as "non-emergency" will be sent only to the primary home phone numbers and email addresses on file.

Website alerts

Additional information during emergency situations will also be posted on the district's website and social media accounts when deemed appropriate. You may find the information on our website at bcsl.org or by searching @brockportesd on Facebook or Twitter. Please remember to check these resources and refrain from calling your child's school in the event of an emergency so district personnel can focus their attention on the safety of

students.

Lockouts and lockdowns

People often use the terms lockout and lockdown interchangeably. At Brockport CSD, a lockout is initiated when there is a potential risk outside the building or district (i.e., an armed person is threatening the community; a suspicious condition, chemical spill or rabid/aggressive animal exists in the area). During a lockout, exterior doors and windows are locked, outside activities are terminated and instruction continues as normal inside the building.

A lockdown is initiated when there is an impending risk to the building or district (i.e., an armed/violent/aggressive person threatening or attacking a school building or the district; an imminent threat that may involve a specific building or the district). In this case, the same protocols would be followed for a lockout, however, classroom doors are locked and instruction is halted.

How parents and guardians can help during emergency situations

- Listen carefully to automated phone calls and messages you receive.
 Please listen to the entire message, then visit the district's website for more information at www.bcsl.org.
- Don't panic. Just like you, we make your children's safety our main priority. We have solid procedures in place to keep them safe. We practice emergency drills multiple times each year with our students and staff and consistently review our safety procedures.
- Avoid calling your child's school. We will notify you as more information becomes available.
- Don't rush to campus. If there is an actual emergency on our campus where law enforcement or emergency personnel need to respond, it is critical to keep the campus clear so they can quickly resolve the situation.

• Keep your contact information up to date. It is important to have a current email address on file in addition to home, work and cell phone numbers.

Once visitors walk through the main entrance of the District Office, they will need to select the button on the video intercom system that corresponds to the office of their visit: Business Office, Human Resources/ Superintendent's Office, Office of Inclusive Education, Office of Instruction and Registration and Records. A representative from that office will answer, inquire the person's purpose for visiting and then unlock the second set of doors once deemed safe.

Prior to the installation of the new video intercom system, the main entrance to the District Office was unlocked during the school day. The new system adds a layer of security and ensures everyone who enters the building has a valid reason. Should anyone suspicious attempt to enter, the representative in the building has the ability to contact security and/or the police.

1:1 initiative creates digital age learners

Whether advancing to college or career after high school, students will be required to use technology to some degree making digital skills fluency a prerequisite for success. Brockport CSD's Digital Readiness 1:1 Initiative aspires to prepare our students to be digital age learners and citizens. With careful planning, teachers leverage technology to ensure that each student's needs are met. Using Microsoft Office 365 and Schoology teachers manage class materials and enable students to access online files and resources, participate in online discussions and create products individually and collaboratively. In addition, students may use Office 365 apps and other tools to demonstrate their learning by creating multimedia presentations such as videos, websites, CAD blueprints and podcasts.

The district completed its transition to 1:1 with the final installment of laptops over the summer. At the secondary level 1,830 student laptops were distributed. Students in high school have the opportunity to take their devices home with them. Middle school students are assigned laptops that are picked up and returned to their home base classrooms each day. Hill School students follow the same model as the middle school. Barclay classrooms have carts with sets of 20 laptops and Ginther has 520 iPads for students in kindergarten and first grade.

To ensure digital literacy is aligned and consistent within and across grade levels, the district is using the International Society for Technology in Education (ISTE) standards for students as a roadmap for curriculum integration. ISTE's seven student standards describe the skills and knowledge students need to

thrive, grow and contribute in a global, interconnected and constantly changing society. The standards will be integrated over a two- to three-year period. This year, the focus is on:

- Empowered Learner Basic skills for using technology and troubleshooting, keyboarding skills, internet and networking
- Digital Citizenship Responsible use, health and wellness, privacy and safety
- Knowledge Constructor Research and information, validating online resources, intellectual property and citing sources
- Creative Communicator Word processing, multimedia creation

The remaining standards include Innovative Designer, Computational Thinker and Global Collaborator. The district is committed to providing technology to be used as an instructional tool. Students balance using technology with other materials, tools and activities.

The future of the 1:1 initiative will build upon teacher pedagogy, district initiatives and the needs of our student population. We are seeing digital schools transitioning from desktops to the mobile world which allows for educational growth within the district and now at home. Future technologies are geared toward providing an immersive experience in the classroom and we expect to see this technology soon in our classrooms.

A powerful sense of community was prevalent during Brockport Central School District's homecoming celebration on Sept. 28! An estimated 3,000 people gathered to show their school spirit during the festival, parade and football game.





Celebrations commenced on Monday as each school kicked off Spirit Week. Themed days consisted of Holiday Day (or Disney Day for elementary students), America Day, Meme/Vine Day (or Beach Day for elementary students), Neon Day and Blue and White Day. Enthusiasm grew Friday afternoon as the middle and high schools gathered for pep rallies where classes competed in various games to build momentum for the evening. Following the high school pep rally, the varsity football and cheerleading teams paraded through Ginther School as our youngest learners beamed and gave out high fives.






