
## **District art show**

# **BCSD** teachers open up to students about the dangers of distracted driving

"We don't tell our stories so you can feel sorry for us.

We tell our stories so when you're faced with choices you can think twice."

That was the message Brockport High School students received from two Brockport Central School District teachers. In May, parents Kris Cyr and Kerry Gant opened up to teens about separate car crashes involving their own children. Gant's child and his friend survived their crash. The driver of that car lost control while speeding.

Cyr's daughter was texting while driving home one night and lost control of her car after trying to dodge an animal in the road. The high school senior did not survive. The two now dedicate their traumatic experiences to showing students how their children's decisions behind the wheel can create a ripple of life-changing heartbreak.

While they shared the message with our teens, just starting to drive, it's a message our entire community can learn from. As Cyr shared, "We honor our loved ones death by honoring ourselves." We honor ourselves by living our best lives. Living our best lives means staying focused on the road.

What can parents do? Remind your teens to obey the basic traffic safety laws, too many passengers are dangerous, cell phones should be off, minimize distractions and impaired driving is dangerous and a crime. Give your child permission and encouragement to call you if they are in a potentially bad driving situation. Life is too precious to waste. Drive safe and stay focused behind the wheel.

Happy summer! Your students have worked hard all year, and now it's time to relax, rejuvenate and restore. Our schools want you to enjoy summer with some inspiration to visit a library or bookstore. Did you know that summer reading is essential to maintaining all students' school-year academic success? According to the book, No More Summer Reading Loss, "...the only summer activity related to improving reading achievement is summer reading." Studies show that the effect of reading four or five books over the summer months can prevent a decline in reading from spring to fall. To help students maintain the success they worked so hard to achieve, we encourage you to include reading as one of your summer activities.

You can find a suggested summer reading list to assist you in selecting books for your students by visiting our district website at <a href="https://www.bcsl.org/summerreading">www.bcsl.org/summerreading</a> or visit your local public library. Some tips to consider:

- Search for books that feature characters with different backgrounds, experiences and identities in order to learn about other people's lives and stories. This will teach children the importance of empathy and kindness.
- Choice is huge! Students respond better to reading when they have a choice in the reading material.
- Read aloud to your child. Children of ALL ages enjoy hearing and sharing a good story.
- Visit your public library. The public library has excellent resources and programs.

Remember, the best way to beat the summer slide is by reading!

# OMS chorus performs with Houghton College

This spring, Oliver Middle School chorus performed their concert with help from a Houghton College composer. Every year the BCSD partners with the college for the concert. 





## **Driving Courses**

#### **Safe Driving Techniques (five-hour course)**

Effective Oct. 1, 1987, the Bureau of Motor Vehicles of the State of New York requires five hours of classroom instruction as a prerequisite for obtaining a driver's license. Applicants affected by this regulation are those applying for a first time driver's license; those applying for a driver's license because of lapse of one-year renewal grace period; and those applying for a new driver's license as a result of revocation of previous license. The five-hour training period must be completed prior to the applicant applying for a road test. Persons having completed a regular driving education course do not need this program.

The following regulations are applicable to all prospective registrants:

- Registration must be completed at the high school in person by noon on the Tuesday immediately preceding the class. There is a sevenperson minimum to hold this class, so registering on time will reduce the risk of cancellation.
- Students will be admitted on a first come first serve basis.
- Applicants must be 16 years of age or older.
- Applicants must bring their valid learner's permit to register.
- Applicants must pay the \$40 registration fee upon registering and completely fill out the registration form.

An official completion certificate, which is valid for one year from the day of issuance, will be awarded upon completion of the five-hour program. This certificate must be presented when applying for a road test. It does not qualify participants for reduced insurance rates.

### PSAT/NMSQT 2018

On Saturday, October 19, 2019, the PSAT/NMSQT (Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test) will be administered at Brockport High School. High school students should take the PSAT/NMSQT during their junior year. Approximately one million juniors take this exam each year. It is considered a 'trial run' for the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT). The PSAT also allows a student to qualify for a scholarship from the National Merit Scholarship Corporation. The PSAT tests mathematical and verbal reasoning skills as well as writing abilities through multiple-choice questions.

Those successfully completing the class will receive an MV285 certificate that gives the holder the privilege to receive a Class D operator's license when reaching age 17, allowing them to drive after 9 p.m. Students must be 16 years old and hold a valid NYS Driver Permit or License to be eligible for the course. The Pre-Licensing 5-Hour Course material is included in Driver Education. The loan of a text is included in the class fee.

Most insurance companies will offer a discount on compulsory car insurance upon request.

**Classroom instruction -** ALL students must attend ALL classroom instruction in Brockport High School Room 192 as scheduled from 3:15-4:45 p.m.

Scheduling of or transportation to the road test are not included. Parents or other qualified adults should plan to devote time for enrolled students to practice the skills learned in this class. Only experience and good judgment makes a safe driver. A current NYS Learner's Permit must be brought to all classes.

The cost is \$450 for residents, \$470 for non-residents. The registration deadline for Session I will end August 30, 2019, and the registration deadline for Session II will end November 1, 2019. Every effort will be made to accommodate your request. You will be notified by e-mail or telephone and a list will be posted in the High School if you have been accepted and enrolled. The Summer Book Mobile is a library on wheels that travels to designated locations and allows students to check books in and out throughout the summer. The initiative was spearheaded by Brockport CSD librarians three years ago as an effort to prevent the "summer slide" that tends to occur if students fail to read over the summer.

The book mobile started in the district's food service van. Last year Engineering, Design and Development students redesigned an old school bus to accommodate bookshelves. The bus was a great success and more than 100 BCSD children were able to enjoy books over the summer.

# **Brockport Foodlink Mobile Pantry returns to BCSD**

Community members received free food thanks to the Brockport Foodlink Mobile Pantry van making a stop at Brockport High School. This is the third year the mobile pantry visited the district and every year it's always welcomed by a huge turnout of families and individuals. The food is provided with no proof of income.

The entire event is spearheaded by BCSD business and career education teacher Michael Zale and his wife, Kristen. Zale says he and his wife started the initiative

after learning the rate of families identified as being "economically disadvantaged" was approaching 50-percent. "We just wanted to find a way to support families within our community; most of them being students in our district," said Zale, a BCSD teacher.

Eighty student volunteers signed up to help along with family members, teachers, staff, administrators, board members and community members. Almost 120 families were helped which included 177 children, 198 adults and 63 seniors. The Foodlink Mobile Pantry will return October 23, 2019.
