UNIFIED BOWLING CELEBRATES INCLUSION

The first-ever Unified Bowling season has rolled to a close, ending with a perfect strike. Brockport is one of approximately 16 schools across Section V offering this program for the first time.

Between the whoosh of the ball and the clang of pins, you could hear the shouts and high-fives of players and fans, all packed into Empire Lanes which set the scene for the season's Unified Culmination Event, where teams across Section V played side-by-side. The scene reflected the reason Unified Sports are growing throughout the country. The inclusive sports program unites Special Olympic athletes with teammates for training and competition.

"It's very exciting. We've been practicing, and the buzz around it has been wonderful," expressed Coach Kerry Gant, a Technology Integration Coach and Diversity Adviser with BCSD. She explained bowling as a sport allows players of all different skill-levels and abilities to participate. With digital scoring, calculations can be made ahead of a match so each student athlete's score, regardless of ability level, contributes to the team's outcome against other schools.

The Unified Bowling team isn't just providing an athletic outlet for our students, it is also creating friendships. "They've not only built relationships here in the bowling alley but it also transfers into the school day, as well," said Coach Jennifer Fredericks, BCSD English and Special Education Teacher.

Student athletes agree. Maeve Grady, a BCSD Sophomore, said her favorite part about being on the Unified Bowling team is the friendships she's made. "You see everyone in the hall and say hi, smile at each other. The other players would be

students we would otherwise never have met, there isn't a lot of interaction with students of different abilities," shared Grady. Her teammate Kiera Wilson explained the Youth Activation Committee posts signs on the student athletes' lockers, which sparks conversations between players.

Ella Mohney, a Senior and Special Olympic athlete, echoed the sentiment, saying how fun it is to be on a team and to make so many new friends. "I've bowled before, but this is my first time on a bowling team. It feels good to be on a team and meet other people."

NYS Seal of Biliteracy Program

Brockport Central Schools is pleased to announce participation in the New York State Seal of Biliteracy Program (NYSSB). In recognition of the importance of a love of languages, biliteracy and a culturally diverse community, many states are offering pathways to earn this accredited honor. The NYSSB honors high school graduates who have attained a high level of proficiency in one or more languages, in addition to English. This distinction will be celebrated on graduation day with a diploma endorsement and the opportunity to wear a medallion.

Who is eligible?

The Seal of Biliteracy is awarded to high school students who demonstrate mastery of two languages (one is English) through the completion of a variety of checkpoints. In collaboration with the NYSSB Committee, World Language Teachers and the counseling department, students will be supported throughout the process.

VAPEEducation Workshop

During the November 19, 2019 Board of Education meeting, the Board Study Session focused on the current trends of vaping in Monroe County and Brockport. The presentation included how our high school is taking a restorative approach in helping support students.

Brockport High School is shifting to an educational approach with students who are caught vaping. BHS administrators explained that this is an educational opportunity to engage students and walk with them through the process.

The presentation was done in collaboration by the Brockport HS Team, Assistant to the Superintendent for Inclusive Education, Assistant to the Superintendent for Secondary Instructional Education and our Dephi Drug Coordinator.

Budget development process

During the budget development process, the Brockport Central School District ensures upholding the quality of its program by first asking if a budget item supports the best interests of the students. This priority, along with the mission, vision and goals are the guiding principles of the budget process.

Throughout the initial stages of the budget process the district makes some basic assumptions until actual data/ information becomes available. Items such as state aid, fund balance appropriations and staffing are kept at the same level as the prior year, giving the budget team a baseline to begin building the budget.

New programs/staffing are only considered if there is ample evidence to show that they will effectively use budgetary resources. If reductions are necessary, the district determines if there is an alternative way to deliver or support the program by realigning resources or schedules.

Some of the criteria used in considering programing and services include:

- State mandates
- Enrollment
- Safety, security or health
- Number of students served
- What district goal/strategic plan it supports

Working together we strive to develop a budget that best meets the interests of our students and upholds the district's mission and vision.

OMS evaluated for NYS Essential Elements: Schools-To-Watch program

The New York State's Essential Elements: Schools-To-Watch (EE:STW) program began in 2004 to:

- promote school improvement
- identify and recognize middle schools/programs that are academically excellent, developmentally appropriate, socially equitable and organized to ensure continuous improvement.

Oliver Middle School began researching the EE:STW program during the 2015-16 school year. The school and district agreed the benefits of the program were significant and submitted a 200-page application to the state in 2018. The district incurred no cost to participate in the process.

Oliver's application had sufficient documentation to support a visit from a team of middle level experts in December. OMS is one of six schools granted a visit and the only school from Monroe County. The visitation team will gather and document evidence that affirms Oliver is worthy of being recognized as a Schools-to-Watch school. OMS administrators are excited about the program and stated the process is more important than the designation. During a recent board meeting, OMS administrators explained that the process encouraged the school to look at every aspect of their programs and policies. Their teacher leaders, building administrators and other members of their staff were engaged in identifying strengths and areas in need of improvement. Working together, they created a well-developed, research-grounded, school-based improvement plan.

The site visit team will make one of the following recommendations to the State Director:

- Designate an Essential Elements School to Watch
- Designate a Rising School to Watch
- Do not designate

We are very proud of OMS for the hard work they have put into this process and look forward to seeing the outcome.

Refunds

Refunds are provided only if a student withdraws from the class 24 hours prior to the scheduled start date. No refunds will be provided after the first class. If you join a class after the scheduled start date, the tuition will be the same amount. Safe Driving Techniques (five-hour course)

The Bureau of Motor Vehicles of the State of New York requires five hours of classroom instruction as a prerequisite for obtaining a driver's license. Applicants affected by this regulation are those applying for a first time driver's license; those applying for a driver's license because of lapse of one-year renewal grace period; and those applying for a new driver's license as a result of revocation of previous license. The five-hour training period must be completed prior to the applicant applying for a road test. Persons having completed a regular driving education course do not need this program.

The following regulations are applicable to all prospective registrants:

- Registration must be completed at the high school in person by noon on the Tuesday immediately preceding the class. There is a seven person minimum to hold this class, so registering on time will reduce the risk of cancellation.
- Students will be admitted on a first come, first served basis
- Applicants must be 16 years of age or older.
- Applicants must bring their valid learner's permit to register.
- Applicants must pay the \$40 registration fee upon registering and completely fill out the registration form.

An official completion certificate, which is valid for one year from the day of issuance, will be awarded upon completion of the five-hour program. This certificate must be presented when applying for a road test. It does not qualify participants for reduced insurance rates.



Enrolled students will receive instruction in the classroom, behind the wheel, and on the road as required by New York State Department of Motor Vehicles. Those successfully completing the class will receive an MV285 certificate that gives the holder the privilege to receive a Class D operator's license when reaching age 17, allowing them to drive after 9 p.m. Students must be 16 years old and hold a valid NYS Driver Permit or License to be eligible for the course. The Pre-Licensing 5-Hour Course material is included in Driver Education. The loan of a text is included in the class fee.

Most insurance companies will offer a discount on compulsory car insurance upon request.

Theory Class Instructor: Rich Barrett

Classroom instruction: ALL students must attend ALL 16 theory classes. Classes are held in the Brockport High School Room 192 as scheduled from 3:15 - 4:45 p.m.

Please note: Student must be present for the first theory class to be allowed entry into the course. Please arrive 15 minutes prior to the start of the first class. (Late arrivals will not be admitted and, if registered, will forfeit course enrollment). No early dismissals from theory class allowed.

Students must have the following for theory class:

- Permit/license
- New York State Driver Manual
- Notebook/folder
- Writing materials

Students must be prepared with the following for each car class:

- Permit/license
- Sunglasses are encouraged
- Appropriate footwear (i.e. no backless sandals)

Driving groups: Driving instructors will inform students of pick-up and drop-off location. Driving classes may be rescheduled at the instructor's discretion due to inclement weather. Should a make-up driving class be requested by a student due to extenuating circumstances, the instructor will reschedule at his discretion. Driving groups may be rescheduled to place four drivers in each time block. Every effort will be made to accommodate rescheduling conflicts. However, the instructor reserves the right to create a schedule that is most effective in terms of number of students scheduled for each driving group. Scheduling of or transportation to the road test are not included. Parents or other qualified adults should plan to devote time for enrolled students to practice the skills learned in this class. Only experience and good judgment makes a safe driver. A current NYS Learner's Permit must be brought to all classes.

Registration directions: Please send your payment, completed registration form and a copy of the student's learner's permit to the address listed below. The cost is \$450 for residents, \$470 for non-residents. The registration deadline for Session III will end March 27, 2020, Please select your drive groups, listing your choices in order of preference. First priority will be given to resident seniors, then resident juniors, then underclassmen and non-residents. Every effort will be made to accommodate your request. You will be notified by e-mail or telephone and a list will be posted in the High School if you have been accepted and enrolled. If a registrant did not get into the session, they will be notified in writing and placed on a priority list for the next session.
