SOCIALLY DISTANT CELEBRATIONS

Spring at Brockport Central School District is typically very busy. The campus is alive with academic review and tests, awards and recognitions, field days, sporting events, parties, art shows, concerts, trips, proms and graduation. Like all schools throughout the country, Brockport needed to modify its academic year and all celebrations due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Like the willow, the district found unique and creative ways to move forward. Although the spring looked very different, the students, staff and families worked together and found creative and inspiring ways to teach, learn and celebrate.

Remote learning was an abstract concept prior to the pandemic. Within days, teachers were adapting lesson plans to teach their students remotely. Staff helped one another with this task, computers were made ready and distributed to all students and families prepared their homes and lives for significant change. Students found they could make instruments at home, artwork became a family project and video challenges from teachers gave students amusement and hope.





A student meal program was established to help our students during this difficult time. Staff worked diligently to prepare and distribute food. Volunteers gave extra hours to ensure students were fed and felt cared for by their district. Volunteers gathered books and other items to hand out in addition to nourishment.

Meetings and ceremonies were virtual. The Brockport Board of Education continued to meet at least twice a month through Zoom and livestreamed through Facebook. Staff worked together to create award and scholarship videos with principals and teachers to celebrate the many accomplishments of our students.

While the campus and its buildings were quieter than normal, Brockport pride remained strong. Students challenged one another with spirit week competitions and photos were posted to enjoy. A parade was held to honor our fifthgrade students moving up to middle school, and our retirees paraded through campus to celebrate their years with the district. Our spring senior athletes drove through campus and were recognized with scoreboards lit and jerseys displayed in honor of the season they lost. Each

parade brought celebration, support and encouragement.

Every student in each grade was affected by the changes to the school year. None more, than our Class of 2020. With a resiliency to be admired, our seniors finished their academic year. The high school administrators and staff personally delivered senior signs and cookies to each senior's home. Videos to inspire and encourage were created. Doors were decorated and future plans celebrated through slide shows. A personalized graduation ceremony was held over three days, allowing each senior to walk the stage and accept their diploma in front of their loved ones.

Although many of the traditions were different, the pride and unity of our Brockport District remained strong. We celebrate all of you: our staff, our students and our families. In January 2020, James Fallon came out of retirement to serve as Brockport's Interim Superintendent while the district began its search for a Superintendent of Schools. Mr. Fallon was Brockport's superintendent from 1993 until his retirement in 2009. Prior to superintendent, he worked as a teacher and assistant superintendent and has dedicated over 39 years to Brockport Central School District.

"While the first few months back on the job were routine, things changed quickly on March 16," said Fallon. "With the onset of COVID-19, the district was reacting to changes and receiving daily direction from the CDC, the State and Monroe County. All decisions for the district needed to be made quickly and immediately communicated to staff and families." Mr. Fallon said he is proud of the district; trying to navigate the pandemic was an "enormous task and everyone rose to the occasion."

"Mr. Fallon was truly the calm in the storm," said Board President Terry Ann Carbone. Throughout the tumultuous few months, he was the one everyone turned to with questions, concerns and fears. He led the district during a very difficult time and always had the safety and well-being of the students, staff and families in mind. He will be missed by everyone, but his "re-retirement" is well-deserved.

The Board of Education has established the James C. Fallon Distinguished Service Award in honor of Mr. Fallon's many years of faithful service. This award may be given to any Brockport student, employee or community member who singularly exemplifies Mr. Fallon's best qualities: confidence, wisdom, leadership, accountability and humbleness. An applicant must receive unanimous approval from the BOE to receive this honor, and the award will be placed in a prominent location in the district to inspire others to reach for Mr. Fallon's example.

Online group kept Ginther connected

Teachers at Ginther used an online group called "Ginther Teachers" to share videos with students and families. Classroom and special area teachers, related service providers, instructional coaches, school counselors and staff members posted mini-lessons, resources, student artwork and The Pledge of Allegiance.


Numerous teachers posted read alouds of their favorite books, inspiring students to respond with reactions, photos and suggestions of their favorite books.

One teacher read "The Pigeon Wants A Puppy" and included a drawing activity. Students shared their drawings through photo comments. Another teacher encouraged students to take a virtual field trip to the Grand Canyon and then posted a read aloud of "Whose

Tail on the Trail at the Grand Canyon". The teacher found the virtual field trip resource and shared with families. The live video had 68 views, with families reacting in comments throughout the read aloud.

A Ginther gym teacher used this page to encourage students to get out and active while home. Videos demonstrated fun ways for student to get exercise.

"The page was a highlight for families and teachers as they would visit each day to see familiar faces, learn about health, wellness, literacy, math and citizenship," says Principal Debra Waye. "Ginther School greatly enjoyed reaching out to our families. We look forward to the day we can all be together again."





Videos motivated Hill students

Teachers at Fred Hill School stayed connected to students during remote learning through recorded video lessons and fun, engaging challenges. One of the school teams engaged students through weekly Monday morning videos and daily live lessons to introduce new content. Teachers also held virtual office hours with students each morning.

Mr. Stoker, the Hill School band teacher, created a fourth-grade video for what would have been his students' very first band concert. Although the students were unable to play as a band, they were able to share memories of their year together. Mr. Stoker said he missed his students but knows when everyone is back to school, they will be stronger and even more appreciative of the opportunity to make music TOGETHER.

END OF YEAR HIGHLIGHTS

BHS Unified Team participated through Zoom

Brockport High School's Unified Basketball team continued to meet through Zoom while school was closed. Coaches Jen Fredericks, Christina West and Kerry Gant virtually met with students twice a week so the team would stay connected and healthy through walking workouts and step challenges. The team logged 435,749 collective steps in just one week!

Twenty-two students signed up for the Unified Team and the majority virtually participated in each practice. The team participated in the Special Olympics Fit5 program that included five 30-minute workouts per week, eating five fruits and vegetables each day and drinking five glass of water daily. The goal was to keep kids active and develop long-term healthy habits. The Unified Basketball coaches agreed that online meetings kept them all connected and participating throughout the extended closure.



OMS lifted spirits through mental health videos

Team Athena, a group at Oliver Middle School focused on mental health, created video check-ins for students. The goal of the videos was to engage children in online learning, provide social emotional support and maintain a connection during the extended closure.

Each week, the team chose different areas of social emotional learning that was relevant to the OMS students. Pulling resources from a variety of sources, the team posted videos ranging in topics from social media tips, to managing stress, to being your own advocate. Students suggested topics they would like addressed. Each video also included a "feature a teacher" segment, where the group invited a middle school teacher into the chat, and a good news segment, where uplifting stories about the Brockport community were shared.

"Team Athena is an exceptional group of professionals that went above and beyond to connect with our students and support their social emotional health during these unprecedented times," said OMS Principal Jerrod Roberts.



Barclay teacher created instructional videos

Going from a traditional classroom to remote learning is a huge transition. Tara Jackson, Barclay third grade teacher, created online videos as a way of communicating with others in the BCSD community during the closure.

Ms. Jackson created numerous videos, including an instructional video with one of her students. The videos showed teachers how to set up Class Notebook to share and provide feedback on new learning. The purpose of the videos was to highlight a simple and effective way to connect with students. Ms. Jackson and

her student demonstrated how to share screens, access different teams and navigate OneNote notebooks. They even walked through a math class worksheet to show how to use various tools to complete the problems.

Ms. Jackson said she received positive feedback from other teachers, saying they learned a lot from the videos. The videos were created in Microsoft Teams and were used by students and teachers throughout the district.

AT-HOME "LOCKER CLEANOUT 2020"

With lockers just cleaned out, it's a great time to go through these materials and educate your student on 'being green'!

We focus on the 3 R's: Reuse, Reduce and Recycle, with an emphasis on the first two concepts, as these have the most effective environmental impact. Overall: reduce what you can, choose reusable over single-use and once something is totally used up, recycle.

Tips to applying the 3 R's:

- Reuse what supplies you can no matter what grade students are entering in the fall, you will need the same basic supplies, like notebooks, binders, folders, pencils and erasers.
- **Reduce** the shopping you have to do in the fall by keeping items that still have life left in them! Tear out used notebook pages, change notebook labels, folders and binders - a magic eraser and rubbing alcohol or Goo Gone work well at removing writing
- Pass on or donate supplies you no longer need or use families on a budget would love to have gently used items.
- Recycle used papers. Or twist them up and use them as fire starters for a bonfire!

• If it's not trash, don't put it in the garbage! Our nation's landfills are filling at an alarming rate. Don't fill them up with reusable materials, find a home for them or reuse them yourselves!

Using this opportunity to educate students and show them how easy it can be to be 'green' – whether at school or at home – sets a foundation for the future! It helps keep reusable items in circulation and out of landfills – and can help save money on school supplies each year!

Going Green in the time of COVID-19: With shortages and limited shopping items, you may have found that we have naturally had to put some of these concepts in place. After employing the 3 R's over the past few months out of necessity, it is a great time to re-evaluate our habits and keep some of these ideas going forward. Happy summer! Although summer vacation is a time to relax, rejuvenate and restore, we hope your student will take some time to read.

Did you know that summer reading is essential to maintaining all students' school-year academic success? According to the book, No More Summer Reading Loss, "...the only summer activity related to improving reading achievement is summer reading."

Studies show the effect of reading four or five books over the summer months can prevent a decline in reading from spring to fall. To help students maintain the success they worked so hard to achieve, we encourage you to include reading as one of your regular summer activities. You can find a suggested summer reading list to assist you in selecting books for your students by visiting our district website at www.bcs1.org/summerreading.

Some tips to consider:

- Search for books that feature characters with different backgrounds, experiences and identities in order to learn about other people's lives and stories. This will teach children the importance of empathy and kindness.
- Choice is huge! Students respond better to reading when they have a choice in their reading material.
- Read aloud to your child. Children of ALL ages enjoy hearing and sharing a good story.
- If you can, visit your public library. Hours and accessibility may vary by library, so check with your local branch for their availability.
- This is a good time to explore audio and eBooks from SORA! SORA is an app from Overdrive that connects you to thousands of online audio and eBooks, a link to SORA in on your student's Class Link page. This option is available all summer, so please check it out! District booklists indicate which titles can be found on SORA.

Remember, the best way to beat the summer slide is by reading!

Notifications for class cancellations due to limited registration will be made prior to first class sessions and refunds will be issued. Class registration fees do not include the cost of books, materials or supplies unless noted in class descriptions.

Please remember that prompt registration may reduce the likelihood of classes being cancelled due to low enrollment. You must be 18 years of age or older to be eligible to register, with the exception of those courses designed specifically for younger participants.

REFUNDS, CANCELLATIONS & CONFIRMATION:

Refunds are provided only if a student withdraws from the class 24 hours prior to the scheduled start date. No refunds will be provided after the first class. If you join a class after the scheduled start date, the tuition will be the same amount. If a class needs to be canceled due to maintenance, weather emergencies or health and safety, no partial refund will be issued. Refunds will be processed for courses that have been fully canceled from our schedule for reasons such as low enrollment.

Canceled classes will be rescheduled whenever possible. If a class is not able to be rescheduled and is part of a series, no refund will be given. However if a one-time only class is canceled and not rescheduled, a refund may be offered. No Continuing Education classes are held when Brockport schools are closed due to weather cancellations or emergency conditions. Please check the Brockport Central School website, local TV or radio stations for cancellations. The fall semester will begin the week of Monday September 14, 2020. If you do not receive a notification of cancellation, your class will be held. No confirmations are sent.

Due to holiday observances, school functions or scheduled recesses, classes will not meet on the following dates: October 9, 12, November 11, 25-27, December 24-31, 2020.



Our Driver Education Program is a comprehensive experience that includes both theory and practice. This program is an investment in your child's future; providing them with the necessary knowledge and experience to become a safe driver.

Below is important information about the program and the process for registering your child. Thank you for your interest and participation in our program and please feel free to contact us with any questions or concerns. During this unprecedented time with COVID-19, the health and safety of our community, students and staff is our top priority. In the coming months it may be necessary for us to make changes to procedures and/or programs being offered, including the possibility of cancellation. Registered participants will be notified of any cancellations that occur. Our Brockport Driver's Education web page will also be updated to reflect changes or cancellations. Please check our web page before registering for a program to see if it is still being held.

Enrolled students will receive instruction in the classroom, behind the wheel, and on the road as required by New York State Department of Motor Vehicles. Those successfully completing the class will receive an MV285 certificate that gives the holder the privilege to receive a Class D operator's license when reaching age 17, allowing them to drive after 9 p.m. Students must be 16 years old and hold a valid NYS Driver Permit or License to be eligible for the course. The Pre-Licensing 5-Hour Course material is included in Driver Education. The loan of a text is included in the class fee.

Most insurance companies will offer a discount on compulsory car insurance upon request.

Theory Class Instructor: Rich Barrett

Classroom instruction: ALL students must attend ALL 16 theory classes. Classes are held in the Brockport High School Room 192 as scheduled from 3:15 – 4:45 p.m.

Note: Student must be present for the first theory class to be allowed entry into the course. Please arrive 15 minutes prior to the start of the first class. (Late arrivals will not be admitted and, if registered, will forfeit course enrollment). No early dismissals from theory class allowed.

Students must have the following for theory class:

- Permit/license
- New York State Driver Manual
- Notebook/folder
- Writing materials

Students must be prepared with the following for each car class:

- Permit/license
- Sunglasses are encouraged
- Appropriate footwear (i.e. no backless sandals)

Driving Groups: will start and end at the high school student parking lot. Driving classes may be rescheduled at the instructor's discretion due to inclement weather. Should a make-up driving class be requested by a student due to extenuating circumstances, the instructor will reschedule at his discretion. Driving groups may be rescheduled to place four drivers in each time block. Every effort will be made to accommodate rescheduling conflicts. However, the instructor reserves the right to create a schedule that is most effective in terms of number of students scheduled for each driving group. Scheduling of or transportation to the road test are not included. Parents or other qualified adults should plan to devote time for enrolled students to practice the skills learned in class. Only experience and good judgment makes a safe driver. A current NYS learner's permit must be brought to all classes.

Registration directions: Please send your payment, completed registration form and a copy of the student's learner's permit to the address listed below. The cost is \$450 for residents, \$470 for non-residents. The registration deadline for Session I is August 25, 2020, and the registration deadline for Session II is October 26, 2020. Please select your drive groups, listing your choices in order of preference. First priority will be given to resident seniors, then resident juniors, then underclassmen and non-residents. Every effort will be made to accommodate your request. You will be notified by e-mail or telephone, and a list will be posted in the High School if you have been accepted and enrolled. If a registrant did not get into the session, they will be notified in writing and placed on a priority list for the next session.
