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## Community Service Requirements

Each student is required to complete community service and document all hours of service. Students must include a specific description of the activity, in addition to the supervisor's signature and phone number on the log sheet for each activity completed. Sixth grade students are required to complete a total of 12 service hours, seventh grade students are required to complete a total of 16 service hours, and eighth grade students are required to complete a total of 20 service hours. These are the minimum requirements. Students are encouraged to earn more than the minimum number of hours and to document all service.

Students may complete only their first quarter hours during the previous summer. In an effort to preserve the integrity of the program, please try to vary your service activities. Community service activities are posted at the bottom of the International Studies webpage. Students are encouraged to use the summer to explore different avenues of community service in which to participate in throughout the school year.
