

Helping Your Child Succeed in School



Be Actively Involved

Children spend half of their waking hours in school or at school-related activities. Research shows that children who have parents who are actively involved in their education do better in school than children whose parents are not involved.

School lays the foundation for future success. Not just based on grades, school helps children learn discipline, commitment and follow through, responsibility, and more. Every parent wants their child to do well in school. How can you help your child succeed in school and life?

Establish a Homework Routine

Communicate With the School

The first time you talk with your child's teacher should not be when your child is in trouble. Take time to get to know your child's teacher. Communicate through notes, conferences, and emails. Make sure you know the teachers' goals for the school year and be sure to ask questions about your child's performance. Make Daily Activities Learning Opportunities

Routine housework or errands can serve as great supplements for your child's education. Invite your children to help with dinner and have them read recipes and measure ingredients. On your grocery shopping trip, have them help write shopping lists, compare prices, and talk about money. On road trips, have them search for specific shapes, colors, signs, or letters. Encourage your children to read in their leisure time and make sure they have the opportunity to explore science, technology, and nature on an ongoing basis.

Encourage Reading

Begin reading to your child at an early age. Take them to the library and let them pick out books that interest them. Read together as a family. Make sure your child sees you reading in your leisure time. Encourage your child to read any type of book that interests them.

Talk About School

Talking about school seems simple enough but be diligent about it. Ask them what they learned each day. Review any papers and tests sent home. Go over answers that are marked incorrectly. Ask how they feel about their performance at school. Talk about their classes, friends, and thoughts about school in general.
