Free Breakfast & Lunch Meals

Effective 8-23-23, all students became eligible for free breakfast and lunch meals through 2027 as part of a key provision in the Healthy Hunger-Free Kids Act.

2 Awarded NC's First EV Activity Bus & 310K in Technology

The Transportation Department received a 72-passenger electric bus, made possible through grant funding from the Department of Environmental Quality. The school district was awarded more than 310 million in grant funding for technology, including digital learning, robotics, STEM, and Lego League STEM Challenges.


