November ballot measure would fund modernization, safety, construction

At its July 17 meeting, the Clovis Unified Governing Board voted to place a \$400 million facility bond on the November ballot for voters to decide whether to fund school facility needs in the district.

The vote comes following a recommendation in June by the Citizens Committee to Study Capital Facility Needs, a 40-member group of volunteers that met for six months to inventory and research the district's facility needs.

The committee identified critical needs of several existing schools for repairs, modernization, safety and technology improvements; and construction of additional schools necessitated because of continued enrollment growth and current overcrowding. Fully funded, those projects were expected to cost around \$550 million, however the committee prioritized the list to bring the number down to \$400



million so that the current tax rate would not change if the bond is approved.

Clovis Unified's tax rate has been \$155 per \$100,000 of assessed value for the past 12 years. That's the lowest the rate has been in the history of the district. Property owners in Clovis Unified's boundaries pay less than their counterparts in Fresno, Central and Sanger unified school districts, whose tax rates are currently \$213, \$215 and \$203 per \$100,000 of assessed value, respectively.

If approved, the bond extends the existing tax rate and provides funding for:

Updates and modernization of older schools (several Clovis Unified schools are 40 to 80 years old and have needed repairs and modernizations)

Completion of the final phases of Clovis South High School (the planned budget of which was significantly impacted by steep escalation of construction costs and labor following the pandemic)

■ Improvements to school safety and energy efficiency features on every Clovis Unified campus (the district has 53 school sites and funds would be used for features like improved safety of classroom windows and new security cameras)

While a state bond for facilities will be also on the ballot for voters to consider in November, if approved, those funds would only be accessible to a district should they have matching dollars from their community for facility projects. In order for Clovis Unified to tap into any of the potential state funding, the local Clovis Unified bond would need to pass to make the required matching dollars available.

Clovis Unified is the 12th largest school district in the state of California, but through our unique school-area system, we are not too big for parents and the community to engage with us. Clovis Unified organizes the district's 53 schools into six comprehensive school areas and an educational service area, each of which has an overseeing area superintendent.

The educational service area includes our online, alternative and specialty schools. And the comprehensive areas each anchor around a high school and its feeder intermediate and elementary schools.

The area arrangement allows these smaller groups not only to strengthen connection and availability, but also to build belonging and area pride. We have Bear Nation (Buchanan Area), Cougar Country (Clovis Area), The Wolf Pack (Clovis East Area), The Stampede (Clovis North Area), Eagle Country (Clovis West Area) and brand new this year, The Thundering Herd (Clovis South Area)!

Making people a priority

Having an engaging, accessible relationship with our students' families and local citizens is among the core values upon which Clovis Unified was built.

It helps to know our history, and where this critical piece of Clovis Unified culture began. In 1960, families and leaders of six local elementary school districts



and Clovis Union High School voted to join into one unified district.

The move allowed these seven institutions to combine resources, ideas and talents that would benefit their children in ways they could not do on their own.

The Clovis Unified School District was born, and it took ongoing teamwork, dedication and communication with all the stakeholders to guide the district on its path toward success.

The small size lent itself for these dynamic relationships to occur easily between administrators, educators, families and community members.

Over time, the new district saw tremendous growth in academic accomplishments, development of strong co-curriculars and increasing graduation rates, and that was due much in part to the teamwork and trust built between educators, administrators and the community.

That kind of connection is not something we are willing to lose as our size continues to grow. While we now have 43,000-plus students compared to the 5,037 when the district first began - a nearly 750%

increase! - we are committed to providing that same interactive approach upon which we were founded. The district's area system allows us to do that, and we hope you'll find it helps you to keep in touch.

How to contact us

Parents and the community are invited to contact a child's classroom teacher, school administrator or school area superintendent. School websites list staff and administrator contact information. During back-to-school night, teachers will review with parents the best method to contact them - some prefer emails, others like phone calls or texts.

In general, teachers should be a parent's first place to go with a question, and if it isn't classroom related, the teacher can point you in the right direction for other resources.

Parents are always welcome to contact school staff as well, including the principal or the school's area superintendent as needed.







Reeping You Informed-

Communication a priority to keep families informed

If you are reading this edition of *CUSD Today*, thank you. This is one of many tools Clovis Unified will use to keep in touch. Communication is critical in our 43,000-plus student district, and we are committed to keeping you informed.

There are multiple ways Clovis Unified will share information, and we encourage our stakeholders of students, parents, staff and community to watch for these important messages.

Our district's most frequently updated platform is our website, cusd.com. It should be the first stop when looking for current news, district resources, school board agendas or program information. Time-sensitive district news will also be sent out through emails as needed; parents and guardians should make sure their contact information on file is accurate.

On a monthly basis, Clovis Unified mails *CUSD Today* to student families and employees. Our district newspaper – paid for with advertisements by community partners – showcases some of the bigger events and general news of the district while also highlighting many great activities going on in our 53 schools.

The district uses *Two Minutes Today*, a short video blog emailed monthly to parents, to provide information about current priority topics. (Look for this month's seg-

ment for back-to-school tips.)

The CUSD Parent Bulletin, a two-sheet newsletter, is produced when it becomes important to delve deeper into a trending topic to provide parents with information to consider for their child, such as emotional wellness, navigating social media or the dangers of vaping. These reports are directly emailed to parents and contain tips on how to talk with your child about these challenging issues.

Clovis Unified's social media platforms are filled with some of the daily happenings of our students, schools and staff. Followers on Facebook (Clovis Unified School District) and Instagram (ClovisUSD) will learn of a variety of district good news, upcoming workshops, awards and events.

Additionally, each of our schools has its own newsletter and social media channels with useful information specific to that campus. Watch for information coming soon from your school site about ParentSquare, a multi-faceted communication platform that will be used for school to home communications. School websites also offer links to Clovis Unified's ParentConnect, NutriSlice and PeachJar that let parents and students easily find out about grades, schoolwork, lunch menus and more.


Many of these resources are available on Clovis Unified's mobile app, and those who do not yet have our app are encouraged to download it today. We'll be in touch!

We've heard you!

New communication platform creates one stop for news and information

This school year, Clovis Unified schools will be launching ParentSquare, a single communication platform for emails, texts, signup sheets, calendars, permission slips and more. The platform is easy to navigate and allows parents to customize how and when they receive messages, and language settings.

For example, if a family has an elementary student and high school student, and both are involved in a club or sport, the parent can easily view upcoming classroom and co-curricular events for both children on the calendar feature at the same time



Clovis Unified schools will transition their communication to ParentSquare beginning this fall. Parents can download the ParentSquare app now to get a head start. or have options to see calendar items for just one child at a time or even for just one child's club, team or classroom.

Teachers can send class messages with any accompanying links, including permission slips or sign ups that will automatically populate on a child's calendar once approved. Parents will be able to directly respond to the teacher from ParentSquare's communication portal. Families will even be able to choose their preferred language and view any messages in that translation; they may also reply in that language and the message will be translated for the teacher.

"We've heard from parents time and again that it's a challenge to keep up with all the different apps and messaging platforms used across the district, and at times it can be overwhelming," said Chief Communications Officer Kelly Avants.

"They have had to download multiple apps, sort through emails and texts, and keep up with which particular platform one school, coach or club advisor is using so they can stay informed about their child's activities. ParentSquare is our solution. It is a robust system that combines these multiple communication methods into one place for families."

The platform was successfully piloted with Clovis Unified summer school programs in June and July, and users gave it the green light for full implementation in the coming year. ParentSquare will launch this fall, with full implementation expected during the second semester of the school year.

Instructions will be shared from the District and school sites about how parents can activate their ParentSquare account and create essentially a "town square" customized with the information and details relevant for their family. Prepare now for success — ways to help your child get ready

With our 53 school campuses opening in just a few weeks, there are steps parents and students can take now to get ready for a great school year. The following tips are offered by Clovis Unified teachers, staff and administrators that will help children get ready!

Before school starts

■ Speak positively about school beginning soon and ask what your child is looking forward to this year. Let them know their school is preparing for them and has great plans for learning new things, time with friends and exciting school activities. administrative staff, including contact information.

■ Prepare a homework station in your home. A quiet place with good lighting and a desk or table works great. Kids can help get it ready with a few supplies and make their own decorations, like a drawing of their school mascot.

■ Go back-to-school shopping if needed. Keep in mind Clovis Unified's dress code if purchasing clothes. On many teachers' websites (found through the school website), class supply lists are available. Other items

Does your child want to play sports or participate in co-curricular activities? Find out about offerings and signups on the school website, and have fun helping your child prepare and begin to practice.

• Ease students back into a regular school schedule. The week before school starts, have students go to bed and wake up earlier a little more each day, moving them closer to what the school bedtime/wake-up routine will be.

• Grab a good book. If students have not been reading this summer, there is still time to warm up those skills. Have bedtime reading with younger students.

■ Visit your school to help your student become familiar with where things are. Be sure to find your child's classroom(s). Note where the restroom, library, cafeteria and nurse's office are located.

■ Identify your child's drop-off and pickup place on the school site. If a child is in the afterschool Expanded Learning Club or taking a bus home, be sure your child knows where to go.

■ If your child will be walking to school, practice the route together. Consider arranging for your child to walk to school with a friend or child in the neighborhood.

■ Visit the school website now for information including school start and end times, Back-to-School Night dates and daily menus. There is also a full listing of teachers and to consider are a backpack, water bottle or athletic shoes.

■ Have your child plan out what he or she will wear for the first day of school.

■ Talk about what that first day may be like and ask your child how he or she feels about it. Offer reassurance, enthusiasm and support. Let them know it's OK to be nervous and that lots of other students feel the very same way.

■ Encourage your child to enter the new school year with a mindset of meeting new people and having new experiences. Talk about getting involved at school and joining at least one activity such as a club, academic or sports team, or the performing arts.

• Fuel the body well. Take a shopping trip with your child now to help choose foods that are nutritious and that they will enjoy bringing to school.

■ Pre-make a few dinners that can be frozen. Having meals ready the first week can help the whole family keep things running smoothly.

After school starts

■ Make sure your child eats breakfast to have energy for the day. Have students bring a water bottle to keep hydrated (campuses have water stations to fill them up). Checkout the school's free lunch menu or pack a lunch your child enjoys. Send a few healthy snacks.

■ Ensure your child gets enough sleep. Doctors recommend children up to the fifth grade get as much as 10 to 11 hours of sleep each night.

■ Establish regular weekday routines for

school, homework, playtime, mealtime and bedtime.

■ Have your child go to bed organized with backpack, P.E., or co-curricular clothes and equipment ready for the next day.

■ Drive safe. Stop when school bus red lights are flashing, indicating students are boarding or exiting, and pay attention to crossing guards and school speed limits.

• Keep informed through the school's website. Review all materials the school sends home.

■ If the first couple of days are a little difficult: remain positive and calm. Let your child know you care and are there to support him or her.

■ Check in with your child after school. Review homework. Follow your student's progress on Parent Connect. If a child begins to struggle in a subject, contact the teacher.

■ Help your child learn how to keep organized by creating check lists or using a daily planner. Students should note their homework assignments, upcoming deadlines, practice schedules, club meeting times, when permission slips are due and any other important dates.

■ Plan down time for your child. Kids do better with some time to play or relax. Encourage them to go outside, listen to music, ride a bike or play a game.

■ Attend Back-to-School Night and meet your child's teacher. This informative night provides parents with an understanding about the structure and expectations.

■ Consider volunteering in your child's class, library or parent club.

• Students, don't procrastinate. Plan your week ahead and don't leave things until the last minute. Pack your backpack the night before.

■ Students, take P.E. class seriously. Set fitness goals and try to improve daily.

■ Students, put your phones away and spend part of your free-time unplugged. Talk with friends, get outside or join in a family activity.

Secondary students, always communicate with your teacher about upcoming cocurricular events that will take you out of class. Find out how to make up the missed work and instruction.

■ Secondary students, remember your learning director and counselor are there to help you succeed. If you have a problem – academic, social or emotional – talk with them as there is support available to assist you.

The California Department of Education updated school district enrollment figures recently for the 2023-24 school year. Clovis Unified School District jumped two spots and is now listed as the 12th largest public school district in California with an enrollment of 43,291 students. Previously, CUSD ranked at No. 14. The upward trend in enrollment is anticipated to continue. The district's recent boundary study identified multiple expected housing developments (bringing in new families) planned for communities within Clovis Unified's 198-square mile boundaries in the next years.

Top financial rating for CUSD

Clovis Unified recently received a credit rating of AA/Stable as affirmed by Standard & Poor, making CUSD

having the best credit ranking from among California's 20 largest public school districts. "That means we are going to get a better rate of interest



Child Development

Clovis Unified's Child Development team offers childcare and academic enrichment for those who are in need of services. Activities are designed to be a balance of educational, social, and recreational opportunities for the children attending.

Campus Catering is the name of our team of bakers, cooks, nutritionist and cafeteria employees who create healthful, tasty breakfast and lunch meals that are available at no cost for all Clovis Unified students every school day.

Campus Catering serves more than 5 million meals annually. By introducing a variety of choices like fresh fruits and vegetables, whole grains and lean proteins, the Campus Catering team is teaching students to develop healthy eating habits while also providing a delicious meal to fuel them for learning.

Transportation

Clovis Unified school buses provide transportation to and from school for students who live outside an established radius zone and for those meeting the eligibility criteria for ridership.

All student riders use a bus ID card that is swiped when boarding or departing a bus. Called Tyler Drive, the program helps with student safety, tracking, maintaining seating capacities and ensuring students are departing at the correct bus stop. New this year, parents can download the accompanying app (My Ride K-12) to create an account with their child's student identification number and see when the child has swiped on and off a bus, along with that bus's route and stops.

Bus passes for returning students remain valid to use, and new students who are eligible will be receiving a pass in the first weeks of school. Replacement passes are available for a small fee.


July 17

Welcome to The Ranch! At the July 17 meeting, the Clovis Unified Governing Board celebrated the reveal of the official design for Clovis South High School and Phillip V. Sanchez Intermediate School's Longhorn mascot, letter branding and logo in the schools' colors of navy, burnt orange, gray and white. Part of the future Terry P. Bradley Educational Center opening in August 2025, the secondary schools will ease overcrowding at nearby Reagan Educational Center and accom-



modate projected enrollment growth.

Joining in the festivities were Terry Bradley, Ed.D., a retired, longtime Clovis Unified administrator and superintendent; the family of late Phillip Sanchez, who was a Clovis Unified gradu-

ate, Governing Board trustee and successful Hispanic American who was a U.S. Ambassador; Clovis South Area Superintendent Stephanie Hanks, Ed.D.; and TBEC Principal Sonia Torossian, Ed.D.

Later in the meeting, the Governing Board accepted the Successor Agreement Contract with the CSEA Chapter 250 that was approved by CSEA members in their ratification vote in June. Following that, the board approved a retroactive salary schedule increase for CSEA-represented employees who had not yet received the 5.5% salary schedule increases approved for most other employees in June of 2023.

In other action, the board: Appointed Matt Loggins to the position of deputy principal at Clovis West High.

Adopted Resolution No. 3997 ordering an election to authorize the issuance of a \$400 million general obligation school bonds, establishing specification of the election order, and requesting consolidation with the Nov. 5, 2024, election. If approved, the measure would extend (but not increase) the existing tax rate. (See full story Page 1. Learn more about the proposed bond measure at www. cusd.com/2024bond).

■ Conducted a biennial review of board bylaws and exhibits pertaining to the Conflict of Interest Code.

Approved a new job description for a purchasing supervisor. This new job description is a cost neutral part of a restructuring of the Purchasing Department.

Adopted Resolution No. 3999 declaring the Board's intention to convey an easement to PG&E.

■ Conducted the annual review of Board Policies No. 5112.5 and No. 6145 regarding open/closed campus, leaving the campus; and cocurricular and extra-curricular activities.

June 26

At a special meeting of the Governing Board June 26, the board announced the appointment of current Deputy Principal Jason James to the position of Principal at Clovis West High effective July 1.

In other action, the board: ■ After a Closed Session discussion about the June 20 ruling by the Public Employment Relations Board (PERB) related to an ACE/ CTA complaint against the District and Faculty Senate, reported a unanimous vote authorizing the district to proceed with its analysis of the ruling and, if appropriate to do so, seek reconsideration before PERB or through an appellate review.

Took action to approve construction costs for Increment Four and Utility Yard and Offsite Projects and Road Improvements of the Terry P. Bradley Educational Center and related provisions of the lease-leaseback agreement and authorized the Superintendent or designee to execute the schedule of sublease payments for Increment Four.

June 12

During the June 12 meeting, Citizens Committee to Study Capital Facility Needs volunteer Chairperson Todd Cook reported on the work of a citizens group who spent the past six months studying the state of the district's facilities and finances, future growth plans of the cities of Fresno and Clovis along with parts of Fresno County served by Clovis Unified, and enrollment projections.

According to Cook, members of the committee also commissioned a survey of the community and prioritized project lists before reporting back to the Governing Board their findings. The committee recommended that the board place a \$400 million facility bond on the ballot, which if passed would leave the current tax rate (which is lower than that of neighboring school districts) unchanged, while providing much-needed financial resources to keep the community's schools in good repair and build new schools to avoid overcrowding. The board discussed the report and the needs identified in the study before directing staff to bring an item to their July 17 meeting for consideration.

At the meeting, the board also heard a report on work around the district to increase cultural proficiency and ensure an inclusive and supportive educational environment for all students. A copy of the report is available from the Curriculum, Instruction and Accountability Office or in the agenda materials of the June 12 meeting.

In other action, the board: ■ Announced the appointment of current Clovis High School Learning Director Karen Majchen to the position of Principal at Mickey Cox Elementary School effective July 1. Majchen takes the reins of the school from retiring Principal Cheryl Floth.

■ Congratulated recently appointed school leaders Principal Sean Osterberg of the Clovis Online School, Principal Casey Olson of Clovis Community Day School, Principal Julie Duwe of Kastner Intermediate School, and Principal Amandeep Athwal of Valley Oak Elementary School.

■ Held a hearing to allow for public comment regarding adoption of a fee justification study to establish Level I School Facilities (Developer) Fees and a school facilities needs analysis to adjust Level II Facilities (Developer) Fees, later approving resolutions that set the Level I Fees at \$5.17 per square foot for existing residential development and \$.84 per square foot for commercial/industrial development (effective in 60 days); and Level II Fees of \$5.86 per square foot (effective July 1, 2024).

Approved the 2024-25 district budget, as submitted. The complete budget is available online at cusd.com.

The next regularly scheduled meetings of the Governing Board are Aug. 7 and 28 with open session at 6:30 p.m. in the Board room at 1680 David E. Cook Way. Complete minutes and agendas of meetings are available online at cusd.com.
