> TRANSPORTATION

Clovis Unified school buses provide transportation to and from school for students who live outside an established radius zone and for those meeting the eligibility criteria

for ridership. New this year, all student riders will be given a bus ID card that will be swiped when boarding or departing a bus. Called the Tyler Drive, the program will help with student safety, tracking, maintaining seating capacities and ensuring students are departing at the correct bus stop.

Students residing outside the walk boundaries of their home school will receive a card. Intermediate and High School students will receive their cards when they pick up their back to school packets. Elementary students will receive their cards from their bus driver the first week of school. Students will all be routed to the bus stop closest to their home.

For families new to Clovis Unified, it is helpful to understand the structure of the district and how to interact with us. We highly value peopleto-people connection and want to hear from you.

The district is the 14th largest public education district in California with around 43,000 students. It operates five traditional high schools, five intermediate schools and 34 elementary schools, and it also oversees four alternative education schools, an online school, an outdoor school, an adult education school and jointly operates the Center for Advanced Research and Technology with Fresno Unified.

Clovis Unified's 200-square-mile boundary includes most of the City of Clovis, 20 percent of the City of Fresno and parts of Fresno County.

In order to maintain a smaller, interactive approach, the district is divided into five school areas and an educational service area that each has an overseeing area superintendent.

Each school area includes a high school and its feeder schools. We proudly have Bear Nation (Buchanan), Cougar Country (Clovis), The Wolf Pack (Clovis East), The Stampede (Clovis North) and Eagle Country (Clovis West)! Educational Services includes our online, alternative and specialty schools.

Clovis Unified will always be united in its core values and aims to provide the best education we can to all of our students, and our area structure supports those goals by creating easier access and customized leadership. Smaller areas help keep our growing size in check and allows for people to interact with one another.

KEEP IN TOUCH!

Parents and the community are invited to share comments, questions or concerns by contacting a child's classroom teacher, school administrator or area superintendent. School websites have staff and administrator contact information. During back-to-school night, teachers will review with parents the best method to connect with them – some prefer emails, others like phone calls or texts.

Teachers generally should be a parent's first stop, but parents are always welcome to contact school staff, including the principal or a school's area superintendent as needed.

There are multiple ways Clovis Unified will share information this school year, and we encourage our stakeholders of students, parents, staff and community to watch for these important messages.

Our most frequently updated platform is our website, cusd.com. It should be the first stop when looking for COVID-related updates, district resources, school board agendas or program information. Time-sensitive news will also be sent out through emails as needed; parents and guardians should make sure their contact information on file is accurate.

On a monthly basis, Clovis Unified mails families and employees CUSD Today, from August through June. Our district newspaper - paid for by advertisements by community partners – showcases some of the bigger events and general news of the district while also highlighting many great things going on in our 52 schools.

The district also uses *Two Minutes Today*, a short video blog emailed monthly to parents, to provide information about current news. (Watch for this month's segment that will discuss ways to get ready for the school year and emotional wellness support)

School safety updates

Clovis Unified has spent the last several months evaluating its safety system and procedures. Enhanced training and protocol refinement with current staff, new staff and area law enforcement is ongoing.

The district is implementing a system envisioned last fall that increases the speed of a campus lockdown and allows for quicker messaging to parents. The system includes a new alert system for administrators; teacher training and requiring all classrooms with students present to be locked; and later installing an automated system that can lock unmanned campus doors (library, bathrooms, caleteria, etc.) from a remote location. Students will receive training and safety drill practices on procedures.

Bonner awards

The award recognizes schools' dedication to character development and civic education. Annual information update

Each year Clovis Unified School District requires parents or guardians to review the address, contact phone numbers, emergency and health information for their student that is contained in Parent Connect and to review the district's policies and procedures.

The update process is now in process. Per Clovis Unified policy and student safety, this information must be reviewed and updated before the new school year begins Aug 22. Students will not receive their schedule or teacher assignments until the forms are completed.

Immunizations, physicals available at SV Center

Clovis Unified's Sierra Vista Children's Health Center is open Mondays through Thursdays for immunizations, well-child exams and sports physicals. The services are available to children up to 18 years of age and are free of charge to incomeeligible families. Patients who have Medi-Cal are also eligible for these services as well as those who do not have health insurance coverage. Sports Physicals are \$30, cash only. The center is located on the Sierra Vista Elementary School campus at 510 Barstow Ave., Clovis. Appointments are required and may be scheduled by calling 327-7976.



VISION

Each year holds the potential for greatness

S MUCH as our students anticipate the start of school

with excitement and maybe a little trepidation over the as yet unknown, there is not a teacher around who doesn't do the same. I remember from

my teaching days the eagerness with which I would anticipate the first day of the school year and the first opportunity to meet my students.

Each one had a unique personality and learning style, and it was always a joy to begin the process of getting to know each student, to understand how they learned best, to discover what kinds of things engaged them in lessons and what caused them to lose interest. Who would be the quiet and introspective ones and who would be outgoing and a bit of a chatterbox?

In the weeks leading up to the first day of school, I would pour over their student records, carefully plan out my lessons, ponder how best to ignite a love of learning in their hearts, decorate my room to create a welcoming and inviting environment, and polish desks so that my students' first impression was a great one. I recognized that my work had an impact far beyond any single school year, and that as an educator I was building tomorrow in my classroom today.

Though my role as Superintendent has taken me a few steps away from those earlier days of my career, I know that the same level of detail and preparation is happening at every school and grade level of our district in the weeks leading up to the start of the 2022-23 school year. I also know that as much time and attention our classroom teachers

are putting into readying their instructional space, there is an even larger team of support staff who have spent the past several months focused on the myriad details needed to be ready to

Almost before the final school bell of the 2021-22 school year rang, teams from our maintenance and construction departments were at work on projects to keep our school buildings in good repair.

Our bus drivers have been thoughtfully mapping out efficient transportation routes, so bus riders get to school safely and on time.

Campus catering employees have been developing new recipes and creating inviting lunch and breakfast menus.

School leaders and teams have been planning out events and activities, building opportunities for families to connect to their schools, and laying the groundwork for achieving a high standard in the coming year.

In Clovis Unified, we believe every single employee plays a part in the educational process and has a role to play in the success of our students.

From the school registrar who may be the first contact a new family has

to our district, to the bus drivers who greet students early in the morning and often bid them goodnight after a late game or activity, to the caring nurse who tends to hurts or illness, or our

technology team who ensures stable and secure access to the tools we use for learning and business, the list of people working to ensure we deliver a great educational experience for our students is long and diverse. We want each child to be the best he or she can be in mind, body and spirit, and we're willing to put in the effort to create opportunities for them to achieve their full potential.

TIPS FOR A GREAT SCHOOL YEAR

Start now to prepare and support your child

More than 43,000 students will return to Clovis Unified's campuses Aug. 22, but helping students now can give them a great start to having a successful school

The following recommendations are offered by Clovis Unified teachers, staff and administrators that will help children get ready!

BEFORE SCHOOL STARTS

- Visit school to help your student become familiar with where things are. Be sure to find your child's classroom, or classrooms for those in intermediate or high school. Note where the restroom, library, cafeteria and nurse's office are located.
- Identify your child's drop-off and pick-up meeting place on the school site. If a child is participating in Campus Club or taking a bus home, be sure he or she knows where to go.
- If your child will be walking to school, practice the route. If possible, arrange for your child to walk to school with a friend or child in the neighborhood.
- Visit the school website. It contains valuable information including school start and end times, Back-to-School Night dates, lunch menus, and details about getting involved in co-curricular activities. There is also a full listing of teachers and administrative staff, including contact information.
- If your child is interested in sports or co-curricular activities, find out through on the website how to get involved and when signups are. Help your child prepare and begin to train or practice.
- Ease students back into a regular school schedule. The week before school starts, have students go to bed and wake up earlier a little more each day, moving them closer to what the school bedtime/wake-up routine will be. (Many Clovis Unified school starting and ending times have been changed - be sure to check our your school's website for this year's bell schedule.)
- Grab a good book. If students have not been reading this summer, there is still time to warm up those skills. Have bedtime reading with younger students.
- Set up a homework station in the home. Find the best place for students to get their work done, and have kids help as you equip it with necessary supplies.
- Go back-to-school shopping. Take inventory of what your child has and fill in the gaps with what he or she needs. Keep in mind Clovis Unified's dress code if

through the school website), class supply lists are available. Other items to consider are a backpack, water bottle or athletic shoes.

- Talk about what that first day may be like and ask your child how he or she feels about it. Offer reassurance, enthusiasm and support. Let them know it's OK to be nervous and let them know that lots of other students feel the very same way.
- Have your child plan out what he or she will wear for the first day of school.
- Encourage your student to enter the new school year with a mindset of meeting new people and having new experiences. Talk about getting involved at school and joining at least one activity such as a club, academic or sports team, or the performing arts.
- Fuel the body well. Take a shopping trip with your child now to help choose foods that are nutritious and that they will enjoy bringing to school.
- Pre-make a few dinners that can be frozen. Having meals ready the first week of school can help the whole family keep things running smooth.

AFTER SCHOOL STARTS

- Make sure your child eats breakfast before school. Have students bring a water bottle to keep hydrated throughout the day. Pack a good lunch. Send a few healthy snacks.
- Be sure your child gets enough sleep. Doctors recpurchasing clothes. On many teachers' websites (found ommend children up to the fifth grade get as much as 10

- to 11 hours of sleep each night.
- Establish regular weekday routines for school, homework, mealtime and bedtime.
- Have your child go to bed organized with backpack, P.E., or co-curricular clothes and equipment ready for the next day.
 - Make lunches the night before.
- Drive safe. Stop when the school bus red lights are flashing, indicating students are boarding or exiting, and pay attention to crossing guards and school speed limits.
- Keep informed through the school's website. Review all materials the school sends home.
- If the first couple of days are a little difficult: remain positive and calm. Let your child know you care and are there to support him or her.
- Check in with your child after school. Review homework. Follow your student's progress on Parent Connect. If a child begins to struggle in a subject, talk it over with his or her teacher.
- Help your child learn how to keep organized by creating check lists or using a daily planner. Students should note their homework assignments, upcoming deadlines, practice schedules, club meeting times, when permission slips are due and any other important dates.
- Plan some down time for your child. Kids do better having some time to play or relax. Encourage them to go outside, listen to music, ride a bike or play a game.
- Attend Back-to-School Night and meet your child's teacher. This informative night provides parents with an understanding about the structure and expectations.
- Consider volunteering in your child's class, library
- Students, don't procrastinate. Plan your week ahead and don't leave things until the last minute. Pack your backpack the night before.
- Students, take P.E. class seriously. Set fitness goals and try to improve daily.
- Students, put your phones away and spend part of your free-time unplugged. Talk with friends, get outside or join in a family activity.
- Secondary students, always communicate with your teacher about upcoming co-curricular events that will take you out of class. Find out how to make up the missed work and instruction.
- Secondary students, remember your learning director and counselor are there to help you succeed. If you have a problem - academic, social or emotional - talk with them as there is support available to assist you.

> BOARD BRIEFS

July 13

The Clovis Unified Governing Board continued preparing for the upcoming school year by appointing new leaders to positions vacated by recent retirements, promotions or growth. At the July 13 meeting, the board approved:

■ Janette Garcia Zuniga, currently Director of Child Nutrition in Sanger Unified School District, to Director of Campus Catering.

■ Carrie Carter, currently Director of Special Education, to Administrator, Special Education. This position assumes additional leadership responsibilities in the District's growing special education programs.

■ Carlos Zuniga to learning director at Clovis North High, Hailey Bonds to learning director at Clovis West High, and Amandeep Athwal to learning director at Clovis East High.

In other action, the board:

■ Accepted requests for annual community funded bus routes.

■ Accepted the fourth quarter Williams Report in which the district received zero complaints.

■ Awarded bids for custodial supplies and musical instruments for use in the district's schools.

■ Approved an amendment to the Superintendent's contract related to annual salary.

■ Approved a new job description for an Assistant Director of Nursing Services to support growing needs in the nursing services de-

■ Scheduled a public hearing to sunshine a proposal for an initial collective bargaining agreement between the district and ACE Psychologists and Mental Health Support Providers.

June 8

The Governing Board accepted the recommendation of the 40-member Employee Compensation Committee and approved a 7% salary schedule increase effective July 1 and set aside \$12.8 million in the 2022-23 budget to be used to begin implementation, once complete, of the salary schedule market study that was begun in the current fiscal year. Members of the Employee Compensation Committee worked over the year to develop the recommendation and will continue to work on the analysis and data provided by Koff and Associates at the start of the coming year. Also approved in the recommendation is:

■ A continuation of the daily and long-term substitute teacher rates that were increased on a temporary basis this year to \$165 and \$175 daily

■ Elementary and secondary class coverage stipends started on a temporary basis this year will remain in place into the fu-

■ \$1 million earmarked for use to increase hours of some classified positions to now be eligible for health benefits

In other action, the board:

■ Approved a resolution honoring retiring employees of the district. Earlier in the day, a special event was held to recognize the 134 employees who retired during the past year and thank them for their combined service of more than 2,400 years.

■ Approved the district's 2022-23 Budget, and the annual Education Protection Account as submitted.

■ Approved the 2022-23 Local Control and Accountability Plan (LCAP).
