Cahuilla Desert Academy is a premier Middle School, determined to improve all students for success through research-based instruction. Our long-term goal is to prepare our students for a "College Ready" focus and be high school ready. To achieve this long-term goal we offer AVID, CTE classes, and other support classes to improve our students' opportunities toward preparing for high school. Cahuilla Desert Academy is a 7th and 8th grade Middle School, comprised of 98.6% Hispanic, 0.1% African-American, 0.3% American-Indian, 0.8% Anglo-American, and 0.1% Two or More Races. During the 2020-21 school year, Cahuilla Desert Academy had approximately 797 students enrolled, including 89.3% socioeconomically disadvantaged students, 12.4% students with disabilities, 28.1% English Language Learners, 5.0% Migrant students, 0.6% Homeless Youth and 0.3% Foster Youth.

2021-22 Quality, Currency, Availability of Textbooks and Other Instructional Materials

All textbooks used in the core curriculum at Bobby Duke Middle School are being aligned to the Common Core State Standards. Instructional materials are selected from the state's most recent list of standards-based materials and adopted by the State Board of Education. The district follows the State Board of Education's adoption cycle for core content materials (English/language arts, math, science, and social science).

On September 16, 2021 the Coachella Valley Unified School District's Board of Trustees held a public hearing to certify the extent to which textbooks and instructional materials have been provided to students. The Board of Trustees adopted Resolution No. 2022-06 which certifies as required by Education Code §60119 (1) that textbooks and instructional materials were provided to all students, including English learners, in the district to the extent that each pupil has a textbook or instructional materials, or both, to use in class and to take home, (2) sufficient textbooks and instructional materials were provided to each student, including English learners, that are aligned to the academic content standards and consistent with the cycles and content of the curriculum frameworks in math, science, history-social, science, and English/language arts, including the English language development component of an adopted program, 3) sufficient textbooks or instructional materials were provided to each pupil enrolled in foreign language or health classes, and 4) laboratory science equipment was available for science laboratory classes offered in grades 9-12, inclusive.

In addition to core subject areas, districts are required to disclose in their SARCs the sufficiency of instructional materials used for their visual/performing arts curricula. During the 2021-22 school year, Coachella Valley Unified School District provided each student, including English learners, enrolled in a visual/performing arts class with a textbook or instructional materials to use in class and to take home. These materials complied with the state's content standards and curriculum frameworks.

School Facility Conditions and Planned Improvements

School Facilities and Maintenance:

The district takes great effort to ensure that all schools are clean, safe, and functional through proper facilities maintenance and campus supervision. Cahuilla Desert Academy's original facilities were built in 1995; ongoing maintenance and campus improvements ensure facilities remain up to date and provide adequate space for students and staff.

District maintenance and site custodial staff ensure that the repairs necessary to keep the school in good condition are completed in a timely manner. A work order process is used by school and district staff to communicate non-routine maintenance requests.

Every morning before school begins, the custodian inspects facilities for safety hazards or other conditions that need attention prior to students and staff entering school grounds. One day custodian and two evening custodians are assigned to Cahuilla Desert Academy. The day custodian is responsible for:

- Cafeteria Cleanup/Setup
- General Maintenance
- Moving Furniture
- Special Events Preparations/Setup
- Fulfilling Teacher Requests

Planned 2021-2022 Campus Improvements:

- * Banners on the fence in parent pick-up area
- * Update exterior murals
- * Replace LCD projectors in classrooms
- * Update sound system in Multi-Purpose Room/Gym
- * Display PBIS school wide expectations around campus

Campus Supervision

School administration and teaching staff place a high priority on providing adequate adult supervision on campus before, during, and after school. The following individuals are in the entrance areas and designated common areas to greet and supervise students: administration, four yard supervisors, two counselors, and two security officers. Cahuilla Desert Academy is a closed campus. During school hours, all visitors must sign in at the school's office and wear identification badges while on school grounds.

Condition of Facilities - Riverside County Williams Inspection Results

On an annual basis, representatives from the Riverside County Office of Education visit Coachella Valley Unified School District's schools that are in the API Decile Ranks 1-3. The inspection is designed to evaluate and verify that school facilities conditions are in "good repair" and that any deficiencies are accurately reported in the School Accountability Report Cards. The most recent facility inspection for Cahuilla Desert Academy completed by the county took place on November 17, 2021. Results of the inspection are provided in table below.

Where the most viable option, LEAs were required to administer the statewide summative assessment in ELA and mathematics. Where a statewide summative assessment was not the most viable option for the LEA (or for one or more grade-level[s] within the LEA) due to the pandemic, LEAs were allowed to report results from a different assessment that met the criteria established by the State Board of Education (SBE) on March 16, 2021. The assessments were required to be:

- Aligned with CA CCSS for ELA and mathematics;
- Available to students in grades 3 through 8, and grade 11; and

Options

Note that the CAAs could only be administered in-person following health and safety requirements. The district offers two distinct programs to support professional growth and improve instruction in the classroom. The Beginning Teacher Induction Program program offers support and assistance to newly credentialed teachers. All participating new teachers are provided peer support over a two-year period.

The Peer Assistance and Review (PAR) program is available to veteran teachers who need to improve instructional skills, classroom management strategies, subject knowledge, and/or related aspects of their teaching performance. Experienced and knowledgeable veteran teachers, referred to as "coaches", are paired with teachers referred to the PAR program to provide individualized guidance, support, and training. Classified staff receive job-related training from qualified district personnel and consultants. Special education aides received specialized training from district office personnel. Long-term substitute teachers are invited to attend designated training sessions.

Site-Based Training:

Cahuilla Desert Academy works with the Coachella Valley Unified School District to focus on site-based areas of study and to improve instructional practices, address areas needing improvement, and implement new programs for improved student learning. Through collaborative efforts of school and district representatives, professional training concentrations are identified based upon teacher survey results, student performance data analysis results, past practices, and new programs. Training activities are designed to complement and support district-wide training efforts.

Staff development takes place throughout the year before school, after school, and through teacher release time. During the 2021-22 school year, teacher training activities focused on:
