STATE OF THE COPIAGUE SCHOOLS

The Copiague School District hosted its annual Community Summit, "Believing and Achieving," on March 1. Welcoming more than 200 community members, as well as local legislators, superintendents and Board of Education presidents from surrounding communities, the Copiague Board of Education and administration delivered a state of the district report, focusing on the district's finances and aging infrastructure.

A main focus of the summit was the Gap Elimination Adjustment. Formerly known as the Deficit Reduction Assessment, the GEA legislation was first introduced for the 2010-11 fiscal year as a way to help New York State close its then \$10 billion budget deficit. Under the legislation, a portion of the funding shortfall at the state level is divided among all school districts throughout the state and reflected as a reduction in school district state aid. Since the GEA was introduced, Copiague has lost more than \$16 million in state aid and expects to lose another \$4.5 million for the 2014-15 school year.

"Could you imagine what we could do with \$4.5 million?" asked Board President Michael Greb. "There is a major push throughout the state to eliminate the GEA. What we need is all of the organizations here today to help get the word out to our legislators that we need to eliminate the GEA."

Added Superintendent of Schools

Charles A. Leunig, "We are receiving \$900 less per student in state aid, and that doesn't include our growing enrollment. When you factor in our increasing student population, add another \$400 less per student in state aid. However, while our fiscal situation becomes more precarious by the day, educationally, the state of the Copiague schools is still solvent and our children are in great hands."

To help further educate attendees on the GEA, the district invited Dr. Richard G. Timbs, Executive Director of the State School Finance Consortium, to present his findings on the GEA and fiscal inequities occurring throughout the state.

Also during the summit, audience members were introduced to the Class of 2014 top 10 and enjoyed performances by Eric Dobmeier's Walter G. O'Connell Copiague High School jazz band, high school senior Duvanny Banegas and Susan E. Wiley Elementary School second-grade students in Diana Daniels' class. They also watched a video compiled by Executive Director of Technology Todd Harris and Technology Trainer Dennis Pettas and participated in a world café facilitated by National Leadership Development Consultant Dr. Ray Jorgensen. To conclude the event, attendees exited through the gymnasium, where a student and community expo was set up to provide a glimpse of the exciting offerings within the schools and community.

Recognized for Leadership


Board of Education members throughout New York State qualify for recognition by participating in varied New York School Boards Association Board developmental activities.

This year's project required students to innovate a solution that would help society better cope with natural disasters. Copiague's team developed the inexpensive, fast and efficient First Aid Delivery System, which can deliver many different types of first aid-related services to stranded victims who are waiting for rescue. For their project, the team performed research on the Internet, in magazines and photos, and by speaking with professionals in local rescue units and the military, as well as Superstorm Sandy victims.

"Their research included many STEM topics, such as the science behind natural disasters, the problems associated with them, the math behind triangular geometry, GPS, laser range finders, design and engineering of a new invention, existing solutions, patents, trademarks and marketing," said Mr. Phillips.








Winter Sports Awards

VOTER REGISTRATION

It is important that you play an active role in deciding how your child will be educated. Continuous voter registration is available in the office of the District Clerk from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m., Monday through Friday, when school is in session, for both the Copiague School District and Copiague Public Memorial Library. For more information, contact the District Clerk at 842-4015. Residents who have voted or registered at any Annual or Special School District meeting or election held within the last four (4) years, or have voted at a general election or been registered with the Board of Elections of Suffolk County within the last four (4) years, are eligible to vote. The last day to register for this vote is Tuesday, May 13, 2014.

If you would like to register to vote, you must:

- Be a citizen of the United States
- Be 18 years of age or over
- Be a resident of the Copiague School District for at least 30 days prior to the voting date.

Absentee Ballots

Applications for absentee ballots are available at the Office of the District Clerk and must be completed and returned at least seven days before the election if the ballot is to be mailed to the voter, or the day before the election if the ballot is to be delivered personally to the voter.
