A Message from the Superintendent

Dear Residents,

Welcome to our Winter 2014 issue of Copiague Connections, our official district newsletter. As you receive this latest edition, the first half of the school year is just coming to a close. This issue provides highlights of the many activities, initiatives and events that have taken place in our schools during the last few months since our fall newsletter was published. Featured in this latest issue are articles about our annual Road to College activities, this year's Top 10 Students from the class of 2014, our annual Senior to Senior Dinner, Board Recognition, our Saturday Academy program, student athletic achievements, highlights of our science program and a variety of other great activities involving Copiague students.

I would also like to draw your attention to an item on this page entitled: "Space and Facilities Advisory Committee Update," which highlights recent developments related to our planning for a much needed capital project to address both infrastructure deterioration and additional space needed as a result of enrollment growth. As the Board of Education and I have been discussing publicly for more than a year now, our buildings' aging infrastructures are in need of maintenance, as many building systems such as plumbing, heating, etc. are approaching the end of their useful life. Add to this a growth trend in enrollment, which has been going on for a couple of years and is anticipated to continue for a few more years, which is unique on Long Island, where the overall population has actually declined. The growth in enrollment in our schools has resulted in every usable space being utilized in our elementary schools, as well as the middle and high schools becoming tighter in space. The Committee will be working throughout the remainder of this school year to help formulate a plan to address both needs. Stay tuned for more information as they make progress.

And finally, once again we are in budget season. The Board and Administration are in the process of building next year's school budget, which, like our budgets over the past five years, is a challenge to put together, as state aid and other revenue sources have continued to decrease. We are hopeful that the uptick in the state's economy will translate into more of a state aid increase this year. The Board and I hope that you participate in the budgeting process by attending our upcoming budget work sessions and providing your input. Between our facilities and our children, we have a huge responsibility to protect our investment and we need your help.

Space and Facilities Advisory Committee Update

The Space and Facilities Advisory Committee has been meeting monthly since October to review the District's current facilities and infrastructure conditions, as well as projected enrollment growth, to determine future facility space and maintenance options to meet those needs

As the committee reviews packets of information, some recent examples of infrastructure deterioration being experienced throughout the District include, but are not limited to, the following:

- In September 2013, the District experienced an underground electrical failure at the high school as the result of aging electrical equipment installed in 1968, when the school was first built.
- In October 2013, a sinkhole developed in front of the middle school, the result of an original drywell that had collapsed.
- In November 2013, a high-pressure hot water heating main ruptured where the 1961 addition to the middle school connects to the original 1958 building.
- In December 2013, Deauville Gardens Elementary School experienced a water main break, which forced the emergency relocation of students and staff as well as an additional daylong closure of the building.

The frequency of these issues indicates that our aging buildings and grounds infrastructure is in need of extensive repairs as systems in buildings require constant maintenance yet still have a limited life span. As part of the planning process for a future capital project to address these needs, in December, the Board of Education appointed the firm Turner Construction as Construction Manager for this anticipated work. Shortly, we anticipate the Board choosing an Architectural/Engineering firm, as well. Both firms will be working closely with the committee over the course of the school year to provide input on the necessary ingredients for this capital project that we anticipate presenting to the community in the fall of 2014.

Making Their MARK -ON SCIENCE

Copiague Students Named Finalists in the SSEP Mission 5 to the International Space Station

Students in Joseph Vanasco's Advanced Placement chemistry class at Walter G. O'Connell Copiague High School were selected as finalists in the Student Space Flight Experiments Program Mission 5 to the International Space Station.

"We utilized the writing research lab and database, with assistance

from librarian Beth Kattleman, as well as laptop carts, independent research and experimental design, all the while using logistical planning and parameters of limitation," said Mr. Vanasco. "It was an awesome experience for our students."

The students' proposal, "The Effects of Microgravity on the



Growth Rate of Tumor Cells," was one of three finalist proposals selected for the opportunity to fly to the International Space Station. According to the SSEP, if the project were selected, it would have been ferried to the ISS using one of a variety of transport vehicles such as the Russian Soyuz, the SpaceX Dragon, or Orbital Sciences Cygnus. Once the vehicle docked, the student experiments would have been transferred to the ISS where the astronauts would perform the necessary protocols for the SSEP student research mission.

According to the student proposal, "This experiment is designed to determine if the rate of tumor growth after exposure to a tumor suppressor is affected in a microgravity environment compared to terrestrial conditions." The students who participated

in the proposal are co-principal investigators Heather Konko and Zachary Wilson and collaborators Joseph Amorosino, Marica Aracena, Maryann Assaf, Bryan Bena, Thomas Clark, Nadia Dudley, Christopher Dundon, William Estevez, Gabriela Figueroa, Michael Hararah, William Hernandez, Eduardo Ortega, Montell Robinson, Carlos Saravia and Steven Velasquez.

The SSEP (http://ssep.ncesse. org) is undertaken by the National Center for Earth and Space Science Education (NCESSE; http://ncesse. org) in partnership with Nanoracks, LLC. This on-orbit educational research opportunity is enabled through NanoRacks, LLC, which is working in partnership with NASA under a Space Act Agreement as part of the utilization of the International Space Station as a National Laboratory.

Science Stars

In the District's continuing efforts to expand science, technology, engineering and mathematics opportunities for its students, Copiague Middle School hosted its first science fair on Dec. 10. Forty-three student participants in the science core and science research classes presented their projects in class, with select works chosen for the building-level fair. Projects at the fair included figuring out if eco-friendly laundry detergent was really eco-friendly; whether what is served in the school cafeteria is actually what students want to eat; and discovering if fingerprints are an inherited trait.

During the fair, students had to present their findings in an articulate and well-thought-out process to the judges, including middle school staff members, Walter G. O'Connell Copiague High School science teachers and science research students, as well as special guest judges from the Cradle of Aviation Museum and Renewable Energy Long Island. Each judge was supplied with a rubric where students were awarded up to 10 points in each category, including originality of project, oral and visual presentation of findings, and the validity of findings. One overall winner, two second-place finishers and five awards


for third place were presented. Special awards for artwork, STEM and future scientists were also given out. Once all of the projects were evaluated, Brittany Faustin and her project on "CAPTCHAS," which are distorted text images used to verify a computer user is human and not a computer program, placed first. Brittany's research concluded that younger people are able "see" the proper images in the CAPTCHA more accurately than older people.

"It's always been our ambition to show what great stuff happens in Copiague," said Middle School Chairperson of Science Dr. Daniel Leccese. "I think it is a great opportunity for our kids to feel empowered and have that sense of accomplishment."

Principal Andrew Lagnado added, "We've worked hard over the years to offer our students multiple opportunities in STEM. The science fair is just one aspect and we look forward to growing our program, which will ultimately benefit the students as they move on in their educational and professional careers."

According to Dr. Leccese, the school hopes to enter many of the student projects in upcoming islandwide science competitions.

Planning for Many

As an extension of its Road to College initiative, on Oct. 28 the Copiague School District hosted an evening college and community service fair for students and parents in grades 6-12. With more than 100 colleges in attendance from across the country, Copiague families were afforded a diverse array of options to obtain information. To begin the night, each family was presented with an oversized canvas bag to hold all of the college information packets, a list of the colleges and community organizations in attendance, and a sample list of important questions to ask.

In addition to the fairs, ninth-graders and their parents were invited into the auditorium for an introduction to the college process. During the program, Superintendent of School Charles A. Leunig and Director of Guidance Mary Klein spoke about the importance of grades, SAT scores, being involved in school clubs and active in the community, and how to set up a resume to make sure it shines for admissions officers.

"Our district and our resources are here to help you realize that dream of college," said Mr. Leunig. "Let's make that dream a reality."





College Day

Recognizing the importance of higher education and early plann the Copiague School District hosted its sixth annual College Day of Jan 10. Following months of planning, each school hosted various e centered on getting students excited about the prospect of attend college. The goal of the initiative is to create a positive college-goin culture among the young students, and to have every child achieve or her potential and be college and career ready by the time he or graduates high school.

"The purpose behind the creation of College Day is to empower Copiague's students to aspire to higher education," explained Superintendent of Schools Charles A. Leunig.

Throughout the day, various events and activities were held within each building with a focus on different college majors and career opportul Learning about the law, fifth-graders at Great Neck Road Elementary School hosted a mock trial based on "Goldilocks and the Three Bears"; Deauville Gardens East Elementary School was transformed into a university, with students traveling to various schools to learn different discip Deauville Gardens West Elementary School hosted a student performance that spotlighted careers in the performing arts; and fifth-graders at SE. At Walter G. O'Connell Copiague High School and Copiague Middle School, students were provided with information regarding which classes they can take now that will help them in their postsecondary careers, as well as various occupations related to specific departments. They were treated to visits from alumni who spoke about their own careers and the paths they took to get there.

SuccessonSaturday

For many years, the Copiague School District has recognized the importance of reaching out to its English language learners and offering them ample opportunities for success. One program offered for this purpose is the Saturday Academy. Funded by federal Title III grant money, at no cost to district taxpayers, the Saturday Academy services 240 students in grades K-12 and offers ESL classes, as well as bilingual Regents prep courses for high school students in algebra, geometry, U.S. history and global history. In addition, the 20-week program offers the students breakfast and transportation.

"These courses are a great opportunity for our beginning English learners to catch up," said Michelle Budion, District Coordinator of English Language Learners. "We try to make the program fun while language-rich for the students." She continued, "Each week we have 14 teachers, three teaching assistants and nine student volunteers who

assist classes at different levels. Many of the student volunteers went through the Saturday program when they were in ESL; however, in the past three years, we've had high school students interested in volunteer hours participate in the program even though they were never ESL students."

One student volunteer is Walter G. O'Connell Copiague High School sophomore Katherine Morales, who tutors math. "I like coming here to help my friends," she said. "The classes are smaller and it helps them express what they've learned a little more easily."

In addition to the student programs, the Saturday Academy offers English and citizenship classes for adults. "This program has strengthened the home-school connection that we all know is directly connected to our students' success," said Ms. Budion. "Because the parents come here on Saturdays,

they begin to feel comfortable coming into their children's schools. We make them aware of the bilingual clerical, counseling, teaching and administrative staff available to them in each building throughout the District."

The Saturday program is also used as a vehicle to disseminate information to parents that will



help them and their families in other areas. As Ms. Budion explained, "We have brought in speakers to educate our parents about breast cancer screenings, mental health resources, available assistance in relation to Hurricane Sandy, and informational assistance for filing taxes. We are constantly looking for ways to expand the information and resources we offer families by bringing more community organizations in to speak at the program."

High school sophomore Jessi Garcia volunteers his time on Saturday to act as a translator, while his parents attend the program to better their English skills. "My parents feel great because they get a chance to learn English," he said. "This way, they can look for a specific job they really want to do. I'm glad Copiague does this, because it shows students and adults that they can have a better future."





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DEAUVILLE STUDENTS MAKE Healthy Choices

Each year, as part of Red Ribbon Week activities, students at Deauville Gardens East and West elementary schools participate in the Run Against Drugs. Registration requirements include proof of the child's age, residence within the boundaries of the Copiague School District, and immunizations against polio, measles, rubella (German measles), mumps, diphtheria and hepatitis B. Additional information on immunizations should be requested from your child's physician. A law recently enacted in 2008 expands a physical to include a Dental Health Screening.
