Over the years, Sherri served as cooperating teacher for several student teachers, provided staff development for Copiague teachers, and was selected as a mentor for first-year teachers. In her retirement, she is continuing as both a staff developer and mentor to new teachers in Copiague.

Beyond work, Sherri is an active member of the Long Island Greenbelt Trails Conference. She also enjoys kayaking, camping, and travel, and is a trustee of the Walt Whitman Birthplace Association, home of America's most influential poet.
