Joe credits his foster parents, his church, and his educational experiences in the Copiague Public Schools with establishing who he is. He vividly recalls many memories from his classroom days: making mayonnaise in kindergarten, earning a penmanship award in the fourth grade, and tenth-grade geometry with Mr. Vargas, to name a few. He notes that he was an average student until junior high school where he was motivated by the Assistant Principal, Mrs. Muriel Gunthorpe. He went on to become the Valedictorian of his class. He earned a second Bachelor's degree in computer science and served as the Executive Officer of a naval combatant ship home ported in Pearl Harbor, Hawaii. After serving 18 years, he retired from the Navy as Lieutenant Commander. Joe returned to teaching math in Norfolk and is now an Assistant Professor of Mathematics at Tidewater Community College.
