While completing work underground at Great Neck Road Elementary School, a fallout shelter was discovered with items dating back to the early 1960s. Desks and chairs for several hundred students were located in the shelter, as well as survival supplies furnished by the Office of Civil Defense, including biscuits, drinking water and sanitary supplies.
