A Shift in Presenting Voting Information

At the end of the 2017-18 school year, the Department of Justice reminded Long Island schools about the Voting Rights Act of 1965, which ensures there shall be no discrimination in voting rights. The Department of Justice will now require school districts to provide voting information in the form of newsletter articles, website stories, banners, flyers, etc., in the predominant languages for each jurisdiction. Last year, English and Spanish were deemed by the federal government to be the predominant languages spoken in Nassau and Suffolk counties. Therefore, moving forward, the District will be providing all voting information in both English and Spanish.
