Linguistic: the ability to think in words and to use language to express and appreciate complex meanings. It allows us to understand the order and meaning of words and to apply metalinguistic skills to reflect on our use of language.

 High school students showcased the rigorous and thought-provoking curriculum of the Advanced Placement program.

Logical-Mathematical:

the ability to calculate, quantify, consider propositions and hypotheses, and carry out complete mathematical operations.

 High school students highlighted their logical-mathematical creativity through participation in programs such as Business Olympics and the Mathematical Research course. **Existential:** sensitivity and capacity to tackle deep questions about human existence.

• Elementary STEM students highlighted their studies and explorations in robotics and their reflections on various issues surrounding artificial intelligence.

 High school students explored the personal connections to life's mysteries through creative writing and poetry. Visual-Spatial: the ability to think in three dimensions. Core capacities include mental imagery, spatial reasoning, image manipulation, graphic and artistic skills, and an active imagination.

 The middle school's Accelerated Studio Art course and Creative Crafts Club, and Deauville Gardens West's Art Club and Sewing and Design Club are all examples of the unique opportunities available for students to create original art both during and outside of the regular school day.

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Naturalist: the human ability to discriminate among living things (plants, animals) as well features of the natural world (closed rock configurations).

Interpersonal: the ability to understand and interact effectively with others. It involves effective verbal and nonverbal communication, sensitivity to the moods and temperaments of others and the ability to entertain multiple perspectives.

• Through the creative experience of the middle school National History Day Competition and Susan E. Wiley's fifth-grade wax museum, students learned various perspectives of significant historical figures that have shaped history.

Musical: the capacity to discern pitch, rhythm, timbre and tone. It enables humans to recognize, create, reproduce and reflect on music as demonstrated by composers, conductors, musicians, vocalists and sensitive listeners.

- High school students compose, arrange and perform their own musical creations in the Music Theory course.
- Great Neck Road students develop their musical creativity through NYSSMA practice and participation.

Kinesthetic: the capacity to manipulate objects and use a variety of physical skills. It involves a sense of timing and the perfection of skills through mind-body union.

- Middle school thespians shared video and photos of their production of "Fame Jr."



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
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Admin Offices Renamed for LONGTIME BOE MEMBER
