
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The soggy weather didn't dampen the spirts of the Copiague School District community as they came out in force to celebrate homecoming.

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SUPPORT SERVICES: A Team Effort in Copiague

Supporting the social and emotional needs of its students is top of mind in Copiague. The district understands that now, more than ever, the mental health and well-being of its student body remain top priorities. With that in mind, the district has enhanced its already robust support staff team, which now includes 40 members ranging from counselors and social workers to psychologists and more.

The district is working hard to address the unique needs of its students and their families at every level. Support

staff work with students to ensure a safe school environment and reinforce positive behaviors and decision making. The district's youngest students are encouraged to be role models for their peers. As they move to the middle school and high school, support services vary from social-emotional learning lessons to college and career planning.

Inside is a more in-depth look at some of the services offered by the Copiague support staff team.

STRONG SUPPORT on All Levels

During the last
eight years, the district has
increased the number of
positions within pupil personnel
support services by 60%. With
that, the district has added
many new programs and
various levels of support within
all the buildings. Here are
some examples of Copiague's
offerings:

Elementary
support teams highlight
monthly character traits and
reinforce the messages
throughout the month.
Classroom push-in lessons
also include activities such
as Start With Hello, getting
along with friends and
regulating emotions.

Additional psychologists support the special education programs.

A full-time college
and career counselor helps
students with their applications
and decision-making for their
postsecondary plans. College
fair participation has also
become more robust, including
those for historically Black
colleges and universities,
national Hispanic college fairs
and partnerships with local
colleges.

Every elementary school building has a full-time social worker, guidance counselor and psychologist.

Through the enhancement of staff, opportunities exist for one-on-one counseling and group counseling sessions.

A bilingual community resource guide is available on the district's website to help community members connect to various resources.

Last year, the middle school has launched a character education program that recognizes those students who exhibit positive behaviors. Monthly activities are planned to celebrate those chosen each month.

A district psychologist serves as a behavioral consultant and assists students and teachers. She also serves as a consultant to all the building teams to offer research-based behavioral techniques to support students.

All of the district's social workers are bilingual.
