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Copiague Named to AP Achievement District Honor Roll

The Copiague School District is one of only 388 school districts nationwide to be honored by the College Board with a place on its Advanced Placement (AP) Achievement District Honor Roll for opening AP classroom doors to a significantly broader pool of students, while maintaining or improving the percentage of students earning scores of 3 or higher. New this year, the AP Achievement District Honor Roll nationally recognizes and acknowledges Copiague's success and efforts to expand AP access, performance, and commitment to increasing student achievement.

"In Copiague, we continually strive to offer our students opportunities in which they can succeed," stated Superintendent of Schools Charles A. Leunig. "Through our K-12 College Planning Initiative we are encouraging students to continue their education at an early age. By offering AP courses to our juniors and seniors they are able to begin the road to college while still in high school."

From 2008 to 2010, Copiague Public Schools has increased the number of students

Offering Advanced Options

Walter G. O'Connell Copiague High School currently offers thirteen rigorous Advanced Placement (AP) courses for students in eleventh and twelfth grade (sophomores can enroll in World History). The AP Program is a cooperative education endeavor between secondary schools and colleges and universities. Students, while enrolled in high school, can participate in an AP course and receive college credits.

The AP Program at the high school is very strong and diverse in its offerings. The courses include English Literature and Composition, English Language and Composition, United States Government and Politics, Psychology, Calculus AB, Biology, Physics B, Chemistry, Macro and Micro Economics, World History, and Spanish Literature.



participating in AP from 132 to 169 while the percentage of students earning AP Exam scores of 3 or higher, the score typically needed to earn college credit, from 41 percent in 2008 to 50 percent in 2010.

"Participation in college-level AP courses can level the playing field for underserved students, give them the confidence needed to succeed in college, and raise standards and performance in key subjects like science and math," said College Board President Gaston Caperton. "The AP Achievement List districts are defying expectations by expanding access while enabling their students to maintain or improve their AP Exam scores."

The award was given based on an established list of criteria, including, but not limited to, examination of three years of AP data, from 2008 to 2010, demonstration of an increase in participation in and access to AP courses.

Campaigning for Copiague

More than 200 community residents, staff members and invited guests gave up their free time on a Saturday morning to participate in the Copiague School District's annual Legislative Breakfast. The Board of Education and administration welcomed New York State Senator Owen H. Johnson, New York State Assemblyman Robert K. Sweeney, Suffolk County Legislator Wayne Horsley, and a representative from Suffolk County Legislator DuWayne Gregory's office to boast of student and staff accomplishments, while at the same time stressing the significant negative impact reduced financial assistance would create for the District.

"Twenty years ago, when Mario Cuomo was Governor, he drastically cut state aid to school districts. It took Copiague 17 years to recover," stated Superintendent of Schools Charles A. Leunig. "Since that time, Copiague has made great strides in student achievement. This year, Governor Andrew Cuomo has proposed significant cuts to schools. Copiague simply cannot afford to go backwards."

Added Board of Education President Laura Gavey, "In the last few years, our story has been one of growth and achievement, something that all of us in this room today can be proud of. Providing our students with a well-rounded education with the funding available to us is becoming almost impossible. The Copiague School District that we know today will be different next year, but know that we are not alone."

Following Mr. Leunig's open letter to Governor Cuomo, the politicians in attendance spoke to the audience and gave their take on the budget and current economic crisis being faced by the state. "I know we're talking doom and gloom, but every time I come to Copiague, I get inspired," said Senator Johnson.

During the breakfast, attendees were wowed by a performance from the Madrigal Choir, under the direction of Larry Wurtzel with accompaniment by Gina Occhiogrosso. They also viewed a video presentation, put together by Director of Technology Todd Harris, which highlighted student achievements and the numerous extracurricular and athletic activities available to Copiague students. Nine of the District's Class of 2011 Top Ten, along with their families, were also introduced. Their impressive resumes and career goals are a testament to the education and encouragement they have received.



A DAY AT SCHOOL

On Wednesday, March 23, members of the Copiague Board of Education toured the District and visited various classrooms during a special "Day at School." Throughout the day, each Board member spent approximately twenty minutes observing classroom lessons from kindergarten through twelfth grade. This year, the Board members visited general education, inclusion, bilingual, and ESL classrooms, as well as special classes such as physical education and art.



Working Together to Protect Students

In response to a recent resurgence of substance abuse among adolescents, specifically on Long Island, the Copiague School District's Home and School Connection hosted a forum for members of the Walter G. O'Connell Copiague High School senior class. Following a student survey on substance abuse, a committee was formed to create a program that deals openly and honestly with the topic and continues past the initial forum.

Professional experts in the field of drugs and alcohol were invited to share information with the students on the devastating effects of substance abuse. Speakers included Dr. Jeffrey L. Reynolds, Executive Director of the Long Island Council on Alcoholism and Drug Dependence; Howard J. Riesel, Coordinator of the Adolescent Services Unit from Glen Cove Hospital; and Suffolk County Police Officer George Lynagh.

"Substance abuse is one hundred percent preventable and absolutely treatable," said Dr. Reynolds. Once the three speakers completed their presentations, the floor was opened up for students to ask questions. Community service resource booths were also set up in the high school lobby for students to receive additional information.



Copiague Students Get **S.T.O.P.P.E.D.**

In an effort to warn students of the dangers of driving while intoxicated, the Walter G. O'Connell Copiague High School hosted a drunk driving simulation program during health class. The S.T.O.P.P.E.D. Program, which is offered free of charge by the Suffolk County Sheriff's Department, is geared to inform high school students about New York State's zero tolerance law for drivers under 21 who are caught driving while intoxicated and the consequences they face.

"Drunk driving is becoming an epidemic," Deputy Sheriff Thomas Indence told the students. "If you get caught drinking and driving under the age of 21, you are in big trouble. We want you to live long and full lives. Don't make that mistake."

Following the discussion on zero tolerance, Deputy Sheriffs Indence and Rick Rumplick coached the students as they drove through cone mazes while pedaling a cart and wearing goggles that simulated driving while impaired. Each cone represented a human being, and hitting a cone

meant that a person had been injured or killed as a result of the student's choice to "drive" while impaired. The students also participated in activities in which they were asked to walk heel-to-toe on a straight line and to catch a bouncing ball while wearing the goggles.

"I think this program is great," stated health teacher Carole Olsen. "The kids sometimes believe that they're invincible. This program is very simple and nonthreatening, but it gets the point across."

Seven members of the Walter G. O'Connell Copiague High School Distributive Education Club of America (DECA), under the guidance of advisor Louise Curci, placed in the top ten at the State Career Conference held this past March. The Copiague Chapter of DECA won two first-place trophies, a second-place and third-place trophy, and three top ten medals. 
Copiague Students **Give Their Soles**


During the visit, Staff Sergeant Schmanski and Army Specialist Schmanski also took the time to speak with the children and answer their questions.

Random Cards of Kindness



Copiague Students Visit Senior Center


Dressed in their best red and pink ensembles, members of the Copiague Middle School visited the Tanner Park Senior Citizen Center to celebrate

Continuous voter registration is available in the office of the District Clerk from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m., Monday through Friday, when school is in session, for both the Copiague School District and Copiague Public Memorial Library. For more information, contact the District Clerk at 842-4015. Residents who have voted or registered at any Annual or Special School District meeting or election held within the last four (4) years, or have voted at a general election or have been registered with the Board of Elections of Suffolk County within the last four (4) years, are eligible to vote. The last day to register for this vote is Tuesday, May 10, 2011.

If you would like to register to vote, you must:

- Be a citizen of the United States
- Be 18 years of age or over
- Be a resident of the Copiague School District for at least 30 days prior to the voting date.

Absentee Ballots

Applications for absentee ballots are available at the Office of the District Clerk and must be completed and returned at least seven days before the election if the ballot is to be mailed to the voter, or the day before the election if the ballot is to be delivered personally to the voter.



undeliverable mail, anonymous tips, and observation, the building principal sends a letter and gives the parent or guardian two weeks to respond with his or her proof of residence. If the notice is not acknowledged, Mrs. Sheridan sends a second letter stating that the residents in question have two weeks to meet with her; otherwise the student will be removed from class. Additionally, the residency committee meets every two weeks to review and discuss ongoing investigations.

This is an ongoing process and we have to be respectful in it, but we also have to take it seriously because our resources should go to the students who live in this community," said Mrs. Sheridan
