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## Highlights Happenings

The 2011-2012 school year is off to a productive start in the Copiague School District. Despite numerous program cuts throughout New York State, the District continues to offer its students all educational and extracurricular programs. "We believe that affording our students all opportunities for success today will lead to success in the future," stated Superintendent of Schools Charles A. Leunig. "However, we are conscious of our community and the strain they may be facing due to the current economic climate, so we do everything within our constraints to operate under a fiscally responsible budget."

To that end, this past summer the District began utilizing its transportation routing software and Student Management System to create bus stops and bus passes for students. "The routing software has allowed our transportation to become even more efficient, resulting in a cost savings for the District," said Mr. Leunig. Also this summer, the new cafeteria line was installed using funds from the cafeteria budget, which is independent of the District's general budget.

Many exciting things are happening within each of the school buildings. Below are just a few highlights from around the District occurring this fall.

### WALTER G. O'CONNELL COPIAGUE HIGH SCHOOL

Expanding on the Districtwide College Day initiative, the High School continued to increase its support of students who are interested in pursuing higher education. Since September, the High School has hosted a mini college day, attended by 121 colleges and universities, as well as provided transportation to the College Fair at Suffolk County Community College (SCCC) for 70 students. Additionally, seniors and freshmen, along with their parents, benefited from separate college nights where they received advice on financial aid, saving for post-secondary education, and how to choose the right college. Evenings tailored to the sophomore and junior classes will be held later this year.



The High School also began its on-site admissions program, in which eight seniors have already passed the preliminary requirements for Five Towns College. "This year's seniors have had the highest number of early acceptance applications submitted in our school's history," remarked High School Principal Jeanette Altruda. Opportunities to gain college credit while still in high school have also been expanded by offering SCCC credit in statistics, pre-calculus, and theoretical and practical astronomy. In addition, enrollment in the Advanced Placement courses is at a record high.

### COPIAGUE MIDDLE SCHOOL

It is the mission of the Copiague Middle School faculty and staff to create an educational atmosphere in which every student is provided with the opportunity to realize his or her full potential as student, athlete, artist, musician, and individual through personal attention and encouragement. With school back in session, the members of the Builders Club have begun doing what they do best – raising awareness for community service. In their first activity of the year, the students collected school supplies such as notebooks, pens and folders, which they packed into book bags before donating them to students within the District. They sent the remaining book bags and supplies upstate to Plattsburgh, where Hurricane Irene left significant damage.

Additionally, the club raised more than \$1,500 for breast cancer research during their ninth year of participation in the American Cancer Society's Making Strides Against Breast Cancer walk.


# Community Gathers for Homecoming

### **DEAUVILLE GARDENS**

Kindergarten teachers at Deauville received training in the Wolf Trap Early Childhood STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) Learning Through the Arts Program, a one-week residency program that infuses STEM learning into pre-kindergarten and kindergarten classrooms using arts-based learning approaches. The program provides professional development for classroom teachers while helping children learn through active participation in arts-infused experiences that are grounded in proven and developmentally appropriate best practices.

These experiences correlate the elements of dance, drama, and music with pre-K and kindergarten outcome standards in math, science, and principles of engineering (problem solving, designing/building) and include the fundamental principles of scientific discovery: observation, description, problem solving and exploration of possibilities, collaboration, and cooperation. The program was offered to the school through its partnership with Northrup Grumman.

### GREAT NECK ROAD

To continue its tradition of welcoming students back to school and getting them excited about learning, Great Neck Road held an Educational Pep Rally. Each day, students and staff participated in activities that commemorated education while promoting school and community pride.

A schoolwide team-building activity kicked off the week with a series of physical activities that promoted teamwork, trust, and cooperation. Other highlights from the week included a song and dance extravaganza about reading, a free book distribution, and special performances by members of the Walter G. O'Connell Copiague High School drum line and step team.

"Educational Pep Rally Week helps celebrate education and generates enthusiasm for learning," noted Principal Joseph Agosta.

### SUSAN E. WILEY

Now in its second year, the Recycling Club at Susan E. Wiley has already hit the ground running. The evening concluded with the unveiling of the wall that holds the Hall of Achievement plaques, prominently displayed in the main hallway of Walter G. O'Connell Copiague High School. The goal of the District's Hall of Achievement is to introduce positive role models to the school community. Such models by their very nature will inspire students to adopt high aspirations.

### KEEPING CURRICULUM CURRENT

This summer, in order to keep Copiague at the forefront of education and give all students a chance at success beyond high school, the District worked on a total of 34 curriculum projects. "Every project that our staff works on fills a need for our District and our students," stated Superintendent of Schools Charles A. Leunig.

At the October 4 Board of Education meeting, four projects were highlighted for the Board and the community. Middle School Art Teacher Maria Ostrofsky presented her 8:1:1 Art Expression project. This program, also known as art therapy, will foster healthy communication and expression, promote the integration of physical, emotional, cognitive, and social functioning, enhance self-awareness, and facilitate positive change. Ms. Ostrofsky will plan and implement individual art therapy treatment plans, provide counseling, and work cooperatively with the students' teachers.

Also at the Middle School, Guidance Chairperson Stephanie Valeiko, Guidance Counselor Francesca Spinelli, and Social Worker Nicole Burke have created a social and emotional learning group. Students identified with social and emotional needs, or who may be socially or academically at-risk, meet in small groups that are led by counselors, a social worker or the school psychologist for 30 minutes each week. The aim of this program is to help build relationships and assist students with creating organizational and behavioral goals, as well as to build study skills. The program has been designed to last for 20 weeks.

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To target students who are new to the District as well as to the country, a group of ESL and Native Language Arts teachers worked on creating a SIFE (Students with Interrupted Formal Education) program, focusing on ELA and math. The goal of the program is to identify students who meet the standards of interrupted formal education and provide them with the tools they missed at the elementary level in literacy and mathematics. This program is provided as part of the morning extra-help program and teaches the students strategies to interpret, analyze, and answer questions on the assessments.

Additionally, ESL teachers worked on creating benchmark exams for the New York State English as a Second Language Achievement Test, which will help determine the skills that need the most focus within the classroom. The benchmark exams will also encourage collaboration between the ESL and ELA teachers, which will help to increase student achievement.

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### Blast Off to Space Camp!

Through a partnership between Northrup Grumman and the Copiague School District, Copiague Middle School science teacher Monica Csorny and eighth grader Whesley De Los Santos spent a week in Huntsville, Alabama at the U.S. Space & Rocket Center.



During their all-expense-paid educational trip, Mrs. Csorny and Whesley interacted with teachers and students from all across the country. Mrs. Csorny participated in workshops, where she created objects such as a hot air balloon and rockets, took part in astronaut simulations, including use of the 1/6 Gravity Chair that simulated the feeling of walking on the moon, and listened to various guest speakers, including former astronauts.



"This program far exceeded my expectations," said Mrs. Csorny.
"It is very inspiring and it filled me with pride for our space program and technology." Mrs. Csorny will incorporate many of the ideas and experiences she learned at Space Camp into her classroom lessons.

Whesley also trained like an astronaut by utilizing the 1/6 Gravity Chair, participating in simulated takeoff and landing exercises, and tumbling and spinning in the Multi-Axis Trainer. "This was a life-changing experience for me," remarked the eighth grader. "You don't get to do this stuff every day. It was really great."

According to the U.S. Space & Rocket Center's website, "This educational program couples classroom instruction with hands-on activities and teaches teamwork, decision-making, and leadership."

### Award-Winning Student-Musicians

As a result of their outstanding scores during the statewide New York State School Music Association (NYSSMA) solo festivals that took place last spring, six Walter G.



O'Connell Copiague High School students have been selected to participate in the NYSCAME/SCMEA All-County Music Festival, and two students were selected to All-State music ensembles.

Dilara Altuner, Ramon Carcamo, Trevor Coady, Matthew Edlind, Cassandra Riggio, and John Romano have been selected to represent the District at the 2011 All-County Conference. Cassandra was accepted to the band group and Dilara, Ramon, Trevor, Matthew, and John were invited to participate in the mixed choir.

Additionally, Ramon Carcamo has been selected to participate in the 2011 All-State Music Conference, while Cassandra Riggio was chosen as an alternate to the concert band.

### Spreading a Message Through Art

Student Wins State Prize in Knights of Columbus Poster Contest

Daniel Apolinario, an eighth-grade student at Copiague Middle School, has been awarded the state prize in the 12-17 age group for his poster submission into the Knights of Columbus-sponsored Alcohol and Drug Abuse Awareness Poster Contest. The purpose of the contest is to promote local awareness among young people of the major societal problems of alcohol and drug abuse, and to generate ideas nationally and



internationally for the Knights of Columbus substance abuse awareness posters and literature.

"As a charitable organization in the community, our most important responsibility is to spread information and increase public awareness of the dangers of substance abuse," remarked Grand Knight Bob Waidler from the Our Lady of the Assumption council of the Knights of Columbus at the September 19 Copiague Board of Education meeting.



### HONORED FOR SCHOLARSHIP

The College Board's Advanced Placement Program (AP) provides motivated and academically prepared students with the opportunity to take rigorous college-level courses while still in high school, and to earn college credit, advanced placement, or both for successful performance on the AP Exams.

The College Board recognizes several levels of achievement based on students' performance on AP Exams. At Walter G. O'Connell Copiague High School, three seniors qualified for the AP Scholar with Honor Award by earning an average of at least 3.25 on all AP Exams taken, and grades of 3 or higher on four or more exams. 

### New Expanded Budget Calendar

As you are more than aware, our state and nation are suffering from an unprecedented economic situation. Considering the economic challenges that our residents have been facing the Copiague Public Schools has worked hard over the past two years to reduce certain expenditures and present them at or below current levels wherever possible as we built our annual budgets. This has resulted in a net budget increase over the past two years of only 1.24 percent. Our priority has been to present budgets that are manageable to our taxpayers in the absence of real growth in government aid, limit growth in expenditures, and maintain core instructional programs to enable students to continue obtaining higher levels of achievement

As we begin to build a budget for the 2012-2013 school year, we will continue our efforts at cost containment. However, the recently enacted cap on the property tax levy increase will significantly impact the budget building process. The net effect will be that our revenue stream can no longer keep pace with our expenses, resulting in a budget deficit, or hole, that needs to be filled. Due to the restrictive nature of the cap on the tax levy, eliminating the deficit to balance the budget could result in program reductions, modifications and potential eliminations, with reductions in staffing likely making up a significant portion of this looming deficit.

As a concerned Copiague Schools Community member, we share all of this with you to assist you in your understanding of the situation currently facing the district. With this in mind, this year we will begin the budgeting process earlier than ever before and weave into the process our planning for the future. To that end the district will host a series of budget and planning workshops; we invite you to attend and offer your input, suggestions and questions. Time will be devoted during these meetings to providing a picture of where we've been as a school district and where we are now, and discussing how to preserve as much as we can for our students moving forward. ### **EXCEL UPDATE**

In January of 2007, the Copiague Community approved a Capital Improvement Bond worth more than \$11 million dollars. By combining state aid with EXCEL (Expanding our Children's Education and Learning) aid, the District was able to fund the cost of much-needed building repairs districtwide without any net increase in school district taxes.

Since the approval, the roofs at all five buildings have been replaced, a new hot water heater was installed at Susan E. Wiley Elementary School, and all remaining original windows were replaced. The High School and Middle School each

installed new acid waste tanks, while the High School also received reconstruction of the structural floor and exterior masonry. Great Neck Road Elementary School also had its exterior masonry reconstructed and old classroom ceilings were replaced.

Additionally, through favorable bids and careful management of the funds entrusted to the District by the community, additional projects not originally included in the scope of work were completed. A few of the projects that were completed include ceiling tile replacement and lighting at the High School, and new doors and historically correct windows at Great Neck Road (pictured at left).
