The Copiague School District held its third annual College Day on January 12 to encourage students K-12 to begin exploring post-secondary education options early in their lives.

Learning about careers and college life at the elementary level is a great first step towards creating a college-going culture for young students, and it is never too early to get a jump on the future. "A few years ago, we came to the realization here at Copiague that we could do much more when it comes to inspiring our students to aspire to go to college," said Superintendent Charles A. Leunig. "We decided to create a culture of college aspiration. I spoke to the Board of Education [about creating a College Day], and it was just a tiny seed of an idea at the time, but they enthusiastically supported it."

The District wants every student to learn, achieve to his or her potential, and most importantly, to be ready for college by the time he or she graduates from high school. According to Director of Guidance Dr. Mary Klein, the event has flourished since its inception due to the new concepts and ideas developed by the staff to build on the "Road to College" theme.

This year, College Day kicked off at Walter G. O'Connell High School, with lectures to the students from dozens of Copiague alumni. "Each year we invite back recent Copiague grads who are in college,"

remarked Mr. Leunig. "This year we had 65 grads come back and go into the classrooms to talk about what it's like in college. We also had a number of Hall of Achievement members come in and talk about their college and career experiences."

Later in the day, the festivities turned to the Susan E. Wiley Elementary School. The Nassau Community College kickline and C.W. Post cheerleaders performed for the students, while the Dowling College Golden Lion mascot made a surprise appearance to give out special prizes to the kids who answered trivia questions about careers. The day also included a "flash mob" at the Great Neck Road Elementary School, a door decorating contest at the Middle School, and a "college schedule" followed by the fifth graders at Deauville Gardens Elementary School.

In the evening, SUNY Stony Brook Associate Dean of Admissions Robert Pertusati gave an inspirational speech to students and parents in the high school auditorium. He informed students of the importance of taking challenging courses whenever possible. "Never take the easy route," Pertusati said. "Always take the more challenging route as long as it's a balanced route that's best suited for you. In life, you're going to be faced with challenges. We want to make sure you have the skills to advocate for yourselves and to master a challenge - not just in school, but for the rest of your lives."

Kids in Action

Members of the Copiague Middle School Student Council, National Junior Honor Society, and Builder's Club attended the Kids in Action Conference on Friday, December 2, at Farmingdale State College. The theme of this year's conference was "Anti-Bullying," and more than 2,500 students from over 40 districts were represented.

Prior to the December 2nd conference, a writing contest was held in which students were asked to give their opinion on the subject of bullying and how they thought it could be ended. Student Council President Karla Lopez was awarded second place in the writing competition. She received a medal and certificate of achievement, which was presented to her by Senator Owen Johnson.

"Our students did such an amazing job representing Copiague," remarked school counselor Francesca Spinelli.





Long Distance Learning

Fifth-grade students in Nicole Alamia's and Dawn Masure's classes at Deauville Gardens Elementary School took their lesson on rocks and minerals virtual. Utilizing the District's videoconferencing technology and programs free to educational facilities, the students participated in the North Central Ohio Educational Service Center's "Everyday Geology" program.

The forty-minute presentation showcased the science concepts using hands-on, group explorations. During the videoconference, students expanded their knowledge on the properties of rocks and minerals, the different types of rock, and the Earth's layers. They also took part in group experiments in metamorphic marshmallows, where they demonstrated the act of a rock being transformed into a metamorphic rock, and plate tectonics, which taught the fifth graders about continental drift and seafloor spreading.

Taking the Bait

Junior and senior students in Jonathan Krawchuk's marine science class at Walter G. O'Connell Copiague High School have been studying "class chondrichthyes," or more simply, the cartilaginous fish that include sharks and rays. To culminate the unit, the students worked in groups to dissect dogfish sharks, which were injected with three different colors of latex to represent the various blood vessels (red for arteries, blue for veins, yellow for the hepatic system).

"Using sharks injected with various colored dyes allowed students to observe the different blood vessels for comparison to human anatomy," explained Mr. Krawchuk. "The objective of the dissection was for the students to explore and determine the functions of body structures in the sharks. The key objective was for them to locate and compare the liver, stomach, intestines, heart, blood flow and brain to those of other organisms which we've discussed in the course."

This is only the second year that the marine science students have performed the dissection, which is, other than those done in an advanced placement biology class, the only dissection performed in the High School.

"It is my hope that they first of all enjoyed the experience, and secondly were able to obtain an understanding of differences among living things in the marine world when compared to familiar anatomies, such as the human one," Mr. Krawchuk stated. "I truly hope this activity has sparked an interest in science that the students may not have had previously."



Bridging Generations

Generations were brought together and bonds were strengthened as the fourth-grade students in Christopher Uccellini's class at Susan E. Wiley Elementary School created a multigenerational quilt. Working with their classmates in school and their relatives at home, the students wrote about their favorite family memories, while their relatives shared their own favorites.

"This project was a great way of bringing everyone together by sharing memories while showcasing the students' writing abilities," remarked Mr. Uccellini. "It was also an opportunity for the students to strengthen



their knowledge of one another and build relationships through shared experiences."

To celebrate the completion of the project, the students invited their relatives into the classroom to share their memories and reinforce their public speaking skills. The quilt was created during American Education Week, which is sponsored by the National Education Association. This nationally recognized week spotlights the importance of providing every child in America with a quality public education from kindergarten through college, and the need for everyone to do his or her part in making public schools great.

Bullying Awareness Day

On Monday, November 14, the Copiague Middle School held a Bullying Awareness Day. Organized by the Guidance Department, the students and staff at the school were encouraged to wear purple to take a stand against bullying.

The highlight of the day was a presentation by Jamie Isaacs. Jamie is a tenth-grade student at a private school on Long Island. Throughout her elementary and middle school years attending public school, Jamie was the victim of intense bullying. During her time at the school, Jamie was harassed by more than twenty fellow peers, which eventually led to the creation of the Jamie Isaacs Foundation for Anti-Bullying.

While at the Middle School, Jamie shared her horrific story with the six, seventh, and eighth-grade students who were in attendance. She employed student volunteers to perform a short skit that reinforced the devastating effects of bullying, and showed the trailer to the documentary *Bullycide: The Voice of Complicity.*

Leading up to Bullying Awareness Day, the faculty and staff signed an anti-bullying pledge that was on display for the students to see. "We believe that everybody should enjoy



our school equally and feel safe, secure, and accepted regardless of color, race, gender, popularity, athletic ability, intelligence, religion, and nationality," remarked Principal Andrew Lagnado.

Additionally, the Home and Careers Club set up a table during lunch periods that gave students the opportunity to "graffiti" something nice on a piece of paper to make someone feel good about themselves.
