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A Medley of Honors





Over the summer months, the District worked diligently to enhance and expand on the curriculum, affording better learning opportunities for all students. It also hosted its annual enrichment programs for elementary and secondary students and participated in the Summer Meals for Kids Program.

#### **EXTENDING LEARNING**

It was a summer of fun and education as incoming kindergarten through eighth-grade students extended their learning by participating in the District's free summer enrichment programs. The programs provide students with an outlet to explore a variety of creative, unique and innovative classes to equip them with new skills and abilities outside of normal classroom learning. Not only do the courses creatively engage students, but they also support the literacy and mathematics curricula, better preparing students for future careers in the 21st-century workforce. Students are able to investigate new and interesting subject areas, which

cultivate more opportunities for them now and in the future.

At the middle school level, 300 students participated in two-week camps where they could fine-tune their athletic skills, learn new fine-art techniques and participate in various academic activities. Programs included music, drama and art classes; baseball, football and basketball clinics; and a science research program, among other academic-centered programs.

More than 500 elementary students spent a few weeks satisfying their intellectual curiosity by participating in the District's summer enrichment program. Throughout the four-week program, each grade level focused on a specific topic and its different elements. Prekindergarten students learned about bubbles, kindergartners explored water, first-graders studied spiders, and second-graders focused on plants and gardens, while third-, fourth- and fifth-graders investigated weather, rockets and space, respectively. "The program allows us to integrate literature and

mathematics into project-based learning activities," said Summer Enrichment Principal Sarah Rowan. "The daily lessons lead up to a culminating weekly project."

In addition to the enrichment programs, 42 class and 54 tutorial academic sections were offered to students in grades 9-12. Through the academic programs offered, 31 students successfully completed all requirements for graduation in August. Of those 31 students, 27 received a New York State Regents diploma or higher.

#### **ENHANCING CURRICULUM**

This summer, District teachers and administrators worked together to revise different aspects of the curriculum. The summer curriculum writing projects help keep the District on the forefront of education and provide students with the most up-to-date information available. Under the direction of Associate Superintendent Dr. Kathleen Bannon, teachers spent hundreds of hours working together to design, revise and review

Dear Residents,

Welcome to the Early Fall 2014 Edition of Copiague Connections! Why Early Fall? Since we had such a busy summer period and first couple of months of the school year, you can expect to see both this edition and an edition later in the Fall, when we will report on future events.

Our school year has gotten off to a great start, with one of the smoothest openings in memory. Many of the usual beginning-of-school-year issues were minimized this year, which is fortunate. In this issue of Copiague Connections, as always, we share the latest highlights on some great activities that occurred before the start of the school year, as well as some things currently underway in our schools, along with some important and newsworthy items.

A sampling of this edition's features includes: our latest group of Advanced Placement Scholars, of which we are very proud; summer curriculum projects; profiles on new staff; our annual service awards ceremony recognizing veteran staff members; and a reminder about our upcoming vote on the district's capital project to address infrastructure and space needs. As has been mentioned in many previous newsletters and public forums, our aging facilities' ongoing infrastructure maintenance needs must be addressed for current and future generations of Copiague children. Our facilities, which were built from the 1920's into the 1960's, must be brought into the 21st century in order to support current educational standards and delivery methods. In addition, over the last few years our school district has been experiencing enrollment growth averaging approximately 100 students additional per year, which is projected to continue into the future. This will require the district to add space at the elementary level, where our buildings are currently operating at 30% over their capacity. The most cost-effective way to accomplish all of this needed work is through a capital project, which enables the district to leverage available New York State building aid, which cannot be done through the normal budgeting process.

As always, there is lots of goings on in Copiague. I hope you enjoy these Fall days and I look forward to seeing you around the community and in our schools. As has often been said, our schools and our community are one, which makes Copiague the great place that it is and is the reason why Copiague is A Great Place to Live, Learn and Work!

curriculum documents to ensure they meet the needs of Copiague's students while remaining aligned to the Common Core.

"These upgrades will provide numerous benefits to our students both now and as leaders of tomorrow, creating a more comprehensive educational environment suitable for modern learning standards," said Dr. Bannon.

The 16 projects ranged from a collaboration among the four elementary schools to update the math program to creating a benchmark assessment for eighthgrade English language arts.

#### **ENRICHING MEALS**

The District believes that one of the most important ways we can help our children



perform to the best of their abilities in the classroom is to provide them with a wellbalanced diet. To that end, the Food Service Department provides nutritious meals for breakfast and lunch at both the elementary and secondary levels. To ensure students continued receiving proper nutrition during the summer months, the District participated in a free summer lunch program sponsored by the federal government. In addition to the two summer school sites (Walter G. O'Connell Copiague High School and Deauville Gardens), the District opened Copiague Middle School and Great Neck Road Elementary School, as well as collaborated with four local organizations, to provide nutritious meals for all children 18 years and younger for six weeks.


# BOE 101: Workshop Scheduled for Nov. 24

## EARN AP AWARDS
