### PROTECTING THE COMMUNITY'S INVESTMENT

The District has commenced, at no additional cost to taxpayers, several major building renovations this summer under the state's \$11.3 million EXCEL initiative approved by voters in January. These projects include roof replacements, masonry repair, and renovations at the high school and Great Neck Road Elementary School. The projects are proceeding on schedule and the District anticipates that all projects will be substantially completed by the opening of school in September.

## FOCUS ON WELLNESS

The Board of Education and administration have always identified students' health and well being as a high priority. The District will again participate in a free and reduced price program for Copiague area school children. Local school officials adopted a family eligibility criteria to assist them in determining eligibility. For details regarding eligibility and pricing please contact the Copiague School District at 842-4015. The District currently serves breakfast and lunch each day to more than 75% of its students. The price of school lunches has not been raised in more than a decade.



## Special Transportation Requests

A new childcare and/or medical transportation request must be submitted for each school year. Information is not carried over from year to year. Please contact the Transportation Office at (631) 842-4015 ext. 529 as soon as possible for a new application. If a student needs to change a bus stop for any reason during the school year, please contact the Transportation Office in writing at least 48 hours prior to your requested start date. Also note that a request for a bus stop change due to a change in residency, within the District, must be accompanied by proof of your new address.

### LEARNING NEVER STOPS

Every summer, District teachers and administrators work together to review and revise various aspects of the curriculum. Summer curriculum and staff development ensures that the District is in the forefront of education and provides students with the most up-to-date curriculum available. During the summer, staff members participated in several curriculum based projects including mathematics and English Language Arts (ELA).

For the first time, the District initiated three, two-week summer enrichment camps in band, art, drama, computers, physical education, and technology for all middle school students. A three-week summer camp in reading and math was also provided for middle school students. The reading and math camps were designed to service students in need of remediation and focused on basic reading and math skills. These camps enabled students to maintain and build upon the academic skills acquired in the classroom, and encouraged students to approach the news school year with confidence.



# Superintendent

Dear Residents,

Over the past thirteen years, the members of the Class of 2007 have been eyewitnesses to a reformation of Copiague Schools. When these young people entered Kindergarten in 1994, we had, perhaps, a dozen computers districtwide, a student-to-teacher ratio of 21 to 1, state testing in only grades 3 and 8 and a Regents Diploma rate of about 17%. There were few elective courses and three librarians for five schools. The new sports complex was not even a dream and our buildings, grounds, and equipment left much to be desired. Of course, this has all changed.

When our graduating seniors walked out on the new all-weather athletic field on June 22, 2007 at 7:00 p.m. for commencement exercises, they were again making history. They graduated outside under a beautiful blue sky with a soft breeze blowing and the new athletic complex as their back drop. What a magnificent evening! This was only right, as they were part of the greatest transformation that this district has undergone since the opening of the Copiague High School in 1967.

We currently have more than 2,000 high powered PCs and laptops, five librarians, a student-to-teacher ratio of 15 to 1 and, of course, a Middle School. Seventy-five percent of our seniors currently earned Regents Diplomas with the majority of students going on to college. Our top graduates this year have been accepted to and will attend Yale, Harvard, Columbia, and Duke as well as many other colleges both locally and nationwide. But, as they say, "You ain't seen nothing yet!" Stay tuned, for Copiague Schools are moving to even greater heights. This newsletter captures just a smidgen of all that our students have accomplished during the 2006/2007 school year. After reading the many articles about our students contained in this newsletter, you will know why, I believe, Copiague is a "great place to learn!"

Enjoy the rest of the summer, and I will see you in September.

# Project **SAVE**

Throughout the years, the District has always been aware of the rising cost of education and continually looks for ways to fund programs without costing taxpayers. This past spring, the District submitted a grant application and was notified that the District has been awarded a three-year grant worth \$240,000 by the State Education Department. This grant money will be used to fund Project SAVE, Safe Schools Against Violence in Education Act: Instruction in Civility, Citizenship, and Character Education.

Project SAVE is a districtwide program that addresses character education concepts specifically targeted to each grade-level. Programs will run from recess and after-school activities to parent connection programs.

## STATE RECOGNIZES STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT AGAIN!

The State Education Department and Board of Regents recently recognized Walter G. O'Connell Copiague High School, Copiague Middle School, and Deauville Gardens Elementary School as recipients of New York State's "High Performing/Gap Closing" award for school districts. 
