Going O'rganic

Walter G. O'Connell Copiague High School's Environmental Club, led by James Travis and Daniel Barresi, as well as a branch of S.O.U.L. (Student Organization of Unified Leaders), began work on an organic garden this past October. The club started out with small projects such as planting trees on Earth Day and implementing recycling programs for the school. The club acts essentially as a mentoring program, concentrating on providing a model for academic success by appealing to student interests. This year, the students decided they wanted to do something larger, which resulted in the building of this new organic garden.

Initial funding for the garden came from donations before receiving three grants, including a \$4,000 grant from the Cornell Cooperative Extension (CCE). In addition to the funds, the CCE provides two farming experts who visit with the students on a monthly basis to teach the club everything, from the basics of square foot farming to organic planting techniques. Additional grants included a tiller from Mantis, which has helped the club with the maintenance of the farm, and a \$5,000 "Lowes Toolbox" grant from Lowes.

"The Environmental Club uses a 'project based learning' approach, meaning the learning starts in the classroom with formal academic lessons, followed by students venturing outside and implementing what they learned," remarked Mr. Travis. "The club has done this for every topic, from framing the beds to planting seeds."

The garden is currently producing an array of vegetables including peas, garlic, lettuce, broccoli, Swiss chard, tomatoes, cucumbers, peppers, and cabbage. As proper nutrition is a topic of conversation, with this garden the club hopes to not only teach students about organic farming, but also to nurture their physical wellbeing. Having these goals in mind, Mr. Travis would like to expand the program to the middle school and the elementary schools in the future.

Additionally, due to his work with the garden, Mr. Travis was recognized by the Tobacco Action Coalition of Long Island.

Outstanding Citizens and Artists

The Copiague Board of Education and administration recognized outstanding student-artists and districtwide role models through the Superintendent's Art Gallery and Student Recognition Award ceremonies.

The Superintendent's Art Gallery began 15 years ago when Copiague art teachers selected several pieces of student artwork for the Superintendent to choose to inaugurate the gallery. Since then, the collection has grown and student

artwork adorns the corridors and offices of each of the District's schools. Student-artists in kindergarten through twelfth grade are represented each year, and the framed pieces are identified by an engraved plate noting the student-artist's name, grade level, and year the piece was completed. In addition to having their work selected to the Superintendent's Art Gallery, Sophia Bright, Isai Salmeron, and Alyssa Tsistinas were chosen as the winners of the Fine Arts Festival, which was held during the Annual Budget Vote and Board Trustee Election. Each student was awarded a \$100 savings bond from COPTA, the Copiague Teachers Association.

Twice a year, a small number of students are recognized for their extra-special accomplishments by the Board of Education and administration. Being honored in front of their family, friends, and community is a way for the Board of Education to publicly recognize and celebrate these students' numerous successes. This year, 31 students were recognized for their outstanding achievements.





A Prestigious Honor

Throughout the month of May, numerous students in the Copiague Middle School and Walter G. O'Connell Copiague High School were inducted into national honor societies. At the Walter G. O'Connell Copiague High School, 27 students were inducted into the Isabella M. Driscoll Chapter of the National Honor Society (NHS). Officers Shanice McKenzie (President), Daniel Handy (Vice President), Amber Perrier (Secretary), and Meagan Pride (Treasurer) spoke about the characteristics that best describe a National Honor Society member: Service, Character, Leadership, and Scholarship. The Copiague Middle School inducted 64 students into its chapter of the National Junior Honor Society (NJHS). To be eligible for membership consideration, students must have a cumulative average of at least 90 percent. In addition, candidates must meet the high standards of Leadership, Service, Citizenship, and Character. Service and Leadership are based on the student's participation in community or school activities. Character is measured in terms of integrity, behavior, ethics, and cooperation with both students and faculty. Citizenship is demonstrated by civic involvement.

6,000 LAPS FOR SOLDIERS

To celebrate Memorial Day and to honor the memory of the more than 6,000 soldiers that have given their lives in the Iraq and Afghanistan Wars, students and staff at Walter G. O'Connell Copiague High School walked 6,000 laps around their school track.

Organized by members of the Student Organization of Unified Leaders (S.O.U.L.) and their advisor Jaime Suarez, each participant volunteered to walk twelve laps to reach the goal of 6,000 laps. Prior to their laps, each walker was given the names of twelve soldiers in whose honor they were walking. To motivate the walkers, boards featuring photos, ages, dates, and causes of death of fallen soldiers were on display throughout the track.

"Today we are intending to honor more than 6,000 men and women who made the ultimate sacrifice to insure our freedoms," remarked Mr. Suarez to the gathered crowd prior to the first ceremonial lap. "Their sacrifices will only mean something as long as we remember. Today, we remember."

In addition to the students and staff, Raymond Calero was on hand to encourage and walk alongside the participants. Mr. Calero's son, Major Jeffrey R. Calero, a member of the Army Special Forces, gave his life on October 29, 2007 during his second tour of duty in Afghanistan.

Following the ceremonial first lap, participants had the opportunity to sign cards that would be sent to soldiers currently serving in the armed forces. Concessions were also on sale throughout the day, with all proceeds being donated to an organization for wounded soldiers.



Letters of Intent

Family, friends, coaches, and school administrators celebrated Walter G. O'Connell Copiague High School seniors Philip Jerome "PJ" Page and Chelsea Williams as both students signed letters of intent to play collegiate basketball.

PJ signed his letter of intent to play guard and small forward for the Division II Central Atlantic Collegiate Conference of Caldwell College. According to his coach, Stephen Rebholz, PJ was a four-year varsity player who led the Eagles in scoring and blocked shots for the 2010-2011 school year. During his years on the



team, he was named an All-League, All-Conference, and All-County player. In addition to his full athletic scholarship, PJ received an academic scholarship and will major in criminal justice.

Five-year varsity player Chelsea will take her talent to the East Coast Conference as she plays guard for the Long Island University, C.W. Post Pioneers. Earlier this year, Chelsea became only the sixth girls basketball player in Copiague history to score 1,000 points. She ended her Lady Eagle career with a total of 1,266 points. She is a three-time All-County player and was selected to the first team All-Long Island in her senior year. While at C.W. Post, Chelsea will major in accounting.

"All of us in the Copiague family are extremely proud of both PJ and Chelsea," remarked Director of Physical Education and Athletics Peter Cesare. "We wish them well in their future academic and basketball careers."

AHA AED

Whether a student is learning in a classroom or playing a sport on the athletic field, their safety is always a top priority of the Copiague School District. To that end, the District would like to thank the American Heart Association (AHA) for their donation of two



automated external defibrillators (AEDs). The AEDs will be used by the Walter G. O'Connell Copiague High School Athletic Department and in the Copiague Middle School nurses' office.

"Our mission is to build healthier lives, free of cardiovascular diseases and stroke," wrote AHA representative Yamise Fields in a letter to the District. "As part of the commitment to the American Heart Association, the Long Island Board of Directors dedicated this year's annual fund to purchase automated external defibrillators for selective local schools for emergency use during physical activity on school grounds."

REMEMBERING A LOST FRIEND

Earlier this year, Walter G. O'Connell Copiague High School junior and member of the track and cross-country teams Christopher Urban passed away unexpectedly. To honor Christopher's memory and his commitment to the team and sport he loved, coaches George Schroeder and John Sack organized the First Annual Urban Memorial Track Invitational.

"Sacrifice, dedication, perseverance: these were not just words to Chris, they were a daily ritual," stated Mr. Schroeder.

With rain steadily flowing throughout the day and teams traveling from as close as Lindenhurst to as far east as Mattituck, the sun was able to break through the clouds as the first event began. In addition to the standard track-and-field events, fifth graders from the three elementary schools – Deauville Gardens, Great Neck Road, and Susan E. Wiley – participated in a special 4x100 relay, with each participant receiving a medal.
