

BUILDING Community

Recognizing the importance of a good school-community relationship, for many years the District has partnered with the Kiwanis Club of Copiague to help bring programs to students at the Middle School and High School. Two Clubs, the Builder's Club, at the Middle School, and Key Club, at the High School, are student-run community organizations. Through both clubs students have the opportunity to develop and learn leadership skills. The Builder's and Key Clubs are part of the Kiwanis International youth recognition of service and learning.

"The Builder's Club allows students to plan and work on various community service projects, weekly meetings, and social events to help prepare its members for high school," stated advisor Maria Ostrofsky. "The importance of communication skills, values, teamwork and character building are included in the program's goals." Added Key Club advisor Jennifer Phillips, "Key Club is an international organization whose primary mission is to help others."



Members of the Copiague Middle School Builders Club and Cheerleading Squad teamed together to raise \$2,376 for breast cancer research.

Each club participates in numerous activities throughout the year, including raising money for the Make-A-Wish Foundation and organizing blood, food, toy, and clothing drives.

A DECADE PLUS ONE OF HONOR

The culmination of a perfect Homecoming 2007 celebration was the induction of this year's distinguished alumni into the Copiague Hall of Achievement. This annual event is held to acknowledge and recognize former graduates who, through their own success and contributions to society, serve as role models to students throughout the District.

This year's honorees included Sheri von Essen Casey (Class of 1969), Ronald M. Cherry (Class of



1974), Gregory J. Corrado (Class of 1975), Christopher M. Geackel (Class of 1982), and Colonel James G. TietJen, USAF (Class of 1970).

After earning her Master's Degree from SUNY Stony Brook, Sherri von Essen Casey returned to her alma mater to begin her career teaching English Language Arts until her retirement in June 2007. In 2006, she was named a "Teacher of Excellence" by the New York State School Boards Association. Her contributions to the District are numerous and she has positively impacted the lives of countless students in the District.

Ronald M. Cherry is a graduate of the University of Maryland Law School and last year was named as one of Maryland's 'Super Lawyers," recognizing him as one of the top 5% of all Maryland attorneys. He is a senior partner in the firm of Cherry & Jennifer, P.A., which is located in Towson, Maryland.

Gregory J. Corrado is a visiting scholar at UCLA's Graduate School of Film. His screenplay, *The Troubles*, was chosen from among a field of 4,000 entries to be a top-ten finalist in the Academy Awards screenwriting fellowship. He also wrote and edited the feature film, *Murder Reincarnation*, which was bought and distributed by York Entertainment.

Christopher M. Geackel retired from the Air Force as a Master Sergeant in 2006 after 23 years of service. He received two Associate in Applied Science Degrees in Criminal Justice and Education and Training Management through the Community College of the Air Force. His numerous awards include two Meritorious Service Medals, three Commendation Medals, and five Air Force Achievement Medals.

Colonel James G. Tietjen graduated with honors from the U.S. Air Force Academy and went on to fly ten types of jet fighter aircraft throughout Europe, Asia, and the Pacific. He is also a graduate of the Air Command and Staff College and the USAF Air War College. As an Air Force pilot, he was awarded the Defense Superior Service Medal and the Defense Meritorious Service Medal. He retired in 2004 after 34 years of service.
