The Controlled Open Enrollment Window and CCPS Magnet Fair is Right Around the Corner!

This is a friendly reminder from Dr. Desjardins, Assistant Superintendent of School Support Services for Charlotte County Public Schools, alerting parents that the month of January is designated as the school district's controlled open enrollment window (school choice). During this month, parents and guardians may select a school in our district other than their child's assigned geographic school for the upcoming 2025-26 school year as long as that school is not closed due to being at capacity enrollment. If a school is "open" to reassignments, it is important to note that your child is not necessarily guaranteed a spot at that location. If there are more reassignment requests for a particular school than available seats, then the district will use a random lottery to determine which students will be allowed to attend that school. If a random lottery is needed, it will be conducted during the first two weeks of February.

To assist parents and guardians with navigating through the different educational programs offered at the middle school, high school and postsecondary levels, the school district is hosting its first Magnet Fair on January 16th at Centennial Park Gym from 5:30pm to 7pm. Secondary and post-secondary schools from across the district will be highlighting their special academic programs such as aviation, cybersecurity and advanced manufacturing. Any student who is currently on reassignment to a school other than his or her assigned geographic school is no longer required to renew his or her reassignment every year. Your student will remain on that school's roster until your student has completed the highest-grade level offered at that school (5th grade for elementary school and 8th grade for middle school). Out-of-County residents no longer need to renew their reassignment application each year they wish for their student to attend a Charlotte County Public School unless they decide to change the school their student is currently attending.

Reassignment forms are available at any Charlotte County Public School, Charlotte County Public Schools Murdock County Office, or on the web at www. yourcharlotteschools.net. A complete listing of schools that are at capacity (closed to reassignments) is also available on the school district's website. If you decide to select a school other than your child's assigned geographic school, be careful to research the special conditions such as athletic eligibility that are attached to reassignment obligations. Transportation is not provided for students who have obtained a reassignment. Out-of-County students no longer need to obtain a signature (release) from their county of residence.

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The Silent Crisis

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The Negative Impact of Chronic Absenteeism on Middle School Students

Chronic absenteeism, defined as missing 10% or more of school days, is a serious issue that can have far-reaching consequences for middle school students. While it may seem like a minor problem, the data reveals a troubling trend with significant implications for more than just grades. Students that miss school have more social-emotional development struggles, and their job options in the future are significantly limited.

Research consistently shows a strong correlation between chronic absenteeism and failure. Students who miss school frequently struggle to keep up with coursework, and as a result must retake classes, and attend summer school. As a result, they are more likely to fail a grade level. Studies show that students that get held back even one grade are much more likely to drop out of school.

Beyond academic struggles, chronic absenteeism has a negative impact on a student's social and emotional well-being. Missing school often leads to feelings of isolation, and decreased self-esteem. They just don't have a chance to make as many friends as their classmates that are in class every day. When a middle school student misses the chance to be with friends in a learning environment, they experience loneliness and feelings of failure. Simply put, students who are chronically absent miss out on important social interactions. All young teens need friends and mentors. School provides both.

Parents make the biggest difference in middle school attendance. When parents recognize the long-term consequences of chronic absenteeism, they stress the importance of being in school all day every day. While it does not feel like it, -

students actually listen to their parents. Parents, that require their middle schooler to be in school every day get to see their student gain confidence, build friendships and succeed academically.

To address this issue, schools and communities must work together to identify and support students who are at risk of chronic absenteeism. 1 Early intervention strategies, such as regular attendance checks, parentteacher communication, and attendance incentives, can help to prevent absenteeism from becoming a chronic problem. 2 By prioritizing attendance and providing students with the support they need to succeed; we can help ensure a brighter future for all.

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Anti-Bullying Policy

Charlotte County Public Schools does not tolerate bullying, which includes

cyberbullying. Throughout the school year, our schools do a variety of classroom, large group, and small group lessons on bullying and bully prevention.

Though we teach all of our students that bullying is wrong, it still occasionally occurs. And, while we would like cases of bullying to be reported to the administration, they are not always reported.

Parents - if you have a bully (or cyberbullying) concern please let us know. If your child is a target and is being bullied or if you believe your child bullies others, please let us know. Open and consistent communications with the school will not only help your child but will help many others and the school. Unfortunately, some bully situations take a number of interventions before it subsides. Please continue to communicate with the school and provide any additional information that will help the school put an end to the situation.

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It is important to note that investigation of cyberbullying can occur regardless of whether the bullying was conducted using public or private property (cell phone, computers, etc). Please reference Florida Statute 1006.47

We look forward to helping our students share their school pride!


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Attend School All Day Every Day
