Elementary

K-KIDS

ACHIEVE 3000

The professional developer from Achieve 3000 (a new software based differentiated reading program) will be working in classrooms this week across both elementary schools in Grades 3-6. She will be conducting model lessons and helping teachers plan accordingly to help facilitate the program's implementation. Students need daily practice with text at their independent reading level to develop reading strategies and to provide access to grade-level content. Achieve 3000's 5-Step Literacy Routine is designed to build the skills for close reading of informational text with the explicit purpose of finding the evidence necessary to respond to a written prompt.

REFLECTIONS

This years' Reflection Contest theme is "Let Your Imagination Fly." The National PTA Reflections Program welcomes students of all grades and abilities to explore and be involved in the arts. Students reflect on a theme, create original works of art in the categories of dance choreography, film production, literature, music composition, photography and visual arts and earn positive recognition for their achievements. At Centre this was the first PTA Reflections contest. Judging was held last week in both elementary schools and the judges were hard at work deciding which pieces will be selected to move onto the next round. Thanks to the PTAs for their efforts, once again, this year to help support "the arts" across both elementary schools.

The Centre Avenue PTA sponsored a BMX Bike and character education assembly to motivate students to make responsible decisions. Verizon Fios was at Centre to film the event.

Centre Avenue fourth grade social studies students are demonstrating their knowledge of Native Americans in New York State by completing a unit assessment. Students are writing an essay comparing and contrasting the Iroquois and the Algonquian using details from lessons taught in the unit. This will take place over two days: Day 1 - creating a graphic organizer and planning their response; Day 2 - using their plan to write their essay.

Centre Avenue sixth grade students are learning to analyze the concept of justice by discussing two cases using modern scenarios as discussions. Is the outcome fair to the accused? Victim? Is the outcome best for society? Students will complete graphic organizers about U.S. laws in small groups. Each group will cite evidence from passages and report to the larger group about laws, equal justice and punishments.

Rhame Avenue Students were recently treated to a Prismatic Laser Assembly that focused on the science of lasers with a Patriotic Theme.

The Rhame Avenue PTA and school social workers organized a Thanksgiving Food Drive to support local families in need. A special thanks to parent, Billy Quaranto, for helping to coordinate. Contributions were received from families and staff. Food baskets were made and went directly to families within the East Rockaway School District and the additional donated items were given to the food pantry at St. Raymond's.

At Rhame, Dr. Parker was back in the building this past Tuesday conducting Fall Progress Monitoring Meetings with individual teachers to discuss student progress and services being provided. It was a day filled with rich conversation about teaching and learning.

There were some changes passed by the NYS Regents this week regarding teacher evaluations. Mr. Piccarella reported that the change eliminates the use of state test scores in teacher evaluations for the next four years. There is no final plan yet and further guidance will be forthcoming.
