
STUDENT BODY OFFICERS (Continued) Stuart, as advisor to the class social committee, plans an active year. He plans to have a social

THIS IS ROOSEVELT Junior High was founded in the fill of 1924. It was originally housed in the building that Condon Grade School now oscupies.

In 1931 Mr. Van Loan became principal. He succeeded Mr. Notter.

The Roosevelt gym classes had the use of Hayward Field when they were in the Condon Building.

In 1934 the enrollment reached 326 students. They had an Roosevelt initiation ritual too. The seventh grade girls were required to wear men's hats and ties, to wear stockings that didn't match, and to wear their dresses backwards.

At the ninth grade girls! mand, "Kneel, Fido," they knelt until the girls said, "O.K." The boys wore large hair ribbons, their shirts were worn backwards, and their pants rolled up to their knees. They also had to go through the kneeling routine.

In 1950 the new school was opened up. It had 551 students and 19 teachers. The teachers were: Mr. Ackerman. Mrs. Dart, Miss Groves. Miss Hughes, Mr. Erickson, Lettow, Mr. Mullaley, Miss Mattley, Mr. Nelson, Miss Nimmo, Mrs. Pitman, and Mr. Robert Johnson.

Not long after the school was opened three rooms were Then 1954 a metal shop and sewing room and two classrooms were added. This year an addition has been made to the kitchen and to the fields.

For seven years the students of Roosevelt have kept up the school and made it one of the best. This year there are 620 students errord so far so let's think of the cor person and the new students coming in next year.
