Life Education Article Reviewa

Life magazine's presentation of situation seems the educational quite accurate and complete. would agree that the responsibility of reform rests on the citizens of the entire nation, but it must go beyond just saying what should be done. It must include renewing our those educational ideals, living ideals, and activating those ideals with expenditures of money, time, and interest. Such an action type of program should make teaching so attractive that the public could be more selective in choosing teachers, and thereby maintain high standards of instruction. It should provide for the maximum development of every student.

In criticism of the articles, I feel that the style of presentation bordered on sensationalism. Further the examples were a little misleading. Specifically, the comparison between one of our superior students with the Russian boy would have shown a much brighter picture. In addition, the Portland science teacher is probably more energetic than most in obtaining more funds. Others of us would probably take advantage of the earning power of the rest of the family. As a third example it is doubtful that most gifted children have so many obstacles holding them back.

I believe the articles might also have included the following observations:

1. A pupil in the U.S. spends much of his time learning his governmental responsibilities whereas a Russian student may devote this time to academic learning.

2. It is doubtful that a gifted student is actually retarded by his teachers. If he actively seeks knowledge, he will probably receive direction. The rate of progress may not equal his potential, but can be

After reading the recent Life magazine series on American Education, I would like to bring up several points which I think were not mentioned.

The first is about the article on bright students. It seems to be true that the courses offered them in this country are often too simple. However, I think that the important things to remember is that bright students who are really interested in learning can, no matter what type of subject matter is offered. That is, they can find subject matter if they are truly motivated to learn.

This desire to learn can only be brought about by a national feeling of interest in knowledge and a feeling that it is important.

It looks as though the Russians gain knowledge to be better servants of the state. We in America must have knowledge to preserve our freedom and become successful in that free state.

It seems, too, as though much of the challenge of a subject lies in the teacher. In spite of this, our teachers are underrated, underpaid, and burdened with too many tasks of drudgery.
