The game that Roosevelt students turn out to see most frequently and more fellows turn out for is basketball; a game which takes a lot of skill and practice. Although Roosevelt did not keep the perfect record of their basketball teams in the past, they did cop the championship with a record of 6 wins and 2 losses in a tough season. The Teddies lost the first game of the season to Cal Young by the score of 45-43 in a hard-fought game with Ross Carter scoring 21 points and keeping Roosevelt in the game until the last few seconds. The next week the boys were hopped up to play their next opponent, Kelly, and they romped to a victory, winning by a 15-point margin, with Ross Carter dumping in 20 points.

Next on the eight-game list came Roosevelt's arch rivals, the Wilson Knights. This game was rather unusual because it wasn't decided who had won the game until a day or two after it was completed. Roosevelt had forged ahead early in the game and had stayed there until Dan Aldridge, the Rough Rider center, fouled out and was followed by our two forwards. Ross Carter and Steve Goldschmidt. Carter and Goldschmidt fouled out with two minutes and thirty seconds remaining in the game, leaving behind a 12-point lead which was cut very fast by the red-hot Knights. As the buzzer went off, one of the Wilson ball players threw up a shot which supposedly had won the game by a 51-50 score in favor of the Knights. But in totaling up the score book, there was found to be a mistake. It was that two of Roosevelt's points had not been put up on the score board but had been put in the book which made Roosevelt victorious by a slim one-point margin, the score being 52-51.

The following week Roosevelt played Jefferson, whom they beat by a 17-point margin in a game which Roosevelt came from behind in the last quarter to become victorious.

Starting the second round of the basketball season, Roosevelt came back to tromp Cal Young by 14 points with Aldridge contributing points and Goldschmidt 15.

Roosevelt met Kelly on Kelly's floor the following week and were beat as Roosevelt was missing Aldridge, Goldschmidt and Carter.

For the seventh game of the season, Roosevelt met Wilson at S.E.H.S. and were victorious by a 39-32 score with Goldschmidt dumping in 17 points.

The final game of the basketball season saw the Rough Riders beat Jefferson 85-36 with all the ball players on our club putting in at least four points, lead by Goldschmidt with 23 points and Carter dropping in 19.
