



## SPARTANS SQUEEZE BY RIDERS


Spencer Butte scored the winning goal from ten yards out in the last three minutes to beat the Riders 4-2 at Spencer Butte, Oct. 2.

ninth graders left with a comfortable 14-0 lead.

North made its first threat when the center's snap sailed over South's punter's head and the red and white took over on the young Axemen 20. But the defense held once more.

When South got the ball on an interception at the North 38, Enbysk got a halfback pass, run option, but was hit and fumbled. Larry Haneke (North's linebacker) picked it up and ran 55 yards for their only score.

South, after taking the kickoff, drove 60 yards in six plays for another score. This one by Nutting from seven yards out.

This game gave the Axemen a 2-0-1 record and first spot in the four team league.
